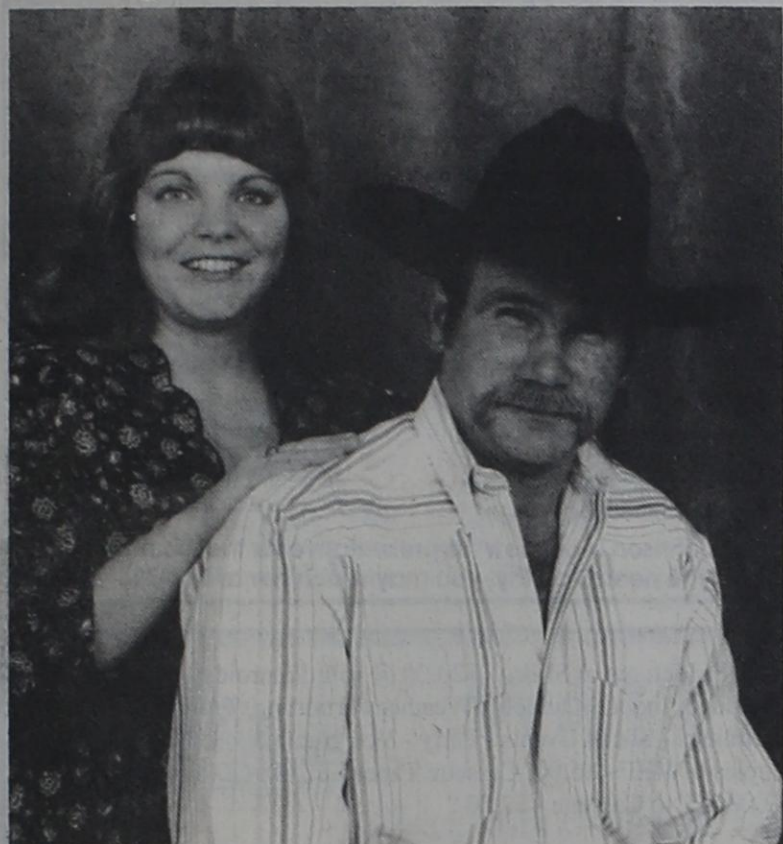

On Sunday, February 7th members will enjoy a skating party. Other events include a beautification project day planned for Monday, February 8th.

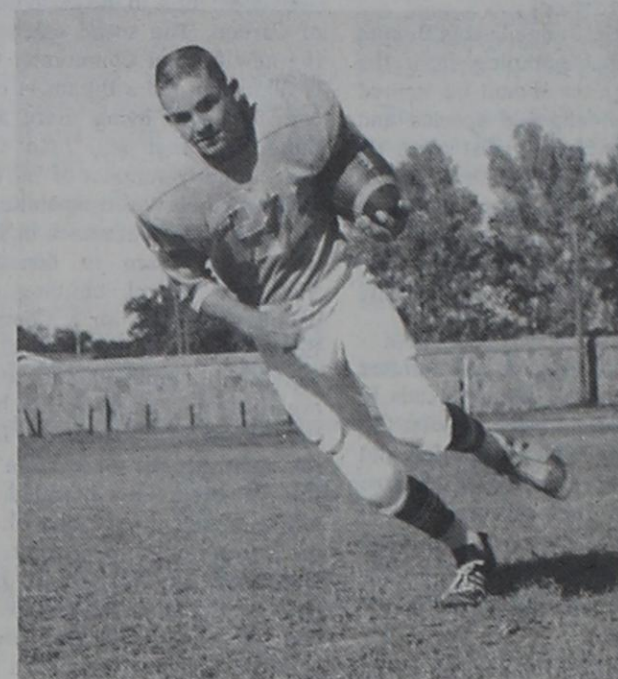
The club will serve a teachers appreciation breakfast on Wednesday, February 10th and a pizza party will be the event for Thursday, the 11th.

Mike graduated from Gorman High School in 1965, after attending twelve years there.

He loved football, basketball, volleyball and roping. Some of favorite high school coaches were David Goodwin and Michael Newbury. He received the Defensive Basketball Award his senior year.

