FEED SOURCE - Costal Bermuda Grass Hay - tested at 8% crude protein; Native pasture assume 2.5% crude protein.

FEEDING SUGGESTIONS - This cow would have to eat 35 pounds of native pasture to meet her protein requirements; This cow would have to eat 11 pounds of 8% hay to meet her protein requirements, however you're short 19 pounds on energy requirements because her total intake should be 30 pounds. Does your native pasture have the ability to meet the 19 pounds per day?

Next example:

COW - Same Cow FEED SOURCE - Native Pasture 2.5%

protein; 20% range cubes; This cow would require 1 pound of 20% cubes if your pasture can supply 27-29 pounds of native pasture ... (that's a lot of pasture).

Now let's look at the input cost: 8% Coastal Hay - value \$50/Ton = .025cents/lb.; Total pounds of protein per ton = 160 = .31 cents/lb. of protein; 20% range cubes @ \$180/Ton = .09 cents/lb.; Total pounds of protein per ton = 400 = .45 cents/lb of protein.

Producers should determine their available native pasture, plug in the gregnancy/lactation stage requirements, explore available feed sources and cost, then determine what the most economical source of wintering cows will be in their situation.

Method
