



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

Too much humidity can soften wicker glue joints and create a buildup of nasty mildew. Even vinyl seat coverings can take a beating and accumulate dirt from outdoor elements, party spills and heavy use.

To keep your porch furniture in tip-top shape throughout the season, the experts at Murphy's Oil Soap offer the following advice for preserving your treated outdoor furniture for years of summertime enjoyment:

· When not in use, cover outdoor wood furniture to protect it from the

· Thoroughly clean outdoor furniture, including wicker and vinyl seat cushions at least once a month with a gentle soap such as Murphy's Oil Soap and a well-wrung sponge. Rinse and place furniture in the shade to dry.
