



TAAS and TEAMS Test To Be Taken July 13 - 15

The TAAS and TEAMS tests will be offered this summer at Gorman High School. By state law, students must pass all sections of this test in order to receive a high school diploma. Students who are currently enrolled in Gorman High School do not need to register for this test.

However, anyone in the community who has completed all graduation requirements except for passing the TEAMS or TAAS may take these tests to try to earn their high school diploma. A person only has to take that portion of the test that he or she did not pass in high school. Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and wish to retake a portion of the TAAS or TEAMS may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus. In Gorman, the contact person is Linda Glover.

BIBLE BONDAGE

For many religious people Bible study is a lifeless duty that is a struggle to maintain on a consistent basis. This is because many unconsciously treat Bible study as a work to be accomplished in their striving to please God. How many times have earnest Christians heard themselves say something like, "I know I ought to read my Bible more. If I were a better Christian I suppose I would"? Sadly, what God intended to give life has become unproductive (2 Cor. 3:6). Many religious people believe the Bible is the most important book in the world, yet they seldom read it for more than 2 or 3 minutes at a time and find it to be unhelpful even then. Honest Bible readers will admit that this has often been true. Why is this frequently our experience with God's Word?

Jesus plainly addressed this problem in John 5:37-40. Speaking of the Father, Jesus said to the Bible teachers of his day, "...You have never heard his voice no seen his form, nor does his word dwell in you, for you do not believe the one he sent (Jesus). You diligently study the Scriptures because you think that by them you possess eternal life. These are the Scriptures that testify about me, yet you refuse to come to me to have life"



OPTIONS FOR HEALTH Borderline Personality Disorder: What is it?

• My daughter has been diagnosed with borderline personality disorder. Can this disorder be treated with medication?

A Borderline personality disorder is one of twelve types of personality disorders. It is diagnosed in early adulthood and may involve a variety of symptomatic behaviors including: intense and unstable interpersonal relationships, mood swings, depression, instability, and irritability or anxiety usually lasting a few hours or a few days. People who have borderline personality disorder tend to be impulsive and may engage in activities that are potentially self-damaging such as shopping sprees, reckless driving or shoplifting. Recurrent suicidal threats, gestures or self-mutilating behavior is common in the more severe forms.

There is no specific medication for a borderline personality disorder. Medication is prescribed for specific symptoms of the disorder. If the borderline patient is intensely anxious, a medication for anxiety may be useful. If a borderline patient is significantly depressed, then an antidepressant may be beneficial

In addition to medication for symptoms, psychotherapy is often helpful. This may be individual or group psychotherapy.

Because of the numerous different symptoms that a borderline personality disorder patient may have, their loved ones are frequently at a loss as to what to do. It may be helpful for family members to obtain some brief counseling to help them understand the ramifications of the diagnosis of a borderline personality disorder and to help them deal with it.
