

There will also be a baseball game that afternoon, so make it a nite and get out for a few hours! -GP-







MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authoeducation district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

First Eastland County 8th Grade Career Day Scheduled March 23

School counselors from throughout Eastland County and members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service County Youth Development Council have teamed up to develop the very first eighth grade Career Day. The event is scheduled for March 23rd at Cisco Junior College. Eighth graders from Gorman, Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, Rising Star and Moran will explore career opportunities in seven major areas. the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."



BENEFICIARIES SHOULD REPORT SS EARNINGS BY APRIL 15TH

"If you worked and received Social Security benefits during 1992, you have until April 15, 1993 to report the amount of your 1992 earnings to the Social Security Administration," said Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene. "Anyone whose aernings exceeded the annual earnings limits must file a report. The earnings limits for 1992 were \$10,200 for beneficiaries aged 65-69 and \$7,440 for those under age 65."

Social Security will compare the amount of earnings on your 1992

report with the estimate you provided when you applied for benefits or when you filed last year's earnings report. "Benefits paid in 1992 were based on that estimate," Hammons explained. "If you earned less than you estimated, you may be due additional money; if you made more than you estimated for 1992, you may have to repay some benefits."

People who turned 70 in 1992 only need to report earnings up to the month of their birthday. Self-employed beneficiaries who turned 70 in 1992 should prorate their earnings-that is, total the earnings for the year and divide by 12-and report the prorated amount for the months before their birthday. Those who were 70 or older all year don't have to file a report.

"Filing your Federal income tax return does not take the place of filing your earnings report with Social Security," Hammons emphasized. "And, if you request a filing extension for your Federal income tax return, you do not automatically get an extension on the filing date for your Social Security earnings report. You must request each extension separately."

People who earlier reported they expected to earn more than the 1992 limits were automatically sent a reporting form in late February. Those who didn't get the form should call 1-800-772-1213 business days between 7 a. m. and 7 p. m. to file your report.

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

Open Space Land Valuations Available

The following information is provided owners within Eastland County in compliance with requirements of the State Property Tax Code.

If you are the woner of land that is being currently used for some type of agricultural use, you may qualify for a special valuation of your land for ad valorem tax purposes.

"Qualified Open-Space Land" is defined as land (acreage) that is currently devoted principally to agricultural use to the degree of intensity that is generally accepted in this area and that has been devoted principally to agricultural use for fine (5) of the preceding seven (7) years.

The application must be submitted on a forn provided by the appraisal district and that is prescribed by the Property Tax Division of the State Comptrollers Office. The completed application must contain the information necessary to determine the validity of the application.

To apply for the "Open Space Land" valuation or to inquire about any other special valuation that you may be eligible for, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal Dis-

The filing deadline for this and other available special valuations and/or exemptions is April 30, 1993. TCI Cablevision To Initiate Plans To Improve Cable Service

TCI Cablevision will soon launch the first stages of a technological improvement program that within a few years will bring area cable customers additional television programming options and more services than seemed possible only a short time ago, announced Robert Moore, the system's general manager. The improvements will provide customers with more choice and control over their cable television service, among other benefits.

One of the first choices TCI Cablevision will offer is a reasonably priced, entry level basic cable service, which will become available beginning April 1, 1993. In a second innovation, people who subscribe to the entry level service will be able to purchase premium networks, and other a la carte services without taking additional cable service levels.

Some channels will also be realigned-that is, goven new channel numbers--and several cable networks that are presently part of TCI Cablevision's Basic service level will become part of the system's Expanded Basic level. These changes will also take effect April 1st.

The major changes will take place later in the decade, as Tele-Com-

munications, Inc., TCI Cablevision's parent company, begins pioneering digital transmission of video and data services via state-of-the-art fiber optics. These technological advances could ultimately provide local customers with more than 500 channels and a myraid of choices that range from television networks to information from a wide variety of sources. The headquarters for these advances will be TCI's national digital compression center, to be constructed in the Denver metropoli-

In addition, TCI will partner with others in the undustry to develop standards to ensure that cable service is compatible with homeelectronics equipment, especially technology such as high definition television (HDTV), which is expected to become available in American homes by the end of the 1990s.



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

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
