The Gorman Panthers traveled to Evant on Friday night for a battle with the Elks and were edged 21 to 20 in a wonderful game. After getting behind 21 to 6 at halftime the Panthers came back with some fine play in the third quarter, scoring 14 points, but failed to make the two point play that would have won the ball game.

The Elks scored on their first possession, going 85 yards in 9 plays with Robert Krueger scoring from 5 yards out with 6:32 left in the quarter. Chad Horton kicked the point after and Evant led 7-0.

After a change of possession by each club, the Panthers got the ball on the Elk. 49 after a fumble recovery and went the distance in 8 plays with Marco Herrera catching a beautiful pass from Don Mauney for the final 21 yards with 6:51 left in the second period. The point after missed and the score was 7-6.

Following the Panther score the Elks took the ball on their own 46 and moved the distance in 9 plays with Robert Krueger again getting the honors from 6 yards out with 3:02 left in the half. Horton added the point after and the score was 14-6.

On their next possession the Elks hit the scoreboard again, going 60 yards in 4 plays with Michael Doyle scoring from 10 yards out on a pass with just 20 seconds left. Horton again added the point after and the score stood at 21-6 at the intermission.

The Panther Marching Band put on a very great halftime performance of the Band Contest routine to be performed at the Glen Rose Band Contest on Saturday, October 23rd. It was a great performance and the band really received great applause from the crowd. It must have been exceptional, as the band received a Number One score in the band contest.

The Panthers came out ready to play as they took the ball on the Elk 31 and scored in 8 plays with Marco Herrera getting the final 21 yards on a beautiful pass play from Don Mauney for 21 yards with 6:25 to play. Don Mauney scored the two point play on a keeper and the score stood at 21 to 14.

Then after holding the Elks on the next possession, the Panthers took the ball on the Elk 32 following an interception by Mauney and scored in 8 plays with Jeremy Sanders getting the final 2 yards with 3:52 left in the third quarter. The try for two points and a go-ahead score failed and the Panthers trailed 21 to 20. The rest of the ball game was played on fairly even terms, but neither team could score and the final count was 21 to 20 with the Elks winning the District 13A contest. There was never a question about the Panthers going for the two point play to win, as they lined up following the score and ran a wide play to their right, but Mauney came up a little short on the run.

Don Mauney led the Panthers on the ground with 118 yards on 13 carries. Jeremy Sanders got 26 on 13 tries. Scotty Walton had 26 on 4 keepers before leaving the game.

