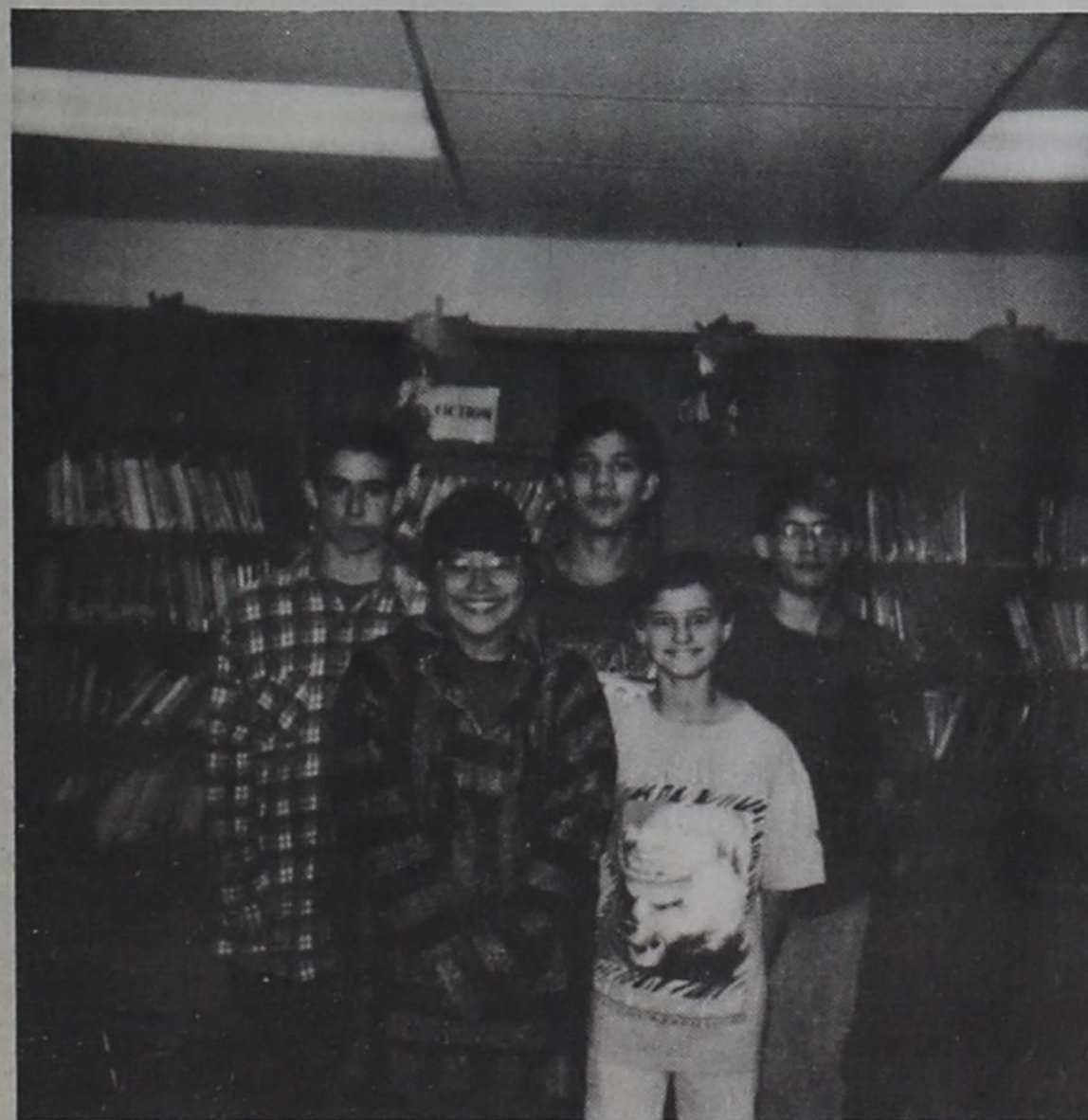
Spook Parade Draws Large Turnout

The Gorman Panthers ended their season on Friday night with a win over the Santo Wildcats at Santo with a shutout 15 to 0 victory. The win gave the Panthers a 3-7 mark on the season and a 13A District mark of 3 and 3.

The Panthers, led by "Panther of the Week" Don Mauney, scored in the second and fourth quarters for their victory.

Gorman hit the scoreboard first with 5:51 left in the second quarter when Jeremy Sanders got the final yard for the score to cap a 69 yard drive in just 5 plays. The score was set up by a marvelous 49 yard run by Don Mauney to set the Panthers up at the Santo 18. Following runs of 6, 5 and 6 yards, Sanders hit paydirt. The kick for points failed and the score was 6-0.

