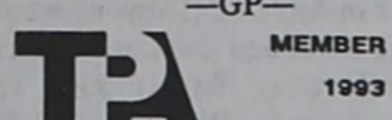


Defensive Driving Course Slated For March 22-24

Henry Grady Hines Laid To Rest On Wednesday at Carbon

Henry Grady Hines, 96, of Eastland, passed away Monday, March 15th in an Eastland nursing home.

Services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at First Baptist Church with the Rev. Harry Grantz and Rick Grant officiating. Burial was in Murray Memorial Cemetery in Carbon, directed by Bakker Funeral Home.

Mr. Hines was born in Bell County and moved to a farm near Carbon in 1905, where he lived until moving to Eastland in 1988. He was a retired farmer and a member of First Baptist Church, where he had been a deacon for 59 years.

Survivors include his wife, Willie Hines of Eastland; two daughters, Arlene McCurry of Eastland and Marjorie Ruth Adair of Richmond; one sister, Ruth Speer of Port Neches; four grandchildren, ten great-grandchildren and a number of nieces and nephews.

First Eastland County 8th Grade Career Day Scheduled March 23

School counselors from throughout Eastland County and members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service County Youth Development Council have teamed up to develop the very first eighth grade Career Day. The event is scheduled for March 23rd at Cisco Junior College. Eighth graders from Gorman, Ranger, Eastland, Cisco, Rising Star and Moran will explore career opportunities in seven major areas. Sessions will be conducted in Business/Managerial; Education; Agriculture; Health; Technical Skills; Public Service; Professional areas.

Shawn Irvine, Youth Specialist with Texas Utilities in Dallas, will be a feature speaker during the opening session. Irvine will discuss "Building You Future" a program he presents to youth throughout the North Central Texas areas. "Preparing for the future is the major objective of our Career Day," according to Davy Vestal, County Extension Agent-Ag Eastland County. By the time they reach high school they need to understand the process of decision making including career choices.

"We're not trying to push youth into making Career Choices early but make decisions on careers and other things based on information obtained," Vestal stated.

By starting at the 8th grade level the Career Day task force hopes to evaluate change in career attitude and direction by the time those 8th graders become seniors.

The program is being sponsored by Cisco Junior College, Dr. Pepper Bottling Co. with coordination between Cisco Junior College Counselor Debra Robinson, Gorman ISD Counselor Linda Glover; Cheryl Simmons from Cisco ISD; Stephanie Snider from Eastland ISD and County Extension Agents Janet Thomas and Davy Vestal.

BankAmerica Completes First Gibraltar Acquisition

Dallas — BankAmerica Corporation announced recently that it has completed the acquisition of certain branches, assets and liabilities of First Gibraltar Bank, FSB, and will begin operating the branches immediately as part of Bank of America Texas, N.A.

The acquisition includes approximately \$7 billion of deposits and 130 branches. Bank of America Texas previously had 130 branches and deposits of \$3.1 billion. The addition of First Gibraltar's operation makes Bank of America Texas one of the state's four largest banks.

MacAndrews & Forbes Holdings, Inc. retains First Gibraltar's federal savings bank charter, under which it will operate four branches as First Madison Bank, FSB. The four branches are located in Plano, Richardson and McKinney.

"The addition of First Gibraltar's branches gives us a major presence in Texas, which we feel is a terrific consumer and business market," said Bank of America Texas Chairman and CEO Larry McNabb. "We welcome First Gibraltar's customers to Bank of America Texas and look forward to providing all our customers with more convenient banking through our expanded network of branches."

McNabb said the acquisition adds branches in another 20 counties, increasing the bank's operations to 70 counties statewide.

Starting in February, First Gibraltar customers were able to use their automated teller machine (ATM) cards at any of Bank of America's more than 5,000 Versateller ATMs throughout the western U. S. without paying a network transaction fee. BofA Texas customers will have comparable privileges at First Gibraltar's 181 ATMs in Texas. The new Bank of America Texas now operates more than 260 ATMs in Texas.

Accounts will be automatically converted, and checking account customers will receive a complimentary order of checks for their new accounts and new ATM cards to replace their existing cards.

Bank of America Texas began operations on May 9, 1991, when it

acquired certain assets and liabilities of Village Green National Bank of Houston, Texas, from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

It acquired certain assets and liabilities of Commerce Federal Savings Association on July 12, 1991, and of Sunbelt Federal Savings on April 10, 1992, both from the Resolution Trust Corporation.