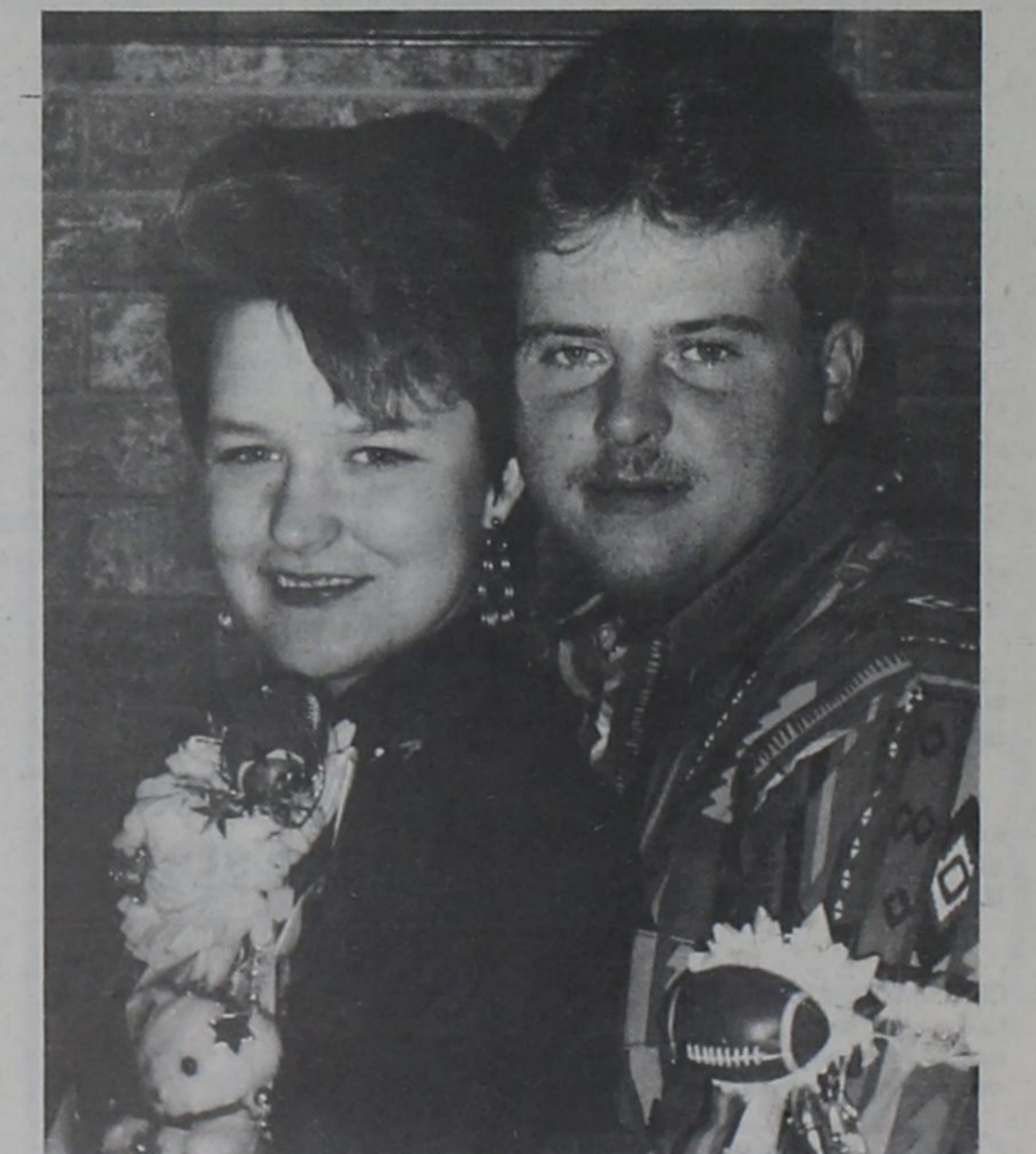

Workshops Slated

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service and the Texas Extension Education Foundation, Inc., is once again offering the Tax Practitioner Workshops across the state of Texas, in the Fall of 1993. These workshops are led by CPA's and attorneys who are experienced in the field of income tax reporting and planning. They provide valuable continuing education opportunities for tax professionals seeking CPE and MCLE credit.

This year twenty-four General Tax Workshops, designed for practitioners who work mostly with individuals and small business, are offered in major Texas cities. The nearest one will be Stephenville on November 18th and 19th at the Holiday Inn. Fourteen Advanced Tax Workshops are also offered. They are directed at the practitioner with substantial experience with individual returns, who does some business work, and feels the need to develop more skills in business related work. One will be offered in Abilene on November 29th and 30th.

In addition to the General and Advanced Workshops, there will be four of the Estate Planning Workshops, and three each of the Fiduciary Income Tax and Agricultural Tax Problems Workshops. A new workshop for 1993 will be the Forestry Taxation Workshop held in Nacagdoches and Longview.

Sen. Jane Nelson To Speak In Eastland Nov. 1

State Senator Jane Nelson will be in Eastland on Monday, November 1 at 12 noon at K-Bob's. She will be speaking to a joint meeting of the Eastland Rotary, Lions, and Kiwanis Clubs. The public is invited to attend this meeting and hear Senator Nelson's report on the 73rd Legislative Session.

Senator Nelson currently serves on the Criminal Justice, Health and Human Services, and State Affairs Committees of the 73rd Legislature. As part of her service on the Criminal Justice Commission, she was involved in the rewriting of the entire Texas Penal Code. The new code increases prison time for violent offenders, tightens parole procedures, reduces the backlog of prisoners in county jails, and contains other programs designed to keep prisoners from returning to crime.

