The Tigers jumped out to a 7-0 edge at halftime, then the Panthers bounced back for 7 points in the third. The Tigers got ahead with another 7 points in the third to lead 14-7 in the third. But in the fourth the Tigers added another TD to go up 21-7. Then the Panthers got a drive going and scored a TD to get to within 8. But the final 2 minutes were run off by the Tigers and the Panthers lost the battle.

In the first quarter the Tigers took

the ball on their first possession and moved 80 yards in 11 plays with Billy Geter catching a pass of 5 yards with 4:27 left in the period. Jeremy Bales booted the point after and Hico lead

The Panthers bounced back in the third quarter when they took the ball on the Hico 14 after a fumble recovery and went the distance in 6 plays with Marco Herrera getting the final 2 yards with 5:15 left in the period. Don Mauney added the point after to tie the score at 7-7.

Then on the following possession the Tigers came right back and moved the ball 65 yards in 8 plays with Greg Lee catching a pass for the final one yard with 1:43 left in the period. Bales booted the point after and Hico went up 14-7.

The Tigers then held the Panthers on the next possession and again took the ball on their own 35 and moved in for the score in 6 plays with Greg Lee catching a pass for 10 and the score with 8:18 left. Bales added the point after and Hico was up 21-7.


But with the long drive for the score, the Panthers killed too much time on the clock to make a comeback and the Tigers killed the clock to take the victory 21-13.



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

Pesticides Collection Day Set September 23

What do you do with chemicals such as herbicides, insecticides, fungicides, pesticides used on livestock, treated sees or any such products that you no longer have a need for? As many businesses, producers and homeowners know, disposal of unwanted pesticides can be a problem. Some travel may be involved to fond a licensed site and the cost to dispose of pesticides can be very expensive. On September 23rd, a free pesticide collection site will be available in Erath County which will accept any of your unwanted pesticides.

When producers and/or individuals have difficulty disposing of left-over or expired pesticides, the tendency many times is to pour them out onto the ground or down some drain. As a result, these products can end up in our water supplies since most drains end up in the municipal waste treatment plants which often times end up in our major streams or rivers after treatment. That is why pesticide collection days are extremely important to participate in. In 1992, 197 tons were collected and in 1993, a total of 340 tons of waste pesticides were collected through these disposal days.

The Stephenville City Airport in Erath County will be the site of one of four collection days in September. The other sites will be at Ballinger,

Tornillo and Tyler. On September 23, collection of pesticides will begin at 8:30 a. m. and end at 3 p. m. at the Stephenville Airport. The airport is located on Hwy. 281 on the east side of Stephenville between Hwy. 377 and Hwy. 67.

Collection id free for producers, businesses or individuals and an opportunity to bring an unlimited amount of eligible pesticides to be disposed of. Proper care must be taken by cooperating farmers amd ranchers to safely transport pesticides to the collection site. If you have pesticides stored in a rusty drum or some other container that is not transportable, you may contact your County Extension Agent prior to the collection day to obtain a suitable container for re-packaging and transporting the product.

The collection site will also accept empty pesticide containers ehich have been triple rinsed or high-pressure rinsed. Farmers with containers on their tractors or in containers which need to be emptied, may also bring these types of containers to be emptied for them on this day.

Products that will not be accepted at the collection sites include: exploes) containing 2, 4, 5-T - Silvex, fertilizers or nutrient materials that are neither hazardous nor contain pesticide admixtures, pesticides or wood preservatives containing Pentacholroprenol.

In addition, tires, used batteries or used motor oil will be excluded at the collection site.

All collected pesticides will be disposed on by a container licensed by the EPA. They will be hauled off-site and disposed of in a proper way so as not to have any contamination. Cooperating producers are not required to sign any documents regarding disposal but may receive a receipt for disposed materials for their permanent records. All products collected will be unloaded by the contractor. The producers will never have to leave his vehicle.

The four locations for pesticide collections are the only disposal sites remaining in 1994. Disposal dates are co-sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission and the Texas Department of Agriculture. SHould you have questions relating to this pesticide collection program, you may contact your county extension agent. Anyone with pesticides needing to be disposed of is urged to participate. And remember, anyone who applies pesticides for the production of agriculture products in the state of Texas is eligible. -GP-