Mike was also an Outstanding Musician while a senior in high school, he was among 700 graduating All State Band seniors from Arkansas, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Texas who took part in East Texas State College All Senior Honor Band and Chorus Concert. Purpose of the Concert was to honor senior students with musical ability, as much as all seniors football games honor senior gridiron stars. Mike also auditioned for scholarships at Nacogdoches.

He graduated from Abilene Christian University in 1970 and was immediately employed by Joshua Independent School District, where he as Teacher and Coach for 15 years until he lost his eye sight in 1985.

Mike also won a Roping Saddle from Johnson County Sheriff's Posse as First Place in a Roping Contest after he had sight only in one eye. Mike passed away in 1989.

Texas Cattlemen Angry At Court Decision

Fort Worth — A federal judge's decision Monday, Feb. 2 that the Endangered Species Act puts protection of Texas bugs before Texas babies makes it crystal clear that Congress must take steps immediately to bring the federal law under control, says John W. Jones, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The 20,000 members of TSCRA, a 116-year-old livestock trade association based in Fort Worth, control millions of acres of rural land that can be affected by the Endangered Species Act, the Brady rancher and businessman said.

U. S. District Judge Lucius Bunton has ruled that pumping from the Edwards Aquifer should be limited to protect endangered species and that state legislators must come up with a plan or face federal regulation. The ruling stems from a November trial in his Midland court in a lawsuit filed by the Sierra Club against the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

At issue is whether unrestricted pumping from the Aquifer leads to declining levels of the aquifer-fed Comal Springs in New Braunfels and San Marcos Springs in San Marcos. The lawsuit argued successfully that if the springs were to dry up, then some endangered plants and animals that live in the springs would be threatened.

Jones, who expressed "shock and disappointment" over the decision, urged the Texas Congressional delegation to unite behind legislative efforts to reform the Endangered Species Act this year. "I would hope this decision makes our people stand up and fight for protection of human rights. The strict judicial interpretation of this law is playing havoc with people, land use and land value in Texas."

Jones said immediate action is needed because of yet another court decision in December regarding endangered species. In a settlement of a lawsuit brought by environmental groups, the Bush Administration agreed to expedite final consideration of another 900 species "for

which definitive scientific information has not been collected." Even more troubling, Jones said, for the first time ever, officials agreed to a "multispecies, ecosystem approach" to preservation, rather than a species by species method.

"This action is a major blow to private property rights," Jones

Notice of Rate Change Request and Statement of Intent

Notice is hereby given that Comanche Electric Cooperative Association (the "Utility") intends to change rates for electric utility service effective April 20, 1993, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. Based upon a test year ending June 30, 1992, the increase requested over actual test year revenues is \$511,094 or 5%.

The Utility proposes to change rates for all residential, irrigation, small commercial, large commercial, and security lighting customers. The changes are applicable to all customers in these classes and to all areas served by the Utility. The proposed changes are expected to affect the classes as follows: for the 10,274 customers in the residential class, the proposed increase is \$329,057 or a 5.69% change in revenues; for the 1,419 irrigation customers, the proposed increase is \$38,475 or a 5.50% increase in revenues. For the 2,909 small commercial customers, the proposed increase is \$121,989, a 5.18% increase in revenue; for the 34 large commercial customers, the proposed increase will be \$7,053, 1.08% increase in revenue. For the 2.251 security lights, the proposed increase will be \$14,520, a 7.46% increase in revenue. No change is proposed for the 1 large power/industrial customer, Chaparral Pipeline Company.

Information concerning the proposed rate changes, including the proposed revisions of tariffs and schedules, is available at the General Office of the Utility, located at 201 West Wright Street, P. O. Box 729, Comanche, Texas 76442. Inquiries should be directed to Ronnie Robinson, General Manager (Phone 915-356-2533).

The Utility is required to give notice of the percentage increase in base revenues which is 11.67%. The percentage increase in base revenues is NOT an indication of how much your bill will increase. Rather, it is a measure of the increase needed by the Utility for its own operations, excluding payment of the cost of power purchased by the Utility from its wholesale power supplies.

On or about February 19, 1993, the Utility will file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, a Statement of Intent to Change Rates, specifying in detail each proposed change. Requests to intervene must be filed no later than 45 days after the application filing date; thus, the Utility anticipates the deadline for intervening and objecting to the rate changes will be April 5, 1993. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Austin, Texas 78757. Peanut production reported down

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. peanut production in 1992-93 dropped to 4.28 billion pounds, 643 million below last season but the third largest crop on record.