Fulfilling her campaign promise to be an advocate of limited state government, Senator Nelson was one of only two Senators to oppose the state's new budget which carries a 17 percent increase in spending to a record 70 billion dollars.

Senator Nelson sponsored or co-sponsored some 69 legislative bills during the recent session including those which would ban a state income tax, create term limits for politicians, and lessen the control of the state education agency over the decisions of the local school district.

This is an excellent opportunity for the citizens of Eastland County to meet personally their State Senator and get a firsthand report of what is happening in Austin that will affect all of us in the 22nd Senatorial District.

October (FHTNC) — Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Jeffrey M. While operating in the Persian Gulf, the battle group completed 19 bilateral and multinational exercises with various gulf nations in continuing efforts to develop and strengthen political and military ties with countries of the region.

During this deployment, USS Nimitz's embarked aircraft squadrons flew nearly 3,000 missions in direct support of Operation Southern Watch, enforcing the U. N. "no fly" zone over southern Iraq.

Additionally, the carrier received its second consecutive Admiral Flatley Memorial Award, presented annually to recognize ships which surpass all competitors in overall contributions to aviation safety.

The USS Truxtun is a nuclear-powered cruiser armed with guns, missiles and torpedose. The ship also carries its own helicopter.

Today, American aircraft carriers, their planes and escort ships provide a global presence, standing ready to respond to protracted contingencies at a moment's notice, from the sea.

Texas Peanut Harvest Tour Attracts Major Media

Food writers and editors from national magazines including Woman's World, Ladies' Home Journal and Country Living were among the participants in the first-ever Texas Peanut Harvest Tour October 14 and 15 held in North Central Texas. Representatives from Texas Highways, the Texas Agribusiness network and King Features syndicate as well as several freelance writers also took part.

Deer Hunting Season Opens November 6th

Landowners and hunters are reminded that the general deer hunting season in Eastland County will open Saturday, November 6th and run through January 2, 1994. The bag limit is 3 deer, limit 1 buck and 2 antlerless. No special permits are required for harvesting antlerless deer. However, both bucks and antlerless deer must be tagged with the appropriate tag from a valid hunting license.

Deer population vary from area to area and from ranch to ranch. The either sex regulation allows the landowner the flexibility to harvest deer on his property at the proper rate. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of antlerless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates of both antlerless deer and bucks, as provided by the department, should be used only as a general guideline for harvesting deer. Please notice that in most cases the department recommends more antlerless deer to be harvested.

The recommended guideline for harvesting antlerless deer throughout Eastland County is 1 antlerless deer per 200 acres. A buck harvest of 1 buck per 350 acres is also recommended for the county.

News Briefs From M.D. Anderson

Houston—An improved surgical technique is giving new hope for patients with locally advanced prostate cancer at The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center. The technique is called cryosurgery - a minimally invasive treatment that uses a device to freeze and destroy cancerous tumors. M. D. Anderson uses cryosurgery to treat prostate cancer patients who failed radiation therapy and whose disease has not spread.

Cryosurgery involves a hollow metal tubular device or "cryoprobe" containing super-cooled liquid nitrogen through the skin into a cancerous tumor. After about 15 minutes, the tumor is frozen to -170 F and the device is withdrawn. The body absorbs the dead tissue over time.

Conventional therapies for prostate cancer include surgery, radiation and sometimes chemotherapy. For some patients, the potential complications of a prostatectomy followed by 4-5 weeks' hospitalization outweigh its effectiveness. "With cryosurgery, most patients resume normal activities within 48 hours," said Dr. Douglas Johnson, professor of urology at M. D. Anderson.

In recent years, surgeons have used cryosurgery to treat areas such as the eyes, skin and cervix. Recent technological advances allow the use of ultrasound imaging to more

Stickers To Reduce Thefts Of Autos

Introducing the latest in anti-theft devices from Texas.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is issuing a new vehicle registration sticker -- for replacement inside windshields instead of outside on license plates. The program begins with registrations expiring January 1994.

The sticker is larger and of a different design. Its main purpose is to deter theft -- bringing up another important feature.

If the sticker is peeled off the windshield, the word "VOID" appears on it, making it a useless scrap of paper. It's not even worth stealing.

