Conserve Water


As everyone is very aware, the lack of rain can really take its toll. We have, however, received some rain in our area in the last few weeks. The City Commission has agreed that it would be a good idea for the citizens of Gorman to try and voluntarily save and conserve water.

Try to do things such as repair leaky faucets and commodes. Fix outside hydrants that leak. Always be sure that after flushing the commode, that it stops running. Try when possible to take a quick shower instead of a bath. If you have to water your yard, try to do so during cooler hours of the morning or evening and maybe when the wind is not too high.

This will not only help to conserve water, but it will also help the looks of

your bill. The City will try and publish some

conserving tips each week. WATER WASTED IN ONE MONTH FROM LEAKS



to check for invisible or unnoticed leaks. Turn off all water outlets and water-using appliances. Read the dial on the water meter and record the reading. After 15 to 20 minutes, recheck the meter. If no water has been used and the reading has changed, a leak is occurring somewhere in the plumbing system. The services of a plumber or trained water utility employee are often required to locate and fix these invisible leaks. The water meter is often located along the property line near the street.
