

Property Tax Request And Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a

exemptions that may apply to you cancellation of agricultural appraisal

whether your property is taxable . which local governments should be taxing

your property; or . you think the appearisal district has done

Informal Review: Contact the appraisal district staff at 817-629-8597 in Eastland, Texas for an informal review.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have

your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. NOTE: You should not try

to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The

law requires you to sign an affidavit saying that

you haven't done so before the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$ 1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the Chief Appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

> DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB

(the deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend

On or before May 31 (or 30 days Usual Deadline: after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later.)

Late Protests: (If you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control like a medical energency. The ARB decides

whether you have good cause.

Before the day the appraisal review board approves records for the year.Contact the appealsal district for more information.

Special Deadlines:

Change of use (if the appraisal district has informed you that you are losing agricultural appealsal because you changed the use of your land)

Before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

ARB changes (if the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed).

Before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delimpent (usually Rebrusry 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was medled to you.



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WHAT SHOULD I BE DOING **RIGHT NOW?**

This is the universal question among producers of agriculture products wheather it be on a commercial basis or homeowner. Let me address a few of the more common areas the Eastland County residents inquire

PECANS: Use zinc fertilizers incorporate a fungicide such as Bendate with the zinc and sopray on the foliage. All pecan trees need zinc to prevent rosetting (short internodal growth) and maintain healthy leaf and limb production. Scab has not been a problem in the county until recently. Why? Wet warm weather over the past three years. I suspect a large scab problem this year. Use the fungicide mentioned to prevent scab. Spray every 10 days to 2 weeks during wet periods.

PEACHES: My leaves are curling up and dying, what's wrong? and What can I do? Peach leaf curl is affecting nearly every tree in the county. It is characterized by curling, thickening and puckering of the leaf surface. It usually starts as a green color, thin yellow and finally purple. Once your tree has it this year, control in impossible. However, this fall you can help your tree to prevent the disease by applying a copper fungicide just at leaf shed. Kocide 101 is a popular copper fingicide product.

CATTLE: De-worm and de-lice. Worm larvae hatch in the spring. Cattle pick them up during their eating of forage and then they (the worms) go to work ingesting tissue in the animal's body causing weight reduction and nutrient problems. Cows and calves should be wormed around the first of May and then again in mid-to-late November for optimum results.
