

average federal support price for 1993-crop quota peanuts of \$373.87 per ton for Virginia peanuts and for Valencia peanuts produced in the Southwest that are suitable for cleaning and roasting; \$678.57 per ton for Runner peanuts; and \$629.98 per ton for Spanish peanuts and all other Valencia peanuts.

"The price support for 1993-crop additional peanuts will be 19.42 percent of the applicable quota rate," David Martin, County Executive Director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. He said that this factor represents the ratio of the \$131.09 per ton national support level for additional peanuts to the \$674.93 per ton national support level for quota peanuts.

David said the method of computing the different price support levels is the same as for the 1992 crop. The actual support level for an individual lot of peanuts depends on the percent of the various sizes or kernels in each ton and on other

factors, he explained. For each percent of sound mature and sound split kernels, the support level per ton for quota peanuts is: Virginia, \$9.740; Runner, \$9.549; Spanish, \$9.501; Valencia in the Southwest suitable for cleaning and roasting, \$10.133; and all other Valencies, \$9.501.

Peanut growers produced about 2.14 million tons of peanuts last year. Approximately 71.0 tons went under quota price support loan and 147.1 tons under additional price support loan. Generally, quota peanuts are those peanuts within the farm's poundage quota that are mandated for domestic edible use or retained for use on the farm, Martin explained. Additional peanuts are peanuts that are placed under price support loan at the price support rate for additional peanuts or are marketed through an approved contract for exporting or crushing. "Generally, additional peanuts are peanuts that are produced in excess of a farm's poundage quota, the ASCS official

Childhood diseases are alive and well in Texas! Retrospective surveys of kindergarten records revealed that, on an average, only 42 percent of preschool children in North Central Texas are properly immunized. The Texas Department of Healt (TDH) is encouraging parents of preschool children to get their children immunized. TDH's Eastland County Public Health Clinic staff will hold a special immunization clinic at the Senior Citizens Center in Gorman on June 17th fro, 2 to 4 p. m.

Susie Thomas with the Texas Department of Public Health in Eastland said, "One of the reasons for the low levels of immunizations among preschoolers is that many parents only immunize their children as required by law, before they start to school. The recurring measles outbreaks in the state since 1988 just underscore the tragic consequences of incomplete vaccinations. We now have numerous insufficiently immunized or non-immunized children--all of whom are now vulnerable to infection."

Local physicians or the Texas Department of Healths Public Health Clinic in Eastland County are ideal sources of information and guidance on recommended immunizations for any age group. 