PUBLIC NOTICE
BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION MAY 1, 1993

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to redistribute among other school districts ad valorem taxes levied and collected by a school district. The amendment would also allow the legislature to create county education districts with the taxable property of existing school districts in one or more counties combined. County education districts may levy, collect, and distribute ad valorem taxes as authorized by general law. The legislature would be allowed to set the rate of the ad valorem tax to be imposed in a school district or county education district or it may authorize the board of trustees of each school district or county education district to set the rate, provided that the rate of county education district ad valorem taxes may not exceed \$1.00 per \$100 valuation of taxable property, unless a higher rate is approved by the voters of the district. The amendment also provides that the amount of ad valorem taxes redistributed among school districts by the legislature and effectively redistributed within a county through county education districts may not exceed 2.75 percent of the sum of the state revenue appropriated for public schools and the revenue from local ad valorem taxes levied and collected for public schools. The term "state revenue" does not include revenue from ad valorem taxes, revenue for the provision of free textbooks, or contributions to a retirement system. Finally, the amendment provides that it does not affect the distribution of the available school fund under article VII, section 5, of the Texas Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set

a minimum tax rate in county education districts, and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 2 of Senate Joint Resolution 7 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that, except for state educational mandates imposed in compliance with the Texas Constitution or federal law, or unless enacted by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members elected to each house of the legislature, a school district may not be required to comply with an obligation requiring expenditure of school district funds unless the obligation is fully funded. The amendment also requires the legislature to provide by law a procedure for determining whether an obligation is fully funded. In the absence of such a procedure, and at the request of a school district's board of trustees, the comptroller of public accounts shall determine whether or not an obligation is fully funded. This amendment applies only to state educational mandates enacted after December 31, 1993.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes an amendment to article VII, section 5(b), of the constitution, which currently authorizes the legislature to provide for using the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts and certain education-related revenue bonds issued by the state. The amendment would repeal the provision authorizing

the use of the permanent school fund to guarantee state revenue bonds, but would permit the legislature to provide by law for the issuance of general obligation bonds or revenue bonds of the state for the purpose of making loans to, or purchasing bonds of, school districts for the purpose of acquisition, construction, or improvement of instructional facilities, including all furnishings. The amendment also provides that the state, pursuant to general law, may forgive the payment of principal and interest on all or part of a loan made to a school district under the amendment to partially finance an instructional facility. The cap of \$750 million on the amount of bonds that could be issued under article VII, section 5(b), as amended, would be retained. The amendment would repeal the current provision of the constitution permitting the legislature to authorize bonds in excess of \$750 million by two-thirds record vote of both houses of the legislature. While any of the general obligation bonds issued under the amendment or any of the interest on those bonds is outstanding and unpaid, there would be appropriated out of the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, the amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that matured or became due that fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund."

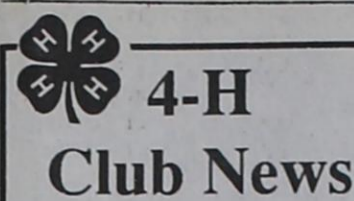

Open Space Land Valuations Available

The following information is provided owners within Eastland County in compliance with requirements of the State Property Tax Code.

If you are the woner of land that is being currently used for some type of agricultural use, you may qualify for a special valuation of your land for ad valorem tax purposes.

"Qualified Open-Space Land" is defined as land (acreage) that is currently devoted principally to agricultural use to the degree of intensity that is generally accepted in this area and that has been devoted principally to agricultural use for five (5) of the preceding seven (7) years.

The application must be submitted on a form provided by the appraisal district and that is prescribed by the Property Tax Division of the State Comptrollers Office. The completed application must contain the information necessary to determine the validity of the application.

To apply for the "Open Space Land" valuation or to inquire about any other special valuation that you may be eligible for, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District.

The filing deadline for this and other available special valuations and/or exemptions is April 30, 1993. For additional information or to request an application form, call or come by the Eastland County Appraisal District. The telephone number is 629-8597 and the office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse in Eastland.

