The Gorman Panthers got their first win of the season on Friday night at Lometa when they overwhelmed the Hornets by the score of 48-0 in a driving rainstorm.

The teams couldn't get much going in the downpour of rain until the Panthers got on the board with 1:46 left in the first period. The Panthers took the ball on their own 35 and scored in just 5 plays with Marco Herrera getting the final 5 yards on a run. The drive festured a beautiful 56 yards run by Paul Petree and two other runs of 3 yards each. Don Mauney booted the point after and Gorman was up 7-0.

Then after an interception of a Hornet pass on their own 44, the Panthers went the distance in just one big blast. Following a penalty of 10 yards on the Panthers, Don Mauney raced 66 yards for the score with 10:40 left in the second quarter. Mauney kicked the point after and Gorman led 14-0.

After holding the Hornets on their next possession and getting the ball on their own 34, Mauney matched his first touchdown run of 66 yards

with a thrilling 66 yard run with 8:34 left in the second period. Mauney booted the point after and Gorman led 21-0.

Mauney added another score with 3:30 left in the half when he raced 19 yards for the score. The drive covered 31 yards in 6 plays. The drive featured a 9 yard run by Petree and an 8 yard run by Mauney. The kick for point was good by Mauney and Gorman was up 28-0.

The Panthers added another score before the halftime intermission when Mauney ran in for the score from 5 yards out with just 7 seconds left in the half. The drive featured a 40 yard pass to Paul Petree to set the Panthers up at the Hornet 8. The kick for point failed and Gorman was out front 34-0 at the halftime intermission.

The Panther Marching Band was not able to peform at the game due to the extreme rainfall during the larger part of the game.

Gorman added another TD with 9:51 left in the period. Following a bad snap over the head of the Hornet punter and a recovery on the Lometa 1 yard line the Panthers hit the scoreboard on a 1 yard pass to Ronald Majors with 9:51 left. Mauney kicked the point after and the

After an interception, the third of the night for the Big Red defense, the Panthers got the ball on the Hornet 45. From there it took only

one big play for the score as Nick Guthery tossed a perfect strike to Marco Herrera who caught the pass and raced in for the score with 7:10 left in the third. Mauney kicked the point after and Gorman led 48-0.

The Panther reserves played a large part of the second half and got some good playing experience.

Don Mauney had a fantastic night carrying the ball for 201 yards on 11 carries and did not carry the ball but 2 times in the second half. Paul Petree got 83 yards on just 7 carries. Marco Herrera had 65 yards on 7 tries. Nick Guthery got 17 yards on three keepers. Chris Holland had 7 on 1 try and Jeremy Sanders also carried for 1 time for 5 yards.

The Big Red defense really played a great game despite the elements as they held the Hornets to 5 first downs and also had 3 interceptions. Even though Gorman lost the ball 4 times on fumbles, the defense held the Hornets when it counted.

The Big Red defense and offense will have to play an outstanding game this Friday night as they travel to Rising Star to take on the Wildcats in a crucial District 15A game. The Wildcats have a very outstanding team and will be a tough opponent for the Big Red. So let's all follow the Panthers to Rising Star at 7:30 p. m. and back them to victory.


