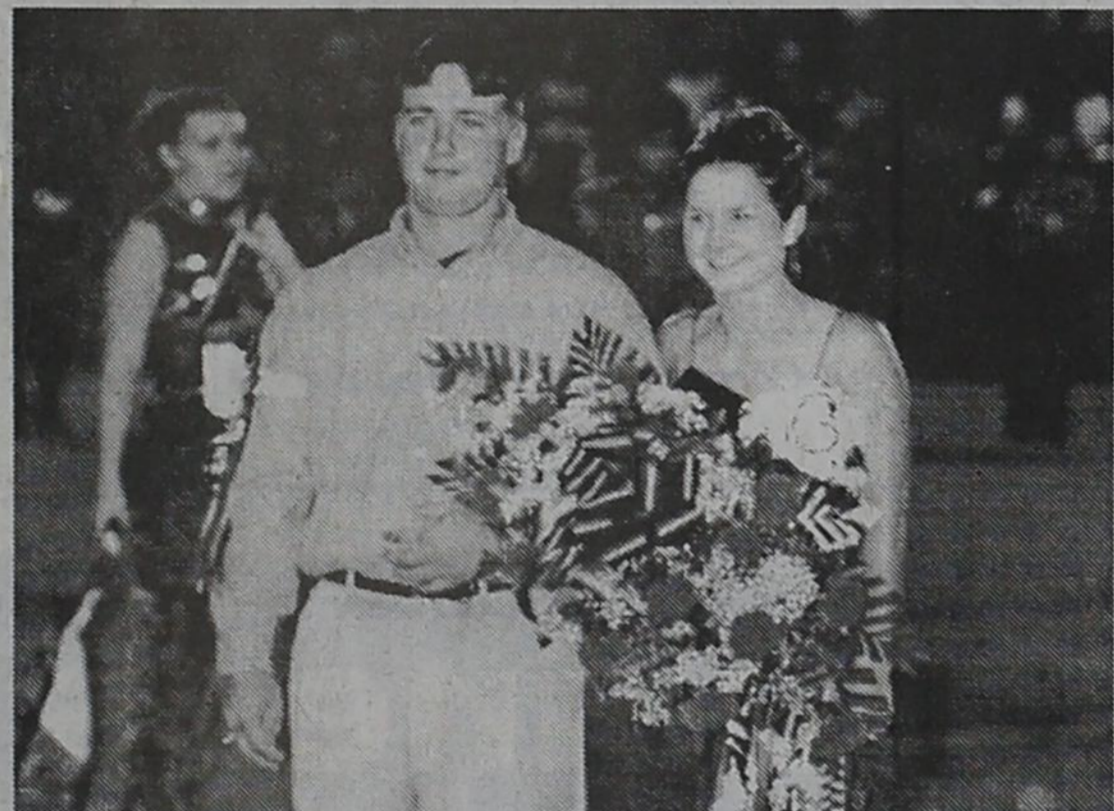
Homecoming Officers were: Dane Gressett, President, Billy Taylor, Vice President, and Norma Webb, Secretary/Treasurer.

Athletic Director Report

We have a full week of action this week. Our JH volleyball who dropped a match to Breckenridge last week gets back into action vs Breckenridge here at 5:15 on September 17th. Our JV and Varsity Volleyball teams travel to Eastland on September 18th and Millsap on September 22nd.

The Gorman Junior High Football team jumps into action this week for their first game at Perrin-Whitt on Thursday, September 20th at 5:00 p.m. Our Varsity football team hopes to bounce back after falling 33-0 to Covington as they take on Perrin-Whitt Friday night here at 7:30 p.m.

Progress reports came out last week and those athletes who received one are encouraged to work hard and attend tutorials to bring those grades up. Remember that if a student fails a six weeks, he or she will lose their eligibility to play in games for three weeks. The student will be allowed to practice during this time. The 1st six weeks ends September 28th. Students will lose their eligibility on October 5th at 3:36 p.m. and regain their eligibility on Friday, October 26th at 3:36 p.m.