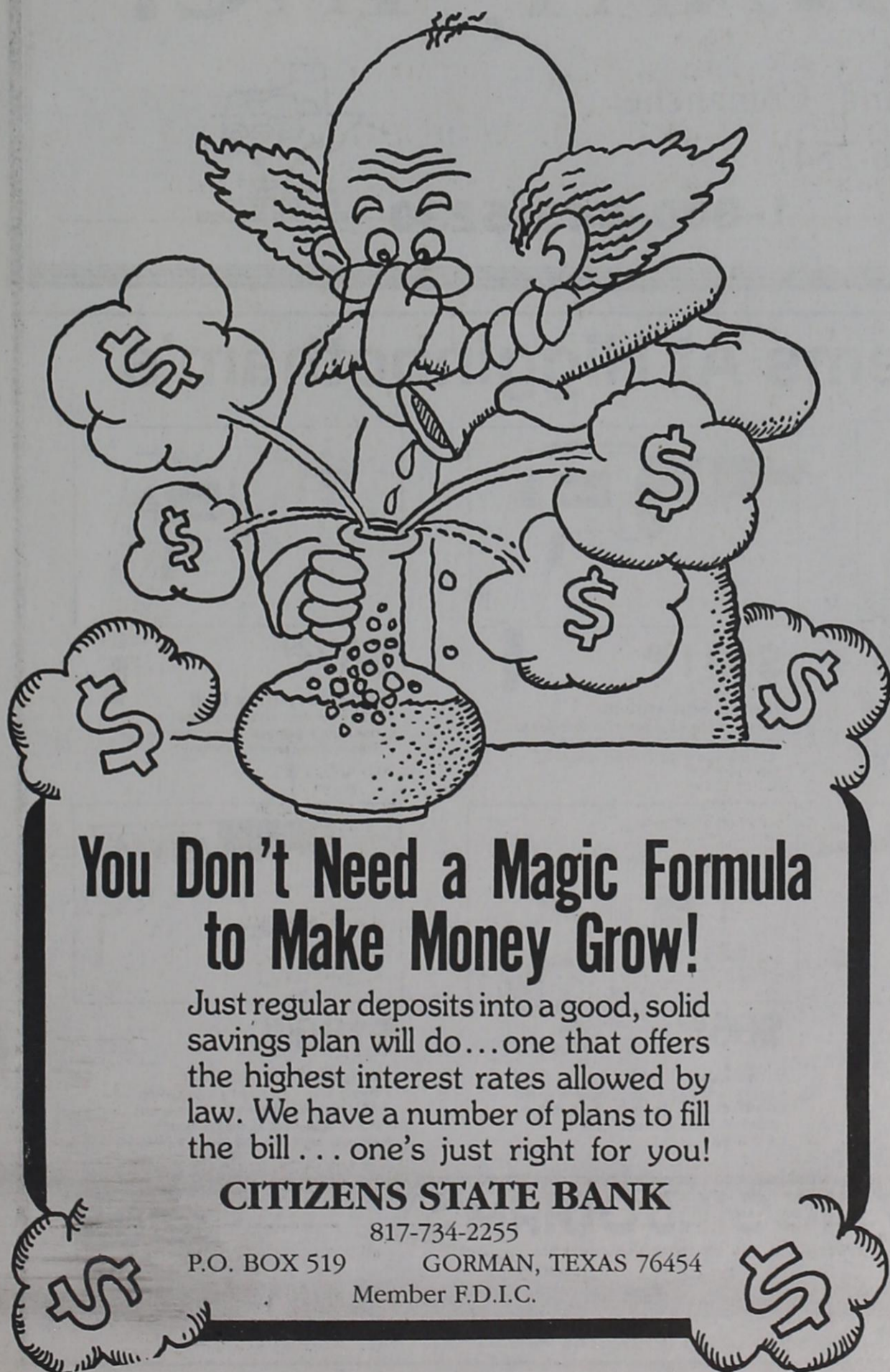

TCI Cablevision To Initiate Plans To Improve Cable Service

TCI Cablevision will soon launch the first stages of a technological improvement program that within a few years will bring area cable customers additional television programming options and more services than seemed possible only a short time ago, announced Robert Moore, the system's general manager. The improvements will provide customers with more choice and control over their cable television service, among other benefits.

One of the first choices TCI Cablevision will offer is a reasonably priced, entry level basic cable service, which will become available beginning April 1, 1993. In a second innovation, people who subscribe to the entry level service will be able to purchase premium networks, and other a la carte services without taking additional cable service levels.

Some channels will also be realigned--that is, given new channel numbers--and several cable networks that are presently part of TCI Cablevision's Basic service level will become part of the system's Expanded Basic level. These changes will also take effect April 1st.

