## Gorman High School Awarded Certificate Of Acknowledgement

Gorman High School has been awarded a Recognized Status Certificate of Acknowledgement from the Texas Successful School Awards System.

The non-monetary award is presented for academic performance on ACT OR SAT tests. These tests are supplemental college admission testing indicators.

At least fifty-five percent of graduating seniors had to take the tests, and at least 10 percent had to score above the set criteria in order to receive the recognized award.

Statewide, 1,339 schools were eligible for the award, and only 255 met the 1993-04 criteria. The award will be presented in Austin on January 30, 1995.

## Panthers Edge Mounties; To Host Evant Elks Friday

The Panthers traveled to Santa Anna on Friday night and came away with a thrilling 29 to 28 victory over the Mounties in a game that showed a great deal of offense and not a whole lot of defense, as both teams really had large totals for the evening. This was an important ISA District contest and put the Panthers into a position to be the runner-up in district if they can defeat the Evant Elks this Friday night at Brodgon Field.

Santa Anna got on the scoreboard on their second possession. Taking the ball at their own 20, the Mounties went the distance for the score in 9 plays with Anthony Thomas getting the final 2 yards with 4:36 left in the period. Thomas then added the two pointer on a run to put the Mounties up 8-0.

After an exchange of possessions, the Big Red defense came up with a fumble recovery at the Gorman 39 and the Panthers moved the distance in 12 plays. Don Mauney scored from 5 yards out with 9:46 left in the second period. The drive featured 15, 10 and 11 yard runs by Paul Petree and a 3 yard run by Marco Herrera to set Gorman up at the 5 yard line. Herrera ran in for the two points to tie the score at 8-8.

Santa Anna came right back with a drive of their own, taking the ball on their own 39 and scoring in 11 plays with Thomas getting the honors from 1 yard out with 5:00 left in the half. Thomas got the two pointer on a run to put Santa Anna up 18-8 at the half. Then following the intermission at

which time the Gorman Panther Band and the Santa Anna Band really had great performances, the Panthers had the option to receive the kickoff. And a marvelous run-back by Marco Herrera put the Panthers back even when he caught the kick at about the Gorman 15 and raced the distance for the score with 11:44 left. Mauney ran for the two pointer to tie the score at 16-16.

Again the Mounties came right back, took the ball on their own 7 and covered the 93 yards in 15 plays with James Balderas getting the final 10 yards on a run with 5:03 left in the third. A pass try for two points failed and Santa Anna led 22-16.

But the Panthers also had another drive in their mind as they took the ball on their own 30 and scored in 10 plays with Mauney getting the final 15 yards with 1:03 left in the third. The drive featured runs of 11, 10 15 yards for first downs. The run for two points failed and the score was tied at 22-22.

Santa Anna Came back with a drive of 50 yards in 11 plays for the score with Thomas again getting the honors from 15 yards out with 1:40 left in the game. The run for two points failed and the score was 28-16.

But the Panthers were just not to be denied as they took the ball on their own 33, suffered a 5 yard penalty, then went to work to move the ball 72 yards in just 7 plays in only 1 minute and 13 seconds. The drive featured two beautiful pass receptions by Don Mauney from Nick Guthery. The first was a fourth down

pass of 16 yards to set Gorman up at the Santa Anna 48 with just seconds remaining. Then on third down and 2 Guthery hit Mauney on an out route and he ran to the sideline, then shook off a tackle at about the 25 or 30 yard line, and then got through two more Mounties before racing into the end zone with 22 seconds left on the clock. Mauney then lined up to kick the point after. He missed the kick, but the Mounties were penalized for roughing the kicker and gave the Panthers another chance at the point after. This time Mauney really concentrated and booted the extra point right through the goal posts for the point to win the game.

It was one of the most thrilling games that the fans have seen in a long while and set the Panthers up to meet the Evant Elks in a crucial district game next Friday night to see who will represent the 15A District in the playoffs.

