



Navy Petty Officer 2nd Class Bryan D. Majors, son of Charley D. Majors of Route 3, Gorman, recently participated in an historical decommissioning ceremony while serving as one of final crew members of the 38-year old aircraft carrie USS Saratoga.

Majors was one of more than 2,000 Sailors and Marines who took part in the ceremony held in Mayport, Fla., which marked the end of one of the first "super" carriers built after World War

Commissioned April 14, 1956, "Super Sara" patrolled the waters off Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, during the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962, launched countless aircraft against the North Vietnamese in 1972, and played a vital role in the capture of the luxury liner Achille Lauro hijackers in 1985.

More recently, Majors and the crew of the 1,063 foot long aircraft carrier spent two months off the coast of the former Yugoslavia supporting international sanctions in Bosnia-Herzegovina. After leaving the Adriatic Sea, Majors joined ships from 12 other nations for a large-scale exercise in the Eastern Mediterranean.

One of USS Saratoga's most memorable deployments began August 7, 1990, just days after Iraqi tanks invaded Kuwait. "Super Sara" took up station in the Red Sea, and six months later when Operation Desert Shield became Operation Desert Storm, her aircraft began an air campaign against Iraq which would last more than seven

USS Saratoga is just one of many olader Navy ships being decommissioned. They are being replaced by




















RESCHEDULED

This year's elections for position on the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, which were to be held in December, are being rescheduled to accommodate changes brought on with last months's enactment of the law to reorganize the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

According to David Martin, County Executive Director, the change in the election scheduled is nationwide and is authorized under regulations issued by USDA. Current members of ASC committee will continue in their posts until the new election is held next fall.

The law, which reorganized USDA, created a new agency--the Farm Service Agency--which encompasses all of the commodity support and basic conservation programs of the former Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS), all of the risk management programs of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), and the farm lending activities of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

Martin said the new committee system, when fully implemented, will exercise increased responsibilities to its enlarged role. "Rescheduling the election on a nationwide basis avoids confusion which could occur from hastily drawn rules and regulations," Martin said, "and will create efficiencies by using funds which would have been spent on this year's election process to be used in training committees in performing their added duties.
