Landers said ranchers saving grass no to burn can decide next winter whether it's more important to use grass as feed or to use it for range improvement fuel.
"If a rancher determines he will burn, and he has the grass fuel to carry the fire then he must wait until to his situation are met," said Landers. "That's why professionals indfield prefer to call the practice "prefield prefer to call the practice "prescribed burning'
The precise weather conditons Landers referred to deal with direction and speed of wind, expected air temperature, aid humidity and soil moisture. Only when the prescribed conditions are met will the fire be started. Procedures to be followed depend on a fire plan made before hand. Included in the plan is a specifis arrangements that must be specific arrangements unat must made at the time of the burn.
"For anyone burning pastures for the first time on purpose, it can be a
fearful process," saidLanders. "With fearfulprocess," said Landers. "With
experience, much of the fear can be removed, making fire a very useful and often costeffective tool for range
improvement."