Panthers vs Perrin-Whitt Here 7:30 Friday

The Panthers will play host to Perrin Whitt this Friday at 7:30. Gorman hopes to bounce back from last Friday's 33-0 loss to Covington. "We are wanting to get back out there and prove that last Friday was not the type of team we are trained to be. We can play a lot harder than that and our kids know that. We must do a better job of execution on offense, we had way too many busted plays and I know it's not from lack of repetitions. Defensively, we must tackle better and break on the ball better. We were in position to make plays, but we just didn't get it done." The Panthers will be preparing for a pass happy shotgun offense that Perrin does a great job of executing. Their QB is a good athlete with an above average arm. The Pirates have a group of formidable receivers. Defensively, the Pirates base out of a 50 front. They have good size and are aggressive at the linebacker position. "We have our work cut out for us this week, but I have a feeling our kids are not satisfied with the team's performance last week and are ready to prove that we're better than the way we played."

The Panthers had no significant injuries to be concerned about after Saturday's game. "Ryan Wright got a pretty good shoot to his thigh and has a deep thigh bruise. He will be sore for a few days, but it will work itself out. Other than a few other bumps and bruises, we came out of the game fairly healthy."

The Panther football team and coaching staff would like to thank everyone for the great support that has been given to this team so far and we hope you continue to back up throughout the year.

Panthers Lose To Owls; Host Perrin-Whitt Friday

The Panthers played a hard fought game before a large homecoming crowd on Saturday night, but came out on the short end of a 33-0 score. The Big Red played hard but just couldn't stay with the outstanding Owl team.

The Owls wasted little time proving their offensive power when they took the opening kickoff on their own 48 and scored in one big play with running back Jordan Carter going the 52 yards on a fine run for the score with 11:34 on the clock. Eric McFarland kicked the point after and the Owls were up 7-0.

Then following a defensive stand on their own 11, the Owls drove 89 yards in 7 plays with Eric McFarland catching a 35 yard pass for the TD with just 7 seconds left in the first period. McFarland added the point after to make the score 14-0.

Then with 3:01 left in the first half Carter went the final 8 yards for another score. The drive covered 74 yards in 12 plays. McFarland kicked the point after to make the halftime score 21-0.

The Gorman Panther Band performed during halftime activities when the Royalty of Homecoming were presented.

Following halftime activities the Panthers received the kickoff but failed to move the ball.

Covington took the ball on their own 42 and Carter repeated his first quarter run as he raced 58 yards for the TD with 9:36 left. The kick failed and the score rose to 27-0.

The final Owl score came at the end of a 57 yard drive with Perry Lindsey catching a 1 yard pass for the TD with 36 seconds left in the third. Again the kick for point failed and the final score was 33-0. Carter had 216 yards on 18 carries to lead the Owls.

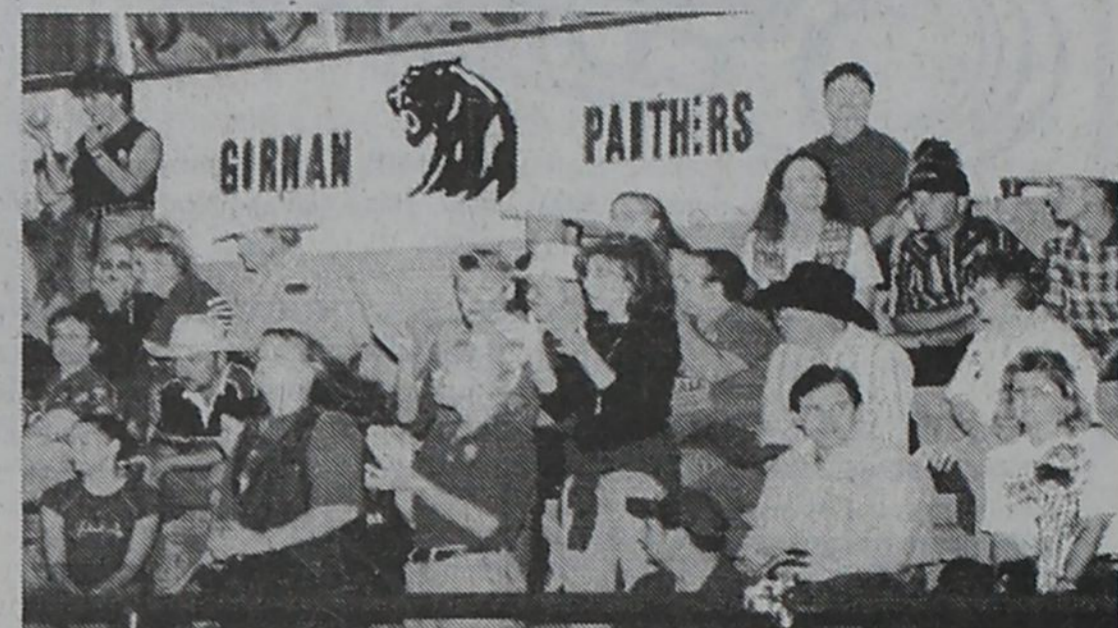
Juan Martinez led the Panthers with 57 yards on 10 tries. Sawyer Wright had 27 yards on 5 snaps. Josh Carruth had 12 yards on 11 carries. Shaylor Roberts carried 5 times for 11 yards. Ryan Wright got 6 yards on 4 tries before leaving the game with an injury.