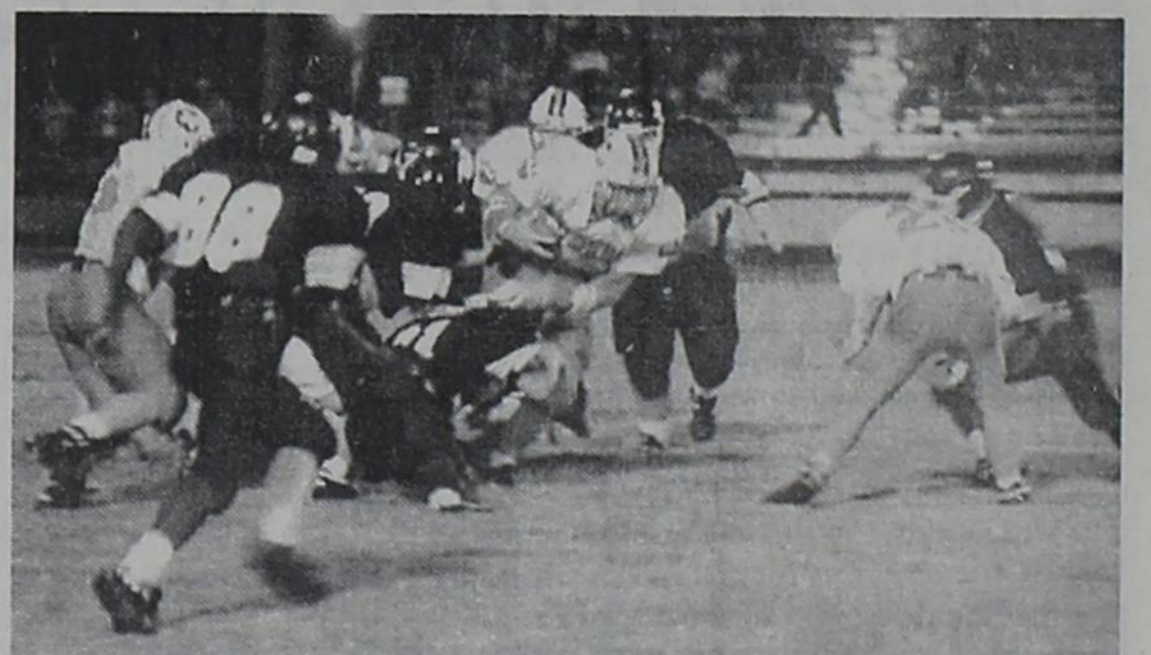
Mauney led the Panthers with 152 yards on 19 carries, and caught two passes of 16 and 40. Marco Herrera got 86 yards on 16 tries, and ran back the kickoff for 85 yards. Paul Petree had 52 yards on 7 carries. Guthery wound up with 2 yards on 3 keepers, but lost 4 yards on a pass try.

The Big Red will be tested severely this Friday night when they take on the Evant Elks at Brodgon Field. The Big Red defense will have to come up with a really great effort in this one, and the offense will have to put up some big points to take this one. And that is just what we think they will do.

J. M. McNeill, Jr., 72, of Stephenville, one of the men who helped make Stephenville the Cowboy Capitol of the World, passed away Monday, October 24th in the Stephenville Hospital after a horse-riding accident.

Services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday in the Stephenville Funeral Home Chapel with burial in the West End Cemetery.

Mr. McNeill was born in Davidson, Okla., and was a U. S. Navy veteran of WWII. He was a cowboy and, with the help of Stanley and Margaret White, helped Jean Stone organize the equestrian group called the Trailblazers. This group was active in setting up the foundations of horsemanship in Stephenville. He also was an early-day director of Tarleton State University's rodeo team. He lived in Stephenville most of his life and was the widower of Winnie Cardwell McNeill, whom he married in 1946. He was a Baptist and married Lucille Heaton in 1994.

Survivors include his wife of Stephenville; three daughters, Vickie McNeill, Nika Boatwright and DeVonna McNeill, all of Stephenville; two brothers, Dan McNeill of Gorman and Doyce McNeill of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.; three sisters, Bennie Cawthorn of New Orleans, Lena Edgemon of Stephenville and Johnnie Witt of Lake Tezoma; one stepdaughter, Ann Stewart; one stepson, Craig Heaton; nine grandchildren; and seven great-grandchildren.

## New Penal Code Demands Retraining For All Prosecutors



Attorney Mike Siebert, an Eastland County native who secured the Democratic nomination this year as a candidate for County Criminal District Attorney, says that the changes in the Texas Penal Code which went into effect September 1, 1994, are so significant that all prosecutors will have to reeducate themselves concerning the new guidelines.

In order to stay ahead of these changes and others, Siebert attended numerous seminars, including the State Jail Felony Seminar, sponsored by the Texas District and County Attorneys Association; the new 1994 changes to the Texas Penal Code/State Jail Felony Seminar, sponsored by the Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association; and a Community Supervision (probation) Seminar.