The Agriculture Department also said in a recent report that domestic food use of peanuts is projected to expand to 2.25 billion pounds, the second consecutive year of growth but still below the consumption level prior to 1990.

Peanut prices in 1992-93 are expected to average between 28 and 32 cents per pound, compared with the previous season's average of 28.3 cents per pound.

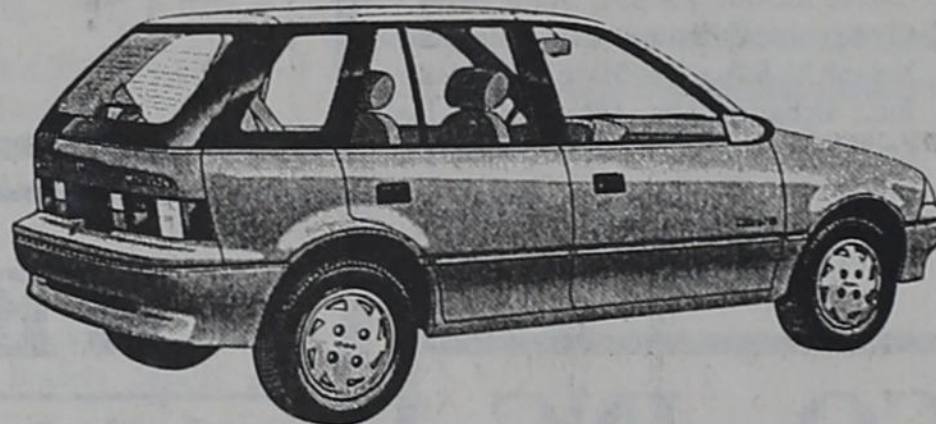
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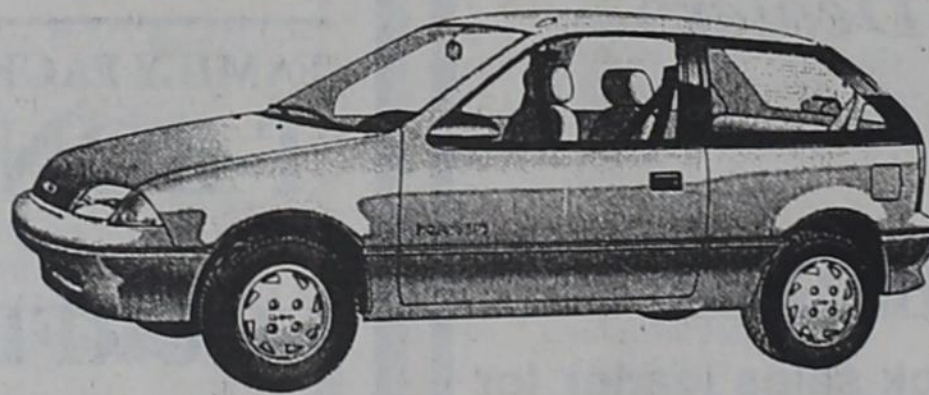
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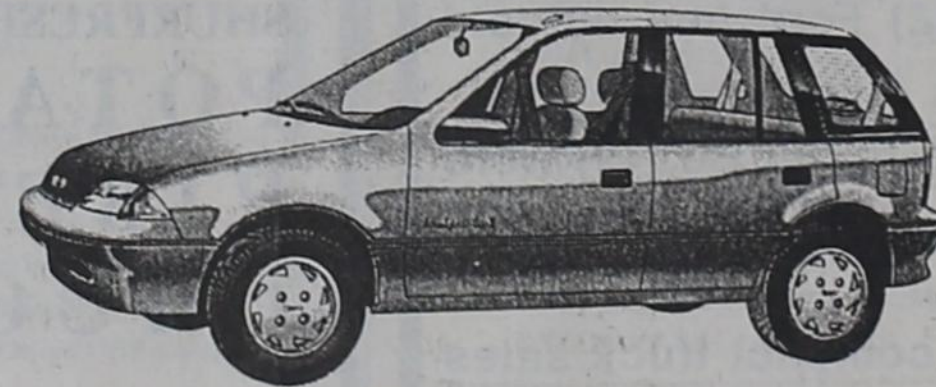
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
