Jeffrey M. Yancey Service Aboard the USS Truxtun

June 23 (FHTNC) — Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Jeffrey M. Yancey, a 1988 graduate of De Leon High School, is currently deployed aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Truxtun, homeported in Bremerton, Wash., and is midway through a six-month deployment to the Western Pacific and Persian Gulf as part of the aircraft carrier USS Nimitz Battle Group.

During the deployment, the battle group has participated in Operation Southern Watch, enforcing the United Nations-imposed "no-fly" zone over Southern Iraq, as well as in numerous naval air and surface training exercises with armed forces from Thailand, Malaysia and Singapore.

Yancey has visited Jeddah, Saudi Arabia and Melbourne, Australia.

USS Truxtun was the first nuclear-powered surface ship to visit Melbourne in nearly 15 years. While there, the crew enjoyed the city's Moomba Festival, a Mardi-Gras-like celebration.

Nuclear-powered, guided missile cruisers such as USS Truxtun are multi-mission surface combatants capable of supporting carrier or battleship battle groups and amphibious forces. They are capable of operating independently or as flagships for surface action groups.

The deployment exemplifies the new Navy and Marine Corps policy, entitled "...From the Sea," in which, on short notice, U. S. forces are poised to respond to crises in distant lands, from the sea.

Dr. Betty S. Heathington, Director of the Office of Field Studies since 1985 for the University of Tennessee-Knoxville, retired at the end of the fall 1992 semester. She had been with the College of Education for 17 years. Prior to her work with the Office of Field Studies, Dr. Heathington had worked in the Bureau of Educational Research and Service, with a two-year leave of absence in 1978-80, during which she taught reading in the Reading Center at the University of Maryland.

Dr. Heathington has gained national recognition for her work in the field of reading. Recently, she was elected president-elect of the College Reading Association (CRA). In November of 1990, she received the CRA outstanding service award for her work in the organization. She has served as chair of the CRA research commission, an elected member of the Board of Directors, and as CRA Executive Secretary. Dr. Heathington regularly has presented papers at state, regional, and national conferences in the areas of field studies and reading. She has contributed to scholarly journals and written textbooks in the field of reading.

Dr. Heathington has spent 26 years working in the field of education. Prior to joining UTK, she taught in the public schools in Austin, Texas; Wilmette, Illinois; and West Lafayette, Indiana. She received the B.S. degree from the University of Texas-Austin, the M.S. from Purdue University, and the Ed. D. from UTK.

Although she has retired from the University, Dr. Heathington has plans to keep busy. She will join the firm she and her husband own to work full-time. She will continue to reside in Knoxville, but her work with the firm will involve travel throughout yr United States.

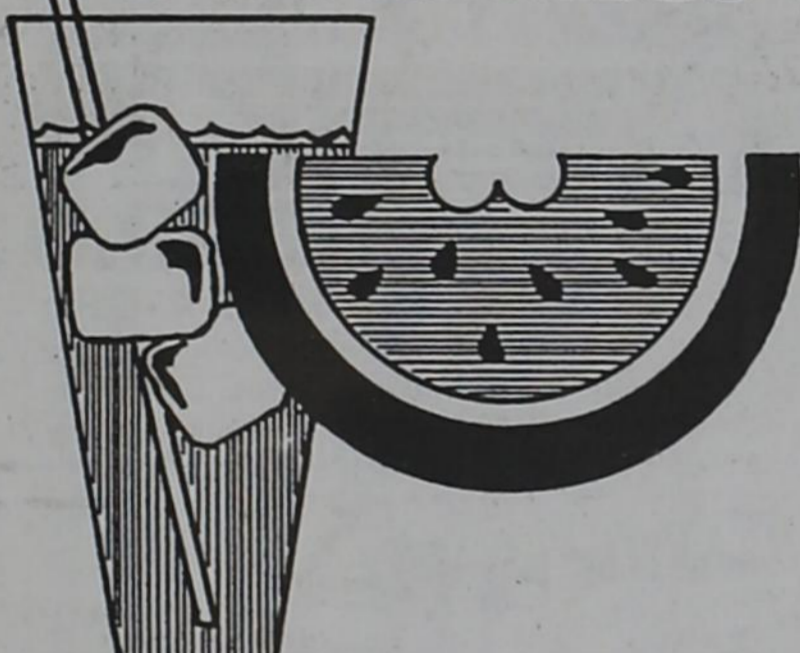

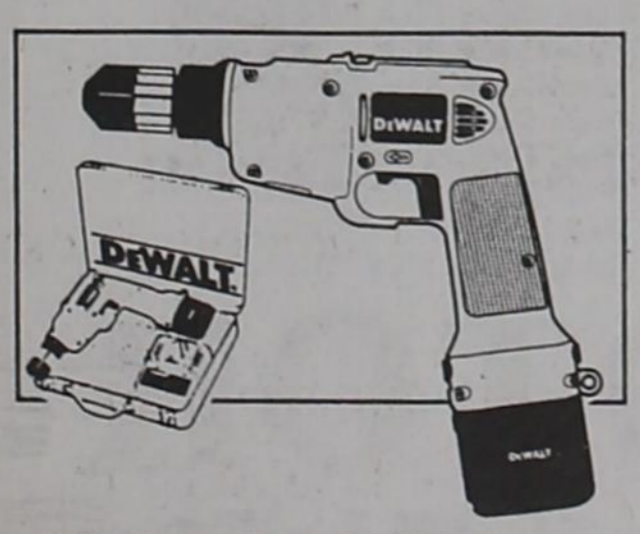

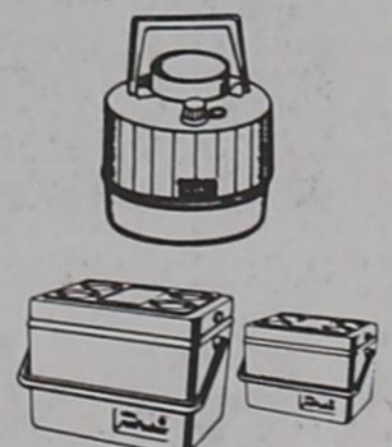