He also attended a Juvenile Law Seminar, Criminal Evidence Seminar and the week-long prosecutors

school, sponsored by the Texas District and County Attorneys Association.

"The last session of the Texas Legislature enacted the most extensive changes in the Texas Penal Code since its adoption in 1974," he said. New concepts were introduced regarding punishment and community supervision (probation), most of which went into effect September 1, 1994. These aggressive changes mean that many of the things done in the past will be handled in a different and totally new manner.

Practicing law for the past 21 years in Eastland County, Siebert was first with the firm of Turner, Seaberry & Warford until establishing the firm of Hoffman and Siebert.

Born in Ranger in 1947, he graduated from Eastland High School in 1965, and presently serves as president of that Ex-Student Association. He attended Cisco Junior College and graduated from Tarleton State University in 1969. He earned his law degree in 1973 from St. Mary's University in San Antonio.

His contributions to organizations in this county and area are extensive. For six years he was on the Board of Directors for the Region XIV Education Service Center. He served as an Eastland City Commissioner and is currently City Attorney for the City of Eastland. He is currently Chairman of the Board of the Eastland County Appraisal District and has recently been appointed to the Board of Directors of Eastland Economic Development, Inc., a non-profit corporation to encourage, assist and promote economic development. He was an organizer of Parents Against Dangerous Drugs (P.A.D.D.) and is

active in that organization.

He and his wife, the former Becky Simms of Eastland, have two children, Becca, 14, and Katy, 11. He and his family live in the Flatwood Community. He is a Methodist and the son of Mrs. Wendell (Mary Lou) Siebert and the late Wendell T. Siebert.

In seeking the office of County Criminal District Attorney, Siebert states: "having lived in Eastland County all my life, I have a keen interest in achieving and promoting, for all citizens of Eastland County, an atmosphere where it is safe to live, work and raise a family. I think that the office of Criminal District Attorney plays a vital role in achieving and maintaining that atmosphere and I believe that I can make an effective and positive contribution, if elected to serve, as the Criminal District Attorney for Eastland County."

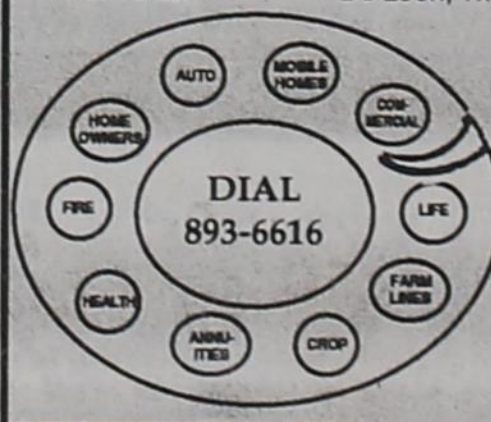

Myrtle Ann Walker, 90, of Eastland, passed away Tuesday, October 25th in an Eastland nursing home.

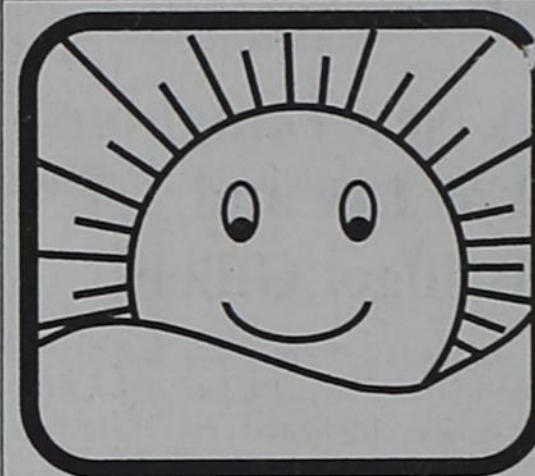
Private graveside services were held on Thursday in Acker Cemetery with Lyndell Ray Garrett officiating, directed by Edwards Funeral Home.

## Deer Season Opens November 5th In Eastland County

Landowners and hunters are reminded that the general deer hunting season in Eastland County will open Saturday, November 5th and run through January 1, 1995. The bag limit is 3 deer, limit 1 buck and 2 antlerless. No special permits are required for harvesting antlerless deer, however, both bucks and antlerless deer must be tagged with the appropriate tag from a valid hunting license.