The major changes will take place later in the decade, as Tele-Com-

munications, Inc., TCI Cablevision's parent company, begins pioneering digital transmission of video and data services via state-of-the-art fiber optics. These technological advances could ultimately provide local customers with more than 500 channels and a myriad of choices that range from television networks to information from a wide variety of sources. The headquarters for these advances will be TCI's national digital compression center, to be constructed in the Denver metropolitan area.

In addition, TCI will partner with others in the industry to develop standards to ensure that cable service is compatible with home-electronics equipment, especially technology such as high definition television (HDTV), which is expected to become available in American homes by the end of the 1990s. "Our ultimate vision is to give our customers as many video, data and other TV options as the marketplace commands and to give our customers easy-to-use control over the options they choose to take and pay for," said Robert Moore.

New television technology offers possibilities that are amazing and nearly infinite. Increased channel capacity alone will soon make to-

day's advanced cable system seem as antiquated as the old 12-channel VHF band. We're delighted to be part of a company that is the vanguard of change and to offer its benefits to our customers.

The entry level service being created on April 1st will consist of 9 broadcast stations, such as KTAB, WFAA, KRBC, KERA, in addition to 2 public education and government

access channels. It will cost \$10.00 a month.

9 cable networks that are now part of TCI Cablevision's Basic service level will become part of the system's Expanded Basic level. They will join such other popular networks as USA, TNT, ESPN on that level.

"The vast majority of system customers already subscribe to both Basic and Expanded Basic. The services they receive and their total price per month will remain the

same," Moore stressed.

However, customers who now subscribe only to Basic have two choices: 1) to remain with that level and pay a lower rate, or 2) to add on Expanded Basic and receive a full roster of cable networks for \$2.00 more than they currently pay each month.

The channel realignment is necessary because the equipment the company uses to make these service levels available works best when the

channels are grouped together. In general, the new arrangement will group broadcast networks such as CBS, NBC, ABC on lower-numbered channels and cable services on higher-numbered channels.

"TCI Cablevision will do all it can to make this channel realignment simple for viewers," Moore said. "Channel numbers become a habit, and any habit can be hard to break, but we'll try to make it as easy as possible."

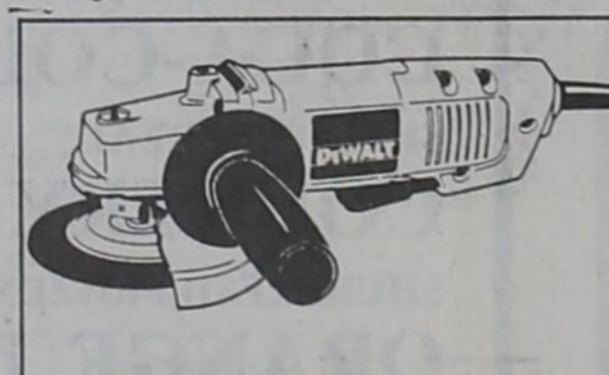

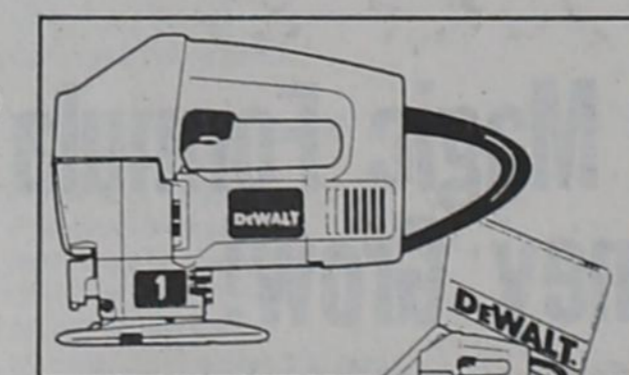

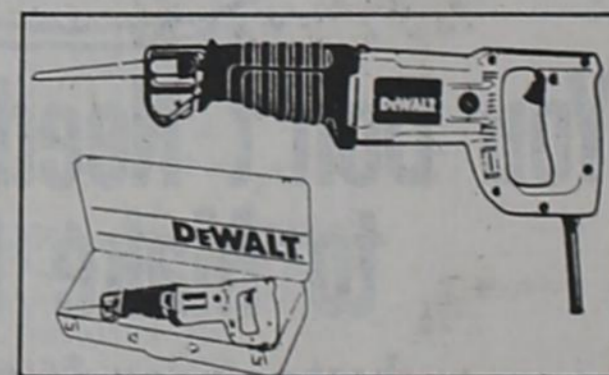