It makes it very hard for the Panthers this season because all the players have to play both ways. But one thing you can say -- the Panthers never gave up. They just kept on playing hard.

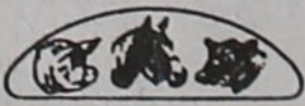

CHIP of Texas Providing Applications at Gorman ISD

Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) of Texas will be providing applications at Gorman ISD on September 24, 2001 from 11:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.

The process is very simple, the only proof that is required is: 1) Income for the last 60 days (paycheck stubs or verification from employer). 2) Proof of daycare fees paid by parent (statement from daycare provider or receipts of payment to daycare). 3) Any child support the parent is paying or receiving.

CHIP is a State of Texas Program to provide insurance for children up to their 19th birthday. It covers pre-existing conditions, regular check-ups, shots, eye exams, glasses, prescription drugs, dental care and special needs children—just to name a few. Income guidelines for the program are very generous. The most this insurance can cost is \$18 a month to cover all children in the family.

TAAS tests to be taken October 23-25

The TAAS tests will be offered this October at Gorman High School to those students who need a passing score in one or more parts of the test. By current state law, students must pass all sections of the test in order to receive a high school diploma. Any one in the community who has completed all graduation requirements except for passing the TAAS may take these tests to try to earn a high school diploma. A person only has to take that portion of the test that he or she did not pass in high school. Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and who wish to retake a portion of the TAAS may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus. At Gorman High School registration forms are in the Counselor's office.

Forms must be completed and are to be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than September 21, 2001. Students who are currently enrolled in Gorman High School do not need to register for this test. Persons who have not finished high school and who are interested in obtaining their diplomas, must fulfill the requirements for graduation that were in effect when their class graduated. Therefore, if the TAAS was not required for a person's class, it would not be required today. Texas Tech also has a correspondence program enabling a person to receive a high school diploma through correspondence courses. GED tests are offered monthly at Ranger College and Cisco Junior College.

How to Properly Display Your American Flag

- Display the flag only from sunrise to sunset. If illuminated, the flag can be displayed at night for a special occasion to produce a patriotic effect.

- Don't display the flag during bad weather unless an all-weather flag is used.

- Hoist the flag briskly and lower it ceremoniously. Always show respect for the flag.

- Display the flag with the blue field up except as a distress signal.
- The flag should not touch anything beneath it such as the ground, floor, water or merchandise.

- Don't carry the flag flat or horizontally, always aloft and free. Allow it to hang freely. Do not gather it or use it as drapery.

- Don't attach insignia or pictures to the flag.

- When flying a flag at half-staff, raise it briskly all the way to the top, then lower ceremoniously to half-staff.

- When a flag is no longer fit to display, destroy it in a dignified way, preferably by burning.