Deer populations vary from area to area and from ranch to ranch. The either sex regulation allows the landowner the flexibility to harvest deer on his property at the proper rates. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of antlerless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates of both antlerless deer and buck deer, as provided by the department, should be used only as a general guideline for harvesting deer. If more intense management of a place is desired, we suggest that the landowner should survey deer populations on his ranch on his own, this will allow him to get a more accurate representation of the deer found on his ranch. Please notice that in most cases the department recommends more antlerless deer to be harvested than bucks.

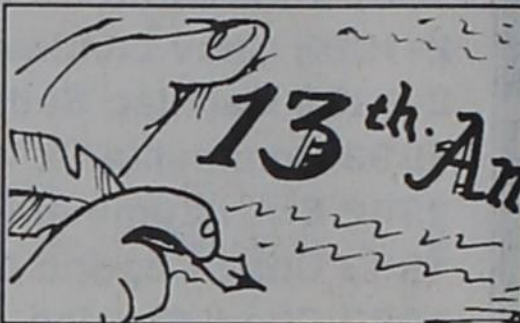
The recommended guideline for harvesting antlerless deer throughout most of Eastland County is 1 antlerless deer per 200 acres. The recommended buck harvest for the county is 1 mature buck per 400

The blood drive will be held on November 17th at the De Leon City Hall at 107 South Texas from 2 to 6 p. m.



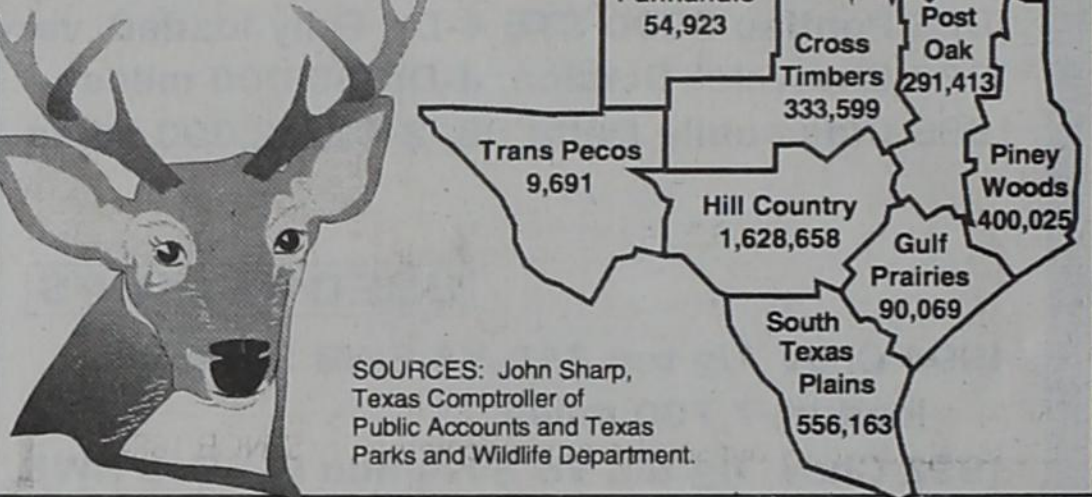

## Richards Safeguards Texas Property Rights Assurances

Austin — Governor Ann Richards announced Tuesday, September 27th that the federal government will halt work on designating Texas land as "critical habitat" for the golden cheeked warbler.

"Earlier this month, I wrote Secretary Babbitt to recommend that the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service drop its plan to designate critical habitat for the warbler in Central Texas," Richards said. "Today I am pleased to announce that Secretary Babbitt has agreed with my request."

In his letter, Babbitt told Gov. Richards that he had "instructed the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service to cease work on warbler critical habitat designation. I agree with you that normal agricultural and ranching activities in Texas have little impact on golden cheeked warbler habitat."

Recently, the legal basis for the office of County Judge in the Texas Constitution, being Article V-15, was quoted as being: "There shall be established in each county in this state a county court, which shall be a court of record; and there shall be elected in each county, by the qualified voters, a county judge, who shall be well informed in the law of the State; shall be a conservator of the peace, and shall hold his office for four years, and until his successor shall be elected and qualified".

Portions of this Article V-15 were not included and are as follows:

"The Constitution declares that County Judges "shall be well informed in the law of the state". "As a matter of practical politics, this means that no formal study of law nor a license to practice law is required as a part of the qualifications of County Judge. The main qualification is the ability to be elected." Also, "Trial of criminal case before a non-attorney judge does not violate due process."

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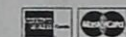
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
