Gorman Sales Tax Up 8.35 Percent

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered a total of \$212.5 million in February in sales tax rebates to 1,071 Texas cities.

City of Gorman has received \$6,252.36 in the 1993 payment to date, up 8.35 percent over the 1992 report.

Eastland received \$73,501.61 for the same period, up 21.15 percent from the same period in 1992. Carbon received \$849.08, down 18.17 percent. Ranger received \$27,770.72, up 76.38 percent. Cisco received \$28,187.85, down 2.16 percent, with Rising Star receiving \$3,609.54, up 11.29 percent from the 1992 period.

in the middle of Gorman's main street on a Saturday morning. However, the silence is even more deafening being tucked away in the middle of this mesquite- and oak-dotted land seven miles from civilization.

You seem all alone because you take a farm-tomarket road out of Gorman, turn and travel on a dirt road for a few miles, go over a low-water crossing, truck on and then turn at the gate. You still have to wind your way on a pasture trail before you reach the middle of the place.

After settling in the homemade cabin, I walked out on the front porch and marveled at the natural beauty. A high, blue sky; a mammoth cottonwood tree; a thick stand of shady oaks; a small creek babbling over scores of rocks.

No wonder the Comanche Indians thrived in this part of the country. A sidenote about the Indians: A bloody battle occurred in 1864 about three miles northeast of Gorman. Twelve scouts from a frontier military company were attacked by Indians and took refuge in a nearby cabin. The commander and another white man were killed, and three others were wounded, including James Madison Ellison who was the first settler in that part of Eastland County.

Meanwhile, back at the ranch. Of course, there is man-made beauty too. A warm, wood-burning stove; a wooden porch swing; several barbecue cookers; a piece of PVC dug in the ground for a washers game; a huge 42 table and chairs.

There's also history. Other than Indian artifacts, there's an old abandoned water well under a giant live oak tree that has spreading branches almost touching the ground. You have to duck under the branches to reach the huge trunk of the tree. You feel like you're in a large tent. The thick branches provide enough shade where you could set up a few chairs and watch a slide

An oldtimer says the well was used decades ago by a nearby country school, now only a memory. School kids, he said, would quickly volunteer to fetch some water because the well was a pretty good walk away, and it took a considerable amount of time to go and come back--especially on a warm spring day.

Let's see. Barring some raised voices at that 42 table, I heard the following that day:

A red-tailed hawk's cry.

■Wind barely whistling through the oaks. ■My lure splashing on the surface of a small

My breathing.

■Broom weeds crunching under my feet. The brushing of sand from flint in trying to find an Indian arrowhead.

■Mesquite crackling from a fire built for ■The sudden fluttering of a covey of quail.

■A distant turkey's gobble. Ducks' wings flapping during takeoff from

It's enough to wake up the senses.



Supreme Court, or answering requests from attorneys, Congressmen, and other policy makers for counsel on proposed legislation, David's ultimate goal is that, as a nation, we can once again say that we are "one nation under God."

CONTAINERS RECYCLED, pesticides collected during march

Farmers and ranchers in Texas may voluntarily dispose of unwanted or unusable agricultural pesticides and chemicals and recycle empty pesticide containers at three sites during March.

There is no charge and no questions will be asked at these collection days held on March 16th in Beaumont, on March 22 in Plainview and on March 26 in Dumas. Sponsors are the Texas Water Commission, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Department of Agri-

Pesticides and rinsed containers will be accepted from 8 a. m. until 3 p. m. at the Jefferson County Airport in Beaumont, the Ollie Liner Center in Plainview, and at the Dumas Municipal Landfill in Dumas.

The chemicals that will be accepted are harbicides, insecticides, nematicides, fungicides, seed treatments rodenticides, bactericides, growth regulators, harvest aid chemicals, livestock pesticides, and other miscellaneous pesticides or herbicides.

Not accepted will be fertilizers, treated seed, waste oil, petroleum products, paints and solvents, herbicides containing 2, 4, 5-T or Silvex, pesticides and wood preservatives containing Penthacholorphenol, or

Containers to be recycled must be tripled rinsed or high-pressure rinsed. Metal and plastic containers only will be accepted.

During the first pesticide collection program in the spring of 1990, more than 27 tons of unwanted pesticides were collected from a 37-county area of West Texas.

All eligible waste chemicals will be examined at the collection sites and then transported to permitted hazard ous waste disposal facility.

PASTURES NOTES People generally do not understand the importance of managing their nativegrass pastures during the winter. Most people think they can use all of the dry standing forage in the pasture during winter months. For the most part this is true; however, they should determine what is needed for ground cover and

standing forage in the pasture. When pasture managers use the word "available" in a grazing sense, they do not mean everything clear down to the soil surface. This is true no matter what time of the year the

realize the rest is available dry

grazing is to occur. Care should be taken during the winter grazing season just as it should during the spring and summer. The type of management you impose on your pastures during the winter can have profound effects on the next growing season or seasons.

Native grasses are tough and can withstand some abuse for short and infrewuent periods. Over-utilized native range (table top slick) through the winter months can be detrimental to the grasses. This exposes the soil for next season's weed problems. When the grass is completely removed (down to soil surface) the crowns (the grass's growing point) remain exposed to the weather. During extremely cold weather, especially for extended periods, these crowns can freeze and the result is a dead plant. This opens up new