The rest of the second quarter was played on fairly even terms.

The Panther Marching Band did a great job in their final halftime performance of the year and brought the crowd to their feet with their performance. The band has done a marvelous job this year under the leadership of Lisa Laminack.

Following the intermission the two teams didn't move the ball much the entire third quarter with neither team showing much offensive punch.

Then with 1:43 left on the clock in the final quarter, The Big Red got the insurance points to secure the victory when Don Mauney booted a beautiful 30 yard field goal to put the Panthers up 9 to 0. The scoring drive began at the Santo 49, with the Panthers moving to the Santo 20 before being forced to kick the field goal.

Then with 1:25 left on the clock, Don Mauney intercepted a last ditch Wildcat pass at about the Santo 40 yard line and raced into the end zone for the score to put the frosting on the cake. The run for two points failed and the Panthers had their third victory of the season sewed up.

Don Mauney led the Panthers with 158 yards on 20 carries. Jeremy Sanders had 78 yards on 17 carries. Scotty Walton hit for 11 yards on 4 tries. Marco Herrera was -5 on one carry.

Don Mauney won "Panther of the Week" honors with his outstanding performance in the game. If this outstanding player is not listed on the 13A All-District list there will surely be something wrong with the pickers of the list.

Don had an interception for a touchdown, booted a field goal, got 158 yards on 20 carries, besides doing yeoman service on the Big Red defense.

Also the senior players for the Panthers, Noah Landa, Brent Skaggs Scotty Walton and Josh Weldon, are due some very loud accolades for their performance in this game, as well as for all the entire season with their leadership and performances with some real tough losses which could have made the Panthers' season much brighter. But one thing for sure, the Big Red just kept on chugging, showing their determination to do their very best for "Good Ole GHS". They deserve our praise and a big "pat on the back" for their performances.

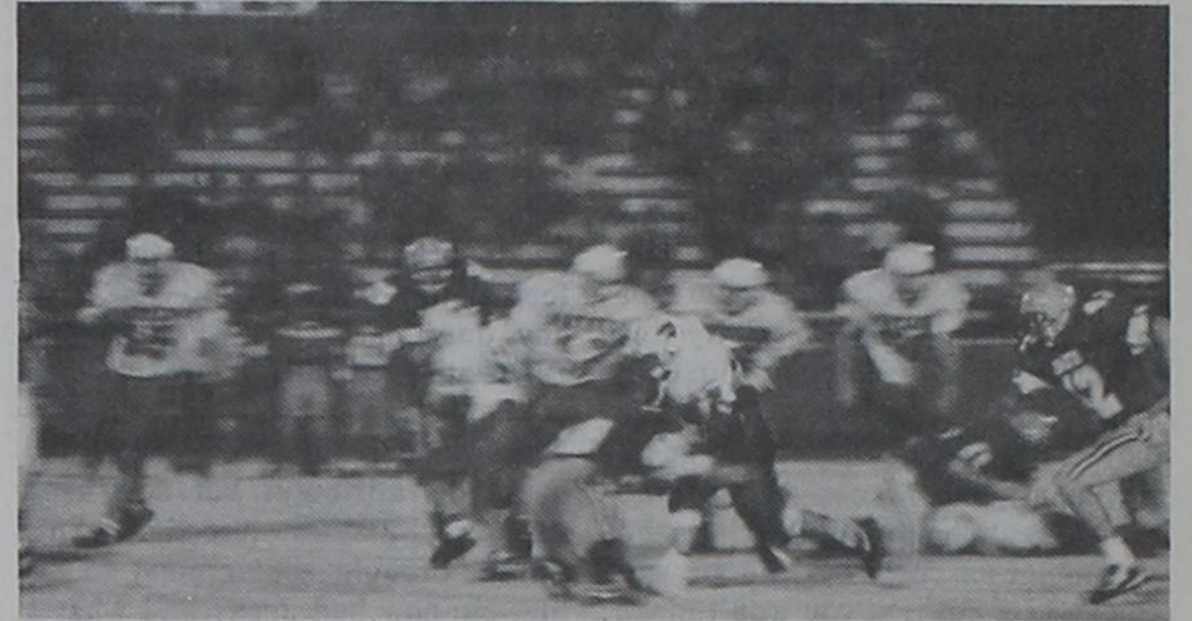
Services For Floyd Girtz Held At Cedar Hill

