

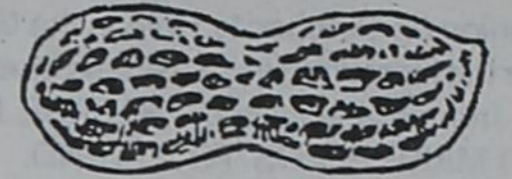

Kimmy is very excited about this contest and would like to say "Thank You" to everyone who bought tickets from her.

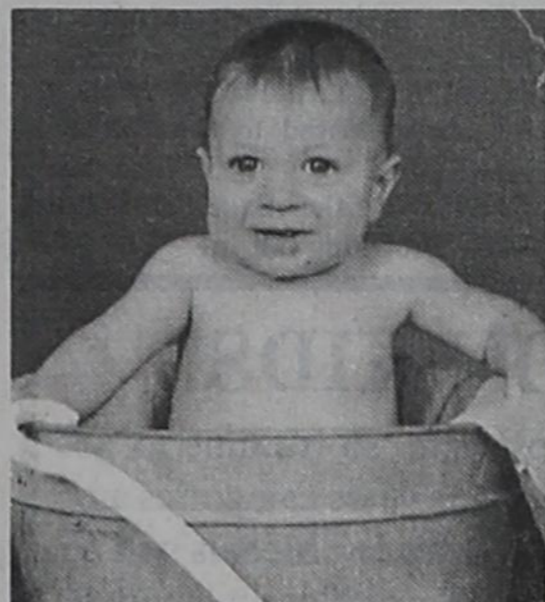


BRITTNEY SMITH

I like to dance, and play ball. My favorite foods are ice cream and cookies.

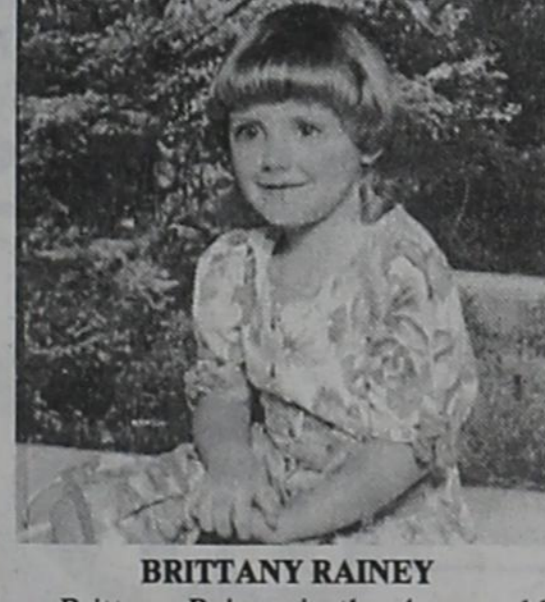

The Gorman Panthers opened their season at Brogdon Field on Friday night when they hosted the Baird Bears, and came out on the short end of a 12-0 score.

The Panthers just couldn't seem to get a sustained drive together, and couldn't penetrate the Baird defense for a score, although they did accumulate 190 yards on 43 carries. The Panther offense just had trouble all evening moving the ball as the blocking schemes just didn't work for the Big Red front line. Don Mauney did get loose on some good runs, but the Panther offense just couldn't muster a scoring drive.

The Bears got on the scoreboard with 10:56 left in the second period after neither team could manage a score in the first period. Rusyt Crane got the Bears on the scoreboard with a nifty 35 yard jaunt up the middle for the score. The kick for point failed and the Bears led 6-0.

Then after the Bears kicked off to the anthers, the Baird defense held the Panthers and forced a punt from the Gorman 38. The Baird return man, Donny Boyd caught the punt on the Baird 35 yard line, and after breaking several tries by the Panther defense to stop him, he broke loose near the Gorman 45 and raced into the end zone for the score with 8:12 left in the half. The try for two points failed and the score stood at 12-0.

Neither teams could muster a sustained drive in the remainder of the first half and the halftime score stood at 12-0.

The Panther Marching Band did a great job with their performance at halftime, as did the Baird Band. Both bands received standing ovations from the fans.

In the second half the teams exchanged one possession after another, but just could not get any scoring drives in motion the rest of the game. The Panthers did move to the Baird 10 at one point and the Bears moved to the Gorman 4 before the Panther defense intercepted a Bear pass.

It's the time of year when many brides-to-be are busy with a list of "things to do" before their wedding. The Social Security Administration (SSA) would like them to add one important, but easily managed item, to that list.

