For many religious people Bible study is a lifeless duty that is a struggle to maintain on a consistent basis. This is because many unconsciously treat
Bible study as a work to be accomplished in their striving to please God. How many times have earnest Christians heard themselves say someching like, "I know I wught to read my Bible more. These are the Scriptures that testify about me, yet you refuse to come to me to have life" Jesus reveals a startling fact that is true in every generation: it is possible to make an idol out of the Scriptures and in doing so to be totally blind to presence of Christ in your day. They had unconsciously leamed from their fathers how to use the Scriptures to manipulate, control, and alienate people.
The worst bondage in the world is not outward immorality but inward hypocrisy. Most prostitutes know that what they are doing is immoral. However, religious hypocrites are blind to their vain worship and empty hearts. Religious chains are often the hardest to break because they are so hard for the one in bondage to recognize.I I believe the Scriptures are the inspired, written word of God. However,
I must assure you that it is possible to pnow a lot about "he "Book of the without knowing the "Lord of the Book"! Let me use an example. I could memorize every book written about Abraham Lincoln and pattern my lifestyle after his philosophy of life and principles-but it still wouldn't change the fact that I never knew the man. Q:- My daugbter bas been atiagnosed with borderline personality disorder. Can
this disorder be treated with medication?

## A:

- Borderline peronality disorder is one of twelve types of personality disorders. It is diagnosed in early adulthood and may involve a variety of symptomatic behaviors including: intense and unstable interpersonal relationships, mood swings,
depression, instability, and ir depression, instability, and ir
ritability or anxiety usually ritability or anxiety usually
lasting a few hours or a few lasting
days.
People who have borderline personality disorder tend to be impulsive and may engage in activities that are potentially self-damaging such as shopping sprees, reckless driving or shoplifting. Recurrent suicidal threats, gestures or self-mutilating behavior is commo

There is no specific medica tion for a borderline per-
sonality disorder. Medication sonality disorder. Medication is prescribed for specific symptoms of the disorder. If sely anxious, a medication for anxiety may be useful. If a borderline patient is sig. nificantly depressed, then an antidepressant may be benef antide
cial.
In a

In addition to medication for symptoms, psychotherapy is often helpful. This may be individual or group psychotherapy. Because of the numerous derline personality disorder patient may have, their loved ones are frequently at a loss as to what to do. It may be helpful for family members to obtain some brief counseling to help them understand the ramifications of the diagnosis of a borderline personality dis order and to help them deal with it.