In 1992, 568,885 replacement license plates and stickers were issued. TxDOT estimates that 60 percent of replacement stickers issued were due to theft. At \$5.30 per replacement, replacing the stickers cost the public \$1.8 million and a lot of time and aggravation.

"When the word goes out that these stickers are useless when

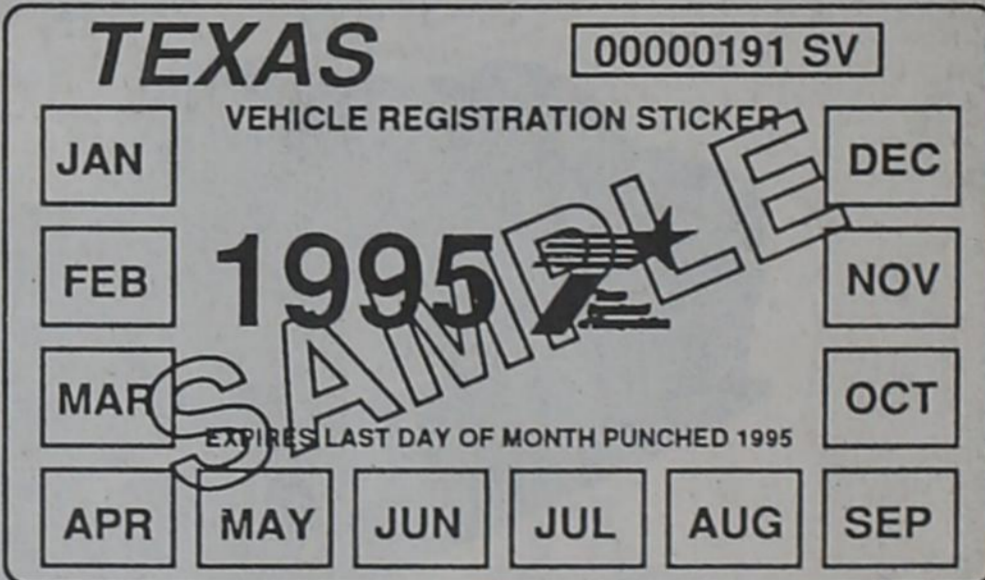

peeled off the glass, incidence of stolen stickers will drop quickly, as will the cost of replacing stolen stickers," said Jerry Dike, director of TxDOT's Division of Motor Vehicle Titles and Registration. "But the savings don't stop there. If all stolen stickers were used on vehicles that would otherwise be legally registered, state and county revenue losses could exceed \$17 million. Recouping these losses could mean savings passed on for use on other projects." The 72nd Texas Legislature passed a law in 1991 mandating the sticker change to lower vehicle registration theft. Drivers whose stickers have no windshield will continue using the license plate stickers.



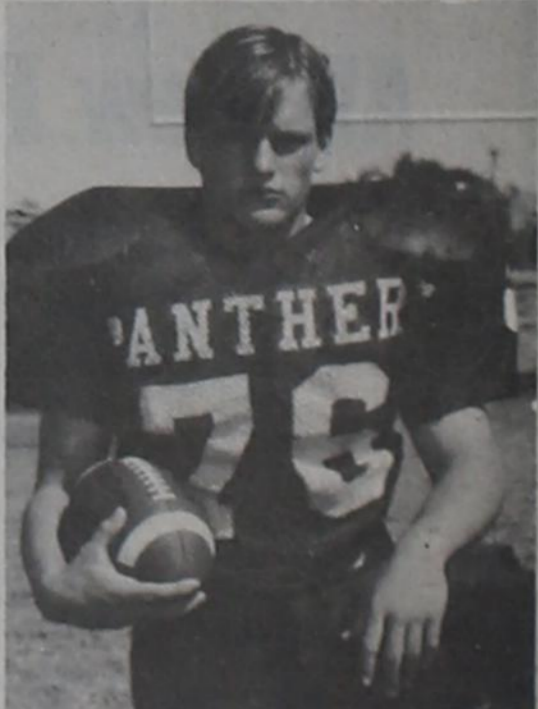
