

Panthers Travel To Baird After Loss To Wildcats

The Gorman Panthers suffered their fifth loss of the season on Friday night when they hosted the Wildcats of Rising Star in a District 13A game. The Wildcats jumped out to a 6-0 margin on their first drive and increased their lead to 26-6 at halftime, then added another 12 points in the final two quarters for a 38 to 14 victory.

The Wildcats scored first with 7:09 left in the first quarter on a 2 yard run by Aaron Long to cap a 63 yard drive in 8 plays. The kick for point failed and the Cats led 6-0.

Then on their next possession the Cats started on their own 39 and went the distance in just 5 plays with Michael Perales getting the final 2 yards on a run with 3:35 left in the first. A pass to Horton added the two pointer and the score was 14-0.

After receiving the kickoff the Panthers started a drive on their own 22 and moved the distance in 8 plays with Jeremy Sanders rambling 32 yards for the touchdown on a fourthand-one play as time ran out in the first quarter. The kick failed and the score was 14-6.

But on the following possession the Wildcats got a quick touchdown as Aaron Long took the handoff on the first play and raced 66 yards for the score with 11:37 left in the second. The kick for point failed and the Ctas led 20 to 6.

The Wildcats scored again with 5:05 left in the first half when Makey Elliott broke loose for 34 yards and the TD to cap an 84 yard drive in 6 plays. The pass try for two points failed and the halftime score was 26

The Panther Marching Band presented a very fine performance at the intermission. The Wildcat Band also peformed well during the halftime

The game was played on fairly even terms until the 3:35 mark of the fourth period when Chris DeLong capped a 68 yard drive in 7 plays with a 2 yard run for the TD. A pass try for two points failed and the score was 32-6.

The Widlcats hit the scoreboard again with 1:55 left in the game when Michael Perales got loose again for 25 yards and the touch-

down. The kick for point after failed and the score was 38-6.

But the Panthers came back with just 5 seconds left and scored on a beautiful 27 yards pass play from Scotty Walton to Marco Herrera. Another pass play added the twopointer when Chuy Patel caught the pass in the end zone to make the final score 38-14. The drive covered 78 yards in 10 plays.

The Panthers got the ball back on the following kickoff, but only had time for one pass completion for 16 yards as time ran out.

Don Mauney led the Panthers with 113 yards on 19 carries. Jeremy Sanders had 70 yards on 19 tries.

Marco Herrera had 21 yards on 4 carries. Scotty Walton got 12 on 8 keepers.


Don Mauney was named as Player of the Week for his outstanding offensive play and his defensive effort. Noah Landa also took top honors with 16 tackles, one interception and two pressures on the quarterback.

The Panthers will have a real battle this Friday night as they take on the District favorite Baird Bears at Baird at 7:30 p. m. The Bears are 4-0 overall and 1-0 in district and the Panthers will have to have their best effort of the season to handle the strong Bear offense.