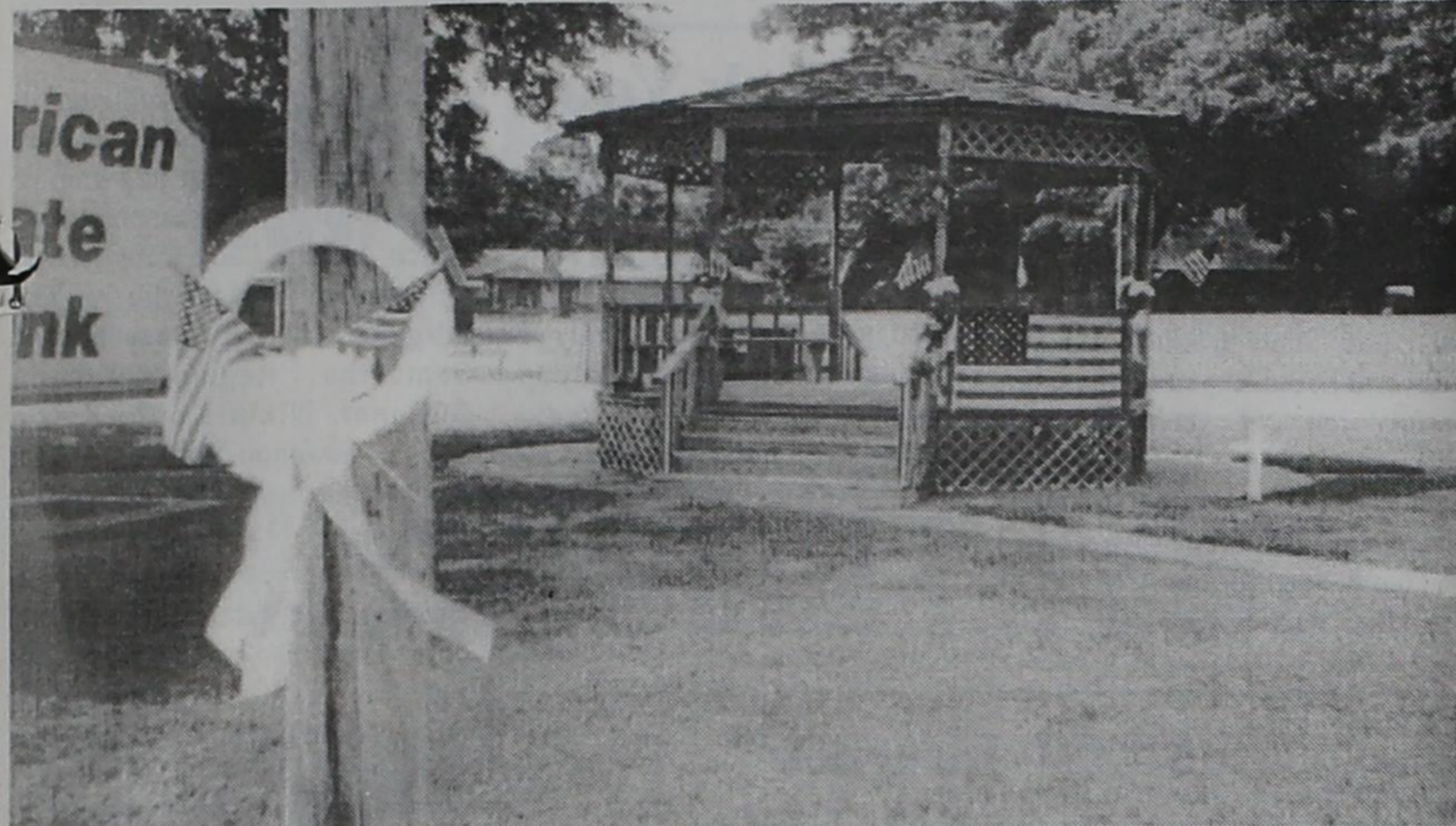

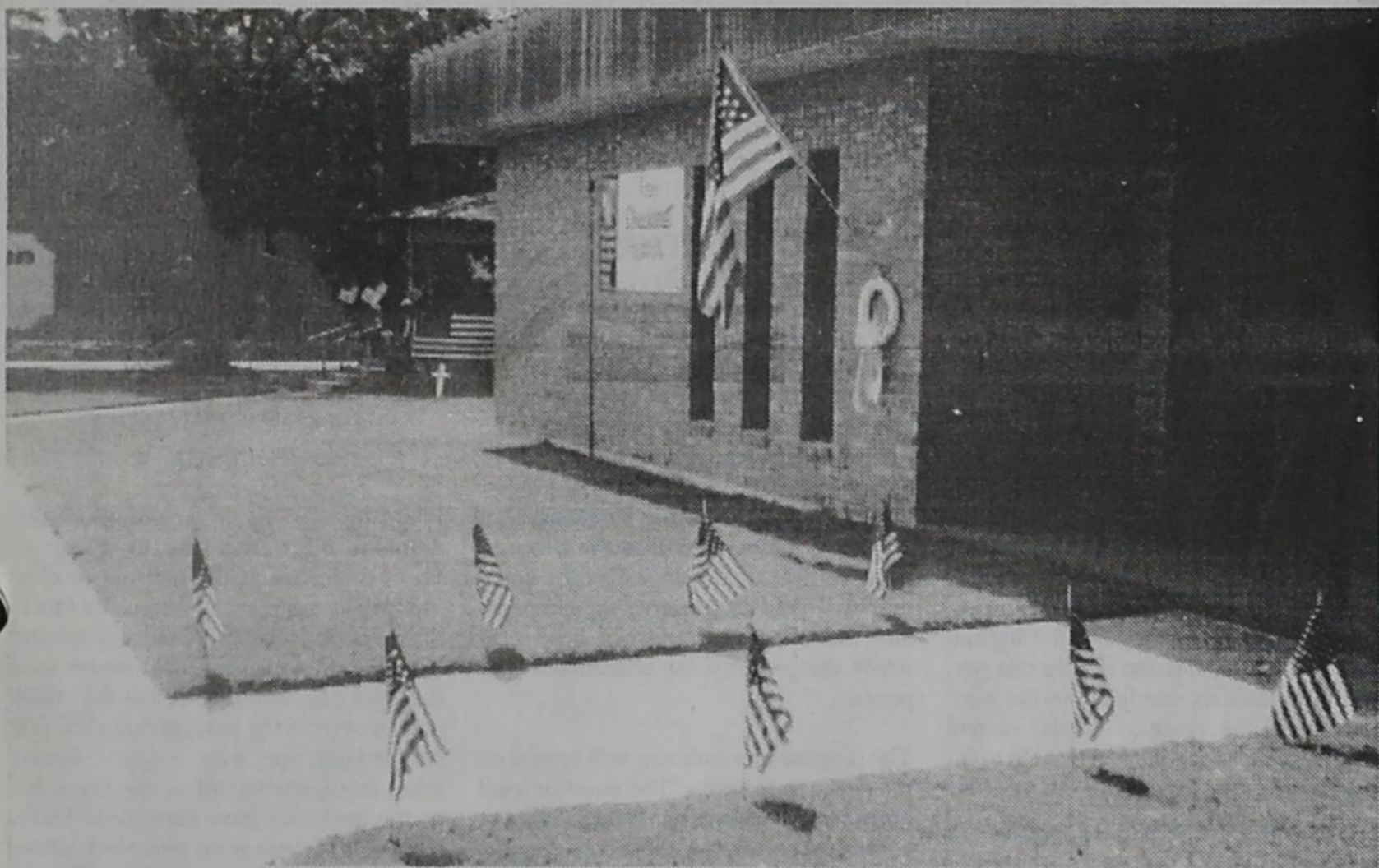

EASTLAND COUNTY RECEIVES 2.6 MILLION IN GRANTS

The Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board announced Friday August 31, 2001 five communities in Eastland County each received a grant of \$525,000 for a total of 2.625 million dollars to plan and implement a county wide community network. Eastland County received more grant money than any other county in the State of Texas. These awards will be formally presented in Austin on September 27, 2001. The grants are the result of efforts by a nineteen (19) member collaborative from every incorporated community in Eastland County. Terry Langford, Eastland County Economic Development Coordinator and other economic development professionals and community leaders coordinated the project. The initial project group consisted of Don Henry and Clois Purvis-Cisco, Ann Folsom and Mark Holloway-Eastland, Lori Dodd-Gorman, Jim Cockburn and Stephen Lang-Ranger, Johnny Singleton-Rising Star, County Judge Brad Stephenson and State Representative Jim Keffer.

The nineteen (19) member collaborative consists of Cisco Junior College, Cisco Development Corporation, Cisco Independent School District, Eastland Centennial Memorial Library, Eastland County, Eastland County Extension Service, Eastland Chamber of Commerce, City of Eastland, Eastland Independent School District, Charlie Garrett Memorial Library-Gorman, Gorman Economic Development Corporation, Gorman Independent School District, Heritage Manor of Gorman, Ranger College, City of Ranger, Ranger Public Library, Ranger Independent School District, Rising Star Independent School District and City of Rising Star.

The Community Networking Grants (CN2) will consist of two (2) phases. The first will be to develop a networking plan for each community and Eastland County. This plan has to be submitted to the TIF board by February 1, 2002. The second phase will be to implement the plan. The overall goals of this grant initiative are to allow communities to explore and plan for:

- Equitable access to information including public access points to the Internet distributed throughout the community, community technology labs, or other means to allow citizens full participation in the emerging information-based economy.