"If you're going to change your name when you marry, remember to tell Social Security," says Glyn Hammons, manager of the Abilene Social Security office.

For women who are working, reporting a name change assures that they will receive proper credit for their earnings and, one day, all the Social Security benefits they are due. For women who don't work outside the home, reporting the change will ensure that their Social Security record shows the correct name when the time comes to apply for benefits.

Another important reason to report your change of name is that Internal Revenue Service and SSA records should show the same name and Social Security number. If they don't, your tax refund could be postponed.

"Of course, if a woman continues to use her maiden name after marriage, as many women do today," said Hammons, "they don't need to report the marriage. They just have to be sure to use their maiden name consistently throughout their working years. And if someone should change her mind later, let Social Security know at that time."

To report a name change, call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213, any business day between 7 a. m. and 7 p. m., or call or visit your local Social Security office. You'll need to complete an Application For A Social Security Card and provide either your marriage certificate to verify your old and new names or two documents—one with your maiden name and one with your married name. All documents must be originals or certified copies. The application form lists acceptable documents.

Hammons reminds everyone that the service is free. Don't be misled by any business that offers—for a fee—to complete the paperwork for you. The process is simple and you don't need to pay anyone for a revised Social Security card."

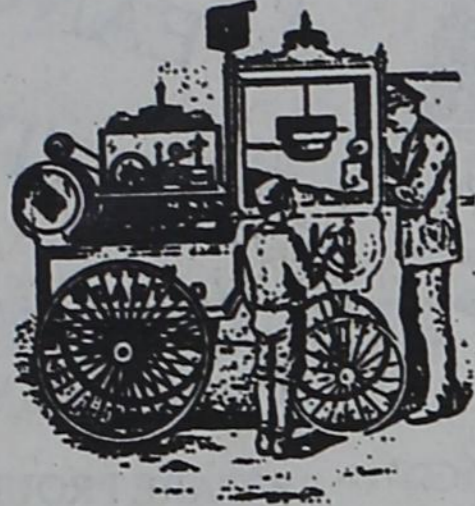

(NAPS)—For safety's sake, in the kitchen or at the grill, remember not to place cooked food on the same plate used for raw meats and poultry; the same rule applies to grilling utensils. You'll risk contracting salmonella, a type of food-borne bacteria that may cause food poisoning.



Grill meat and poultry to the "doneness" stage. Cook red meat to 160°F and poultry to 180°F. Check for "doneness" by using a thermometer, inserting the tip into the thickest part of the meat or poultry.

The usual signs of food poisoning are nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, fever or cramps. Depending on the type of food poisoning, it is sometimes difficult to diagnose and symptoms may appear anywhere from 30 minutes to two weeks after ingestion of the bacteria.

The United States Department of Agriculture's Recommended Safe Food Handling Practices suggest you "clean surfaces and hands after touching (raw) food products" as one of its guidelines. However, water and soap are not effective in killing salmonella. 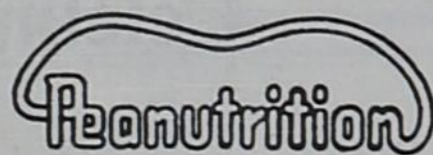

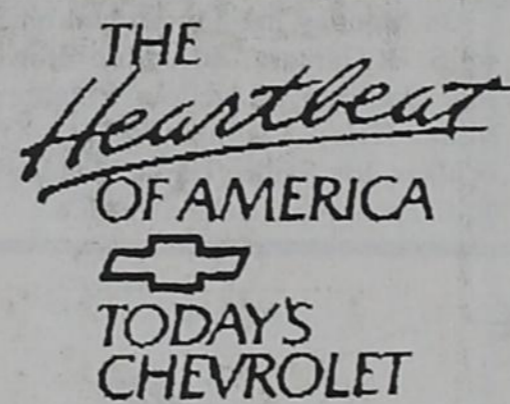

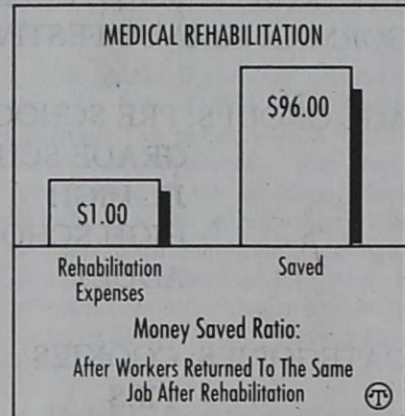
