Kendra Roberts and Pam Osborne CompeteAt Stock Show






Deer Season Opens November 5th In Eastland County

Landowners and hunters are reminded that the general deer hunting season in Eastland County will open Saturday, November 5th and run through January 1, 1995. The bag limit is 3 deer, limit 1 buck and 2 anterless. No special permits are required for harvesting anterless deer, however, both bucks and anterless deer must be tagged with the appropriate tag from a valid hunting

Deer populations vary from area to area and from ranch to ranch. The either sex regulation allows the landowner the felxibility to harvest deer on his property at the proper rates. It does not automatically mean that a beavy harvest of anterless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates og both anterless deer and buck deer, as provided by the department, should be used only as a general guideline for harvesting deer. If more intense management of a place is desired, we suggest that the landowner should survey deer populations on his ranch on his own; this will allow him to get a more accurate representation of the deer found on his ranch. Please notice that in most cases the deaprtment recommends more anterless deer to be harvested than bucks.

The recommended guideline for harvesting anterless deer throughout most of Eastland County is 1 anterless deer per 200 acres. The recommended bick harvest for the county is 1 mature buck per 400 acres.

LOWER BEEF CATTLE WINTER FEED COSTS

Cattlemen should see lower prices for supplemental feeds for wintering cows. The USDA is forecasting the national corn price to be between \$2 and \$2.40 per bushel. This compares with an average national price of \$2.53 per bushel for last year's crop. The soybean crop is thought to be a record crop. USDA estimates the national soybean meal price will be between \$155 and \$175 per ton. The average national price for soybean meal last year was \$193 per ton. Cotton seed is also expected to be in large supply. USDA thinks it will sell nationally for about \$135 a ton compared to \$165 a ton last year.

While these feed ingredients should be lower in prices this year, other costs are involved in manufacturing, transporting and supplying supplemental feeds to cattlemen. Thus, reductions in feed prices will not likely be proportional to decreases in feed ingredient prices. Also, local demand and supply conditions may prevent feed priced from falling as much as might be expected.

Area cattlemen should find feed prices lower this year. If they do not, they should investigate why the prices offered are not lower than last year. Cattlemen may need to look at alternative feed suppliers if prices are too high.


Whereas, the impact of domestic violence is wide ranging directly affecting women and children and society as a whole, and