- Broad range or enriched local content development including providing end users with the ability to create, publish, or interact with the information

- Information access and collaboration with under served population within the community

- Deployment of telecommunications application such as listserves and/or web pages

- Collaboration between TIF-eligible and non-TIF-eligible organizations including non-profit and local business for resource sharing and sustainability

- Sustainable community networks to ensure project continuation, management and maintenance after TIF funding ends

- Innovative community networks that serve as models for other communities

- Projects that result in stronger community ties

- Stronger local economic development

The first step will be to hire a planning consultant to work closely with the project leaders and with input from the residents of each community and the County to prepare a networking plan for Eastland County. The TIF Board is excited about the idea of Eastland County being an example of what can be accomplished by communities working together to improve the lifestyles of its residents.

Some of the opportunities the Eastland County community network hopes to provide are high speed Internet access, learning centers, and public access terminals in places such as libraries, city or county offices, senior citizens centers and other areas in our county. This will provide Internet access for people who do have access at this time. The underlying advantage of this network will be to provide a spark for economic development in Eastland County. More information about this exciting opportunity for Eastland County will follow.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
Special Election
NOVEMBER 6, 2001

PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 52)

Proposition 1 would amend the constitution to relinquish the state's claim to certain disputed land in Bastrop County. The amendment would confirm legal title to that land, excluding any mineral interests, to the individuals who hold a disputed title to the land. The amendment would prevent a loss of title by people who bought and paid for property that was never transferred by the state because of faulty surveys.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by the release of a state claim of its interest to the owners of certain land in Bastrop County."

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 37)

Proposition 2 would amend the constitution to establish the process for issuing up to \$175 million of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide aid to counties for access road projects to serve border colonies. Generally, a colony is an economically distressed geographic area with inadequate public services (such as water supplies, sewer services, or paved roads) in a county without adequate resources to provide such services. These projects could include the construction of access roads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the construction of those roads, such as road drainage. The Texas Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Governor, would be authorized to determine what constitutes a border colonia for purposes of selecting the counties and projects that would receive assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide financial assistance to counties for roadway projects to serve border colonies."

PROPOSITION 3 (SJR 47)

Proposition 3 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw cocoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange port for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocoa and green coffee that is held in Harris County."

PROPOSITION 4 (HJR 1)

Proposition 4 would amend the constitution by setting the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise fixed by the constitution may not exceed two years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for a four-year term of office for the fire fighters' pension commissioner."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 32)

Proposition 5 would amend the constitution to allow a municipality to donate outdated or surplus equipment, supplies, or other materials used in fighting fires to an underdeveloped country. Current state law does not allow anything of value belonging to the state or its political subdivisions to be donated to another nation.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to donate outdated or surplus firefighting equipment or supplies to underdeveloped countries."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 45)

Proposition 6 would amend the constitution to require the governor to call a special session of the legislature so that the legislature can appoint presidential electors when the governor determines that it is reasonably likely that the outcome of the election for a presidential candidate's electors will not be clearly determined in time for the appropriate electors to meet before the federal deadline to cast their votes. Under current law, when the people vote for a particular candidate for president, in reality they are voting for that candidate's electors who will meet to cast their votes for president. If the electors are not determined by the certification date, no electoral votes may be cast for the state. The proposed amendment ensures that the state's electoral votes will be cast.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring the governor to call a special session for the appointment of presidential electors under certain circumstances."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 82)

Proposition 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue and sell up to \$500 million of additional general obligation bonds to finance additional home mortgage loans to veterans. Additionally, the proposed amendment would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use assets from the land and housing assistance funds to create, operate, and improve veterans' cemeteries.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for veterans' housing assistance and to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide for veterans cemeteries."

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 97)

Proposition 8 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue and sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds would pay for construction and repair projects or for the purchase of needed equipment by the General Services Commission, the Texas Youth Commission, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the

Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, the Parks and Wildlife Department, the adjutant general's department, the Texas School for the Deaf, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Public Safety, the State Preservation Board, the Texas Department of Health, the Texas Historical Commission, or the Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$850 million in bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for construction and repair projects and for the purchase of needed equipment."

PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 47)

Proposition 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for filling vacancies in the legislature without an election if only one person is a qualified candidate in the election to fill the vacancy. Under current law, a special election must be held to fill a vacancy in the legislature even if there is only one qualified candidate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the filling of a vacancy in the legislature without an election if a candidate is running unopposed in an election to fill a vacancy."

PROPOSITION 10 (SJR 6)

Proposition 10 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal property from property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufactured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location inside or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on the matter.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treatment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible personal property held at certain locations only temporarily for assembling, manufacturing, processing, or other commercial purposes."