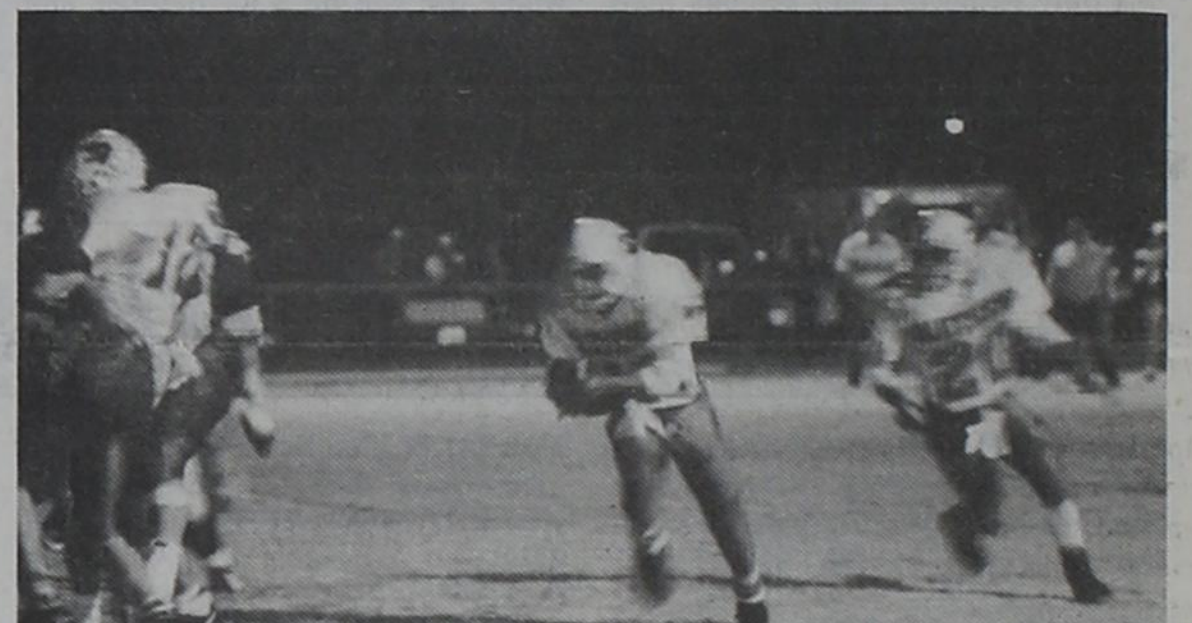

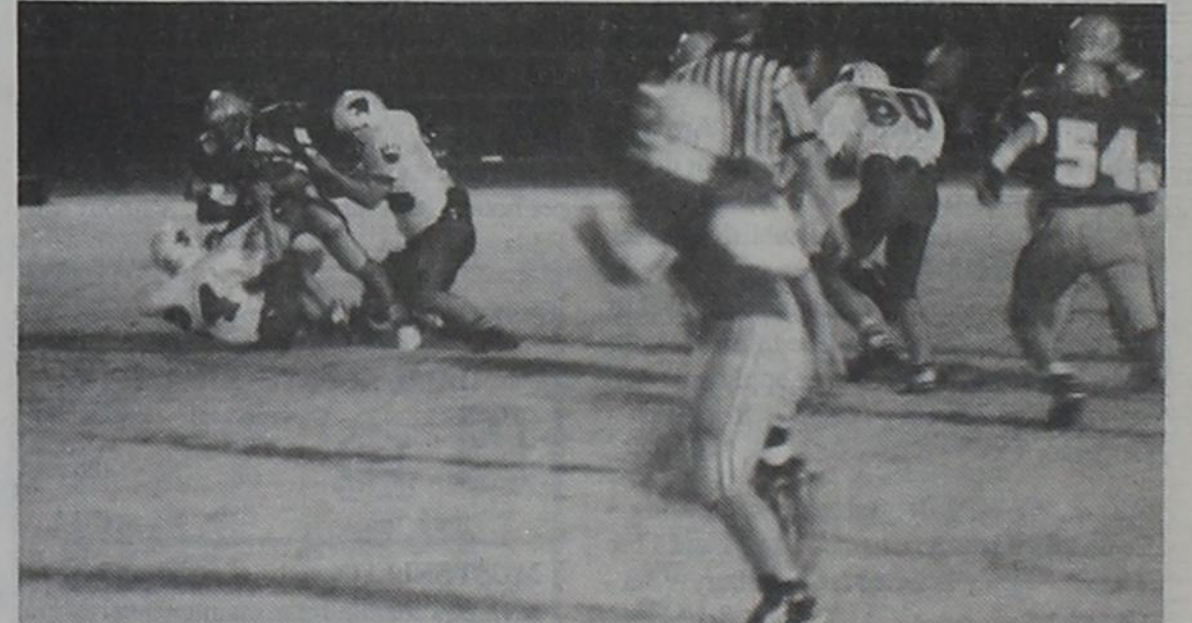