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 85)

Proposition 11 would amend the constitution to allow a schoolteacher, a retired schoolteacher, or a retired school administrator who serves as a member of a governing body of a school district, city, town, or other local governmental district, including a water district, to receive compensation for serving on such a governing body. Currently, state employees or other individuals who are compensated directly or indirectly from state funds are barred from receiving a salary for such service.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow current and retired public school teachers and retired public school administrators to receive compensation for serving on the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, including water districts."

PROPOSITION 12 (HJR 75)

Proposition 12 would amend, repeal, or relocate several sections of the current

constitution to improve the clarity, organization, and consistency of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to eliminate obsolete, archaic, redundant, and unnecessary provisions and to clarify, update, and harmonize certain provisions of the Texas Constitution."

PROPOSITION 13 (SJR 2)

Proposition 13 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a board of trustees of an independent school district to donate real property and improvements formerly used as a school campus in order to preserve that property. The board may make the donation if the board determines that the property has historical significance, that the donation will help to preserve the property, and that the school district no longer needs the property for educational purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize the board of trustees of an independent school district to donate certain surplus district property of historical significance in order to preserve the property."

PROPOSITION 14 (HJR 44)

Proposition 14 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a taxing unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxation as long as the travel trailers are lawfully registered with the state and are not held or used for the production of income.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize taxing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 15 (SJR 16)

Proposition 15 would amend the constitution to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would finance the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll roads and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruction, acquisition, operation, and expansion of state highways, turnpikes, toll roads, toll bridges, and other mobility projects."

PROPOSITION 16 (HJR 5)

Proposition 16 would amend the constitution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a contract for the improvements less than 12 days after applying for the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would

authorize the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on a homestead.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prescribing requirements for imposing a lien for work and material used in the construction, repair, or renovation of improvements on residential homestead property and including the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on real property as a debt on homestead property protected from a forced sale."

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 53)

Proposition 17 would amend the constitution to allow the state to relinquish claim to certain state land and to clear title defects for persons who claim title to those lands. The proposed amendment would apply to land whose owners have disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes due on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowing the state to settle title disputes without a constitutional amendment for each piece of land in dispute.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party."

PROPOSITION 18 (SJR 49)

Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate and standardize the collection, deposit, reporting, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legislature may not take effect before January 1 of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house of the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remitting of civil and criminal fees."

PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues bonds to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 billion."

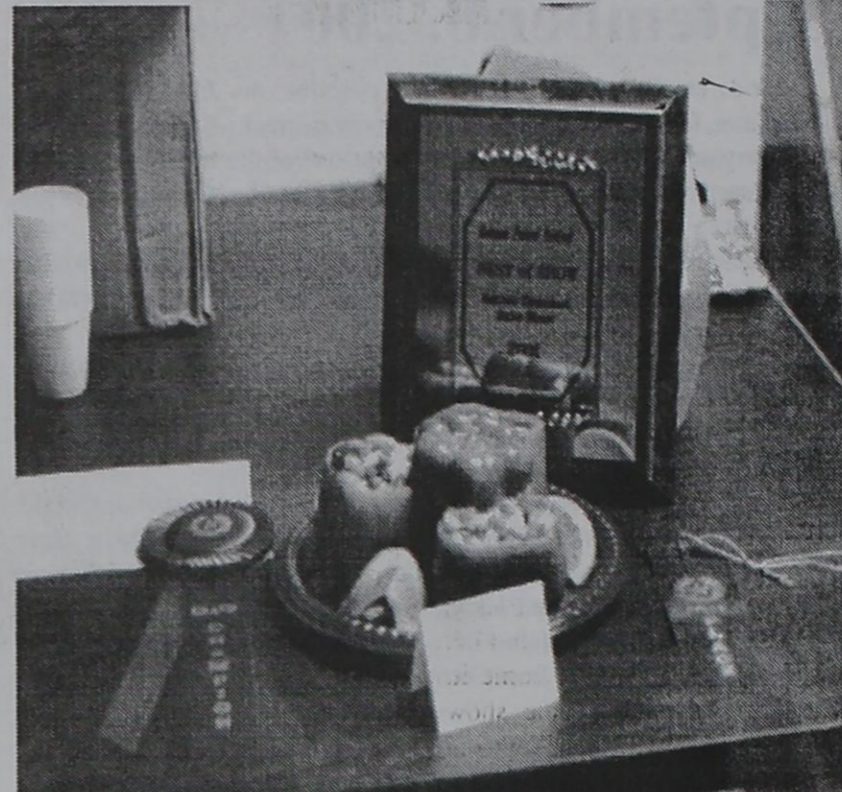
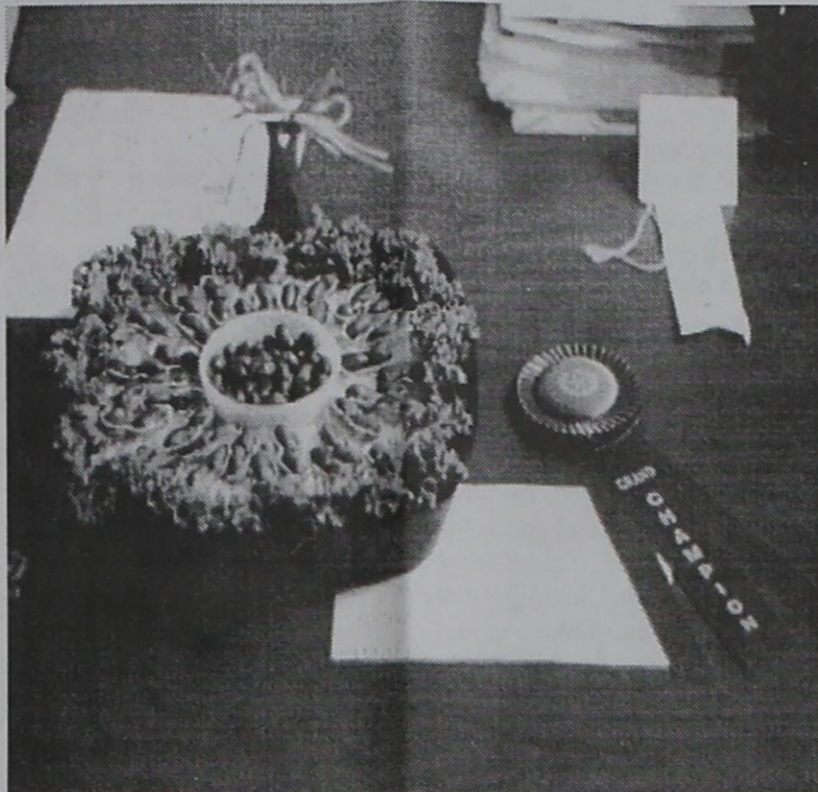

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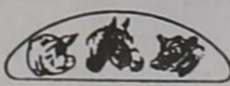

Attack Response

We have seen extreme and unprecedented events unfold in recent days. One poll indicated that Americans were concerned that our response to the attack would not be severe enough while others have focused on the Biblical mandates of mercy and doing good to your enemies. What is the proper response?

In the Old Testament, the account is given of Nehemiah's rebuilding the walls of Jerusalem from the rubble of a previous enemy attack. His prayer is that his enemies would become captives themselves and be plundered by their enemies. How can we reconcile the prayer of this Bible hero with the command of Christ to "do good, pray for, and bless" our enemies?

This was not Nehemiah, the individual, praying about a personal problem. This was Nehemiah, the Governor of Judea, praying about maintaining the peace and safety of people for whom he, their leader, was responsible. This is the prayer of an authority dealing with evil being imposed upon those under his authority.

This illustrates how "turning the other cheek" as an individual and retaliating on a national scale do not contradict each other. When enemies threaten the very peace, security, and stability of the nation, it is the function of government to protect its citizens from those enemies. We must strike back with a force that will deter anyone else who would consider repeating such acts of aggression as were carried out September 11.

Nehemiah's repeated response was prayer and vigilance. He first made his prayer to God and then did whatever else was necessary to protect those for whom he was responsible.

The Bible tells us that it is vain to put our trust in "chariots and horses", i.e., military might. That is why every aspect of our military response must be bathed in prayer. Every believer in this nation has a responsibility to pray for those who will be making and executing the actual battle plans. God's people are vital to the defense of this nation.

Nehemiah's enemies said, "We are going to come in the midst among you and kill you." Our enemies have proven their capability to do just that.

The response of God's people may well be the determining factor as to whether we will face more terrorist attacks on our own soil or whether we will be able to defend our homeland. Will God's people, the church, at long last, humble ourselves, pray, seek God's face, and turn from OUR wicked ways (2 Chronicles 7:14)?
