Order Restricting Outdoor Burning Set

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court has determined that circumstances present in all or part of the unincorporated area of the county create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning;

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED by the Commissioners Court of Eastland County that all outdoor burning is banned in the unincorporated area of the county for 90 days from the date of adoption of this Order, unless the restrictions are terminated earlier based on a determination made by the Texas Forest Service or this Court. This Order is adopted pursuant to Local Government Code 204.906, and other applicable statutes. This order does not prohibit outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Commission for (1) firefighter training; (2) public utility, natural gas pipeline or mining operations; or (3) planting or harvesting of agricultural crops; or, (4) burns that are conducted by a prescribed burn manager certified under Section 153.048, Natural Resources Code, and meet the standards of Section 153.047, Natural Resources Code.

In accordance with Local Government Code 204.906(h), a violation of this Order is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by a fine not to exceed \$500.00

City Commission Passes and **Adopts Animal Ordinance**

Ordinance #335-B---an ordinance providing comprehensive requirements for the keeping and care of animals and fowl, providing for the control, regulation, licensing, permitting and vaccination of dogs and cats, providing regulations and requirement for other animals, fowl, livestock and wid and exotic animals, providing certain exemptions, providing fines and penalties, making finding of fact, providing an effective date, and providing for certain related matters---was pass and adopted by the City Commission on August 15, 2002.

The following has been taken from the adoption of this ordinance: Nuisance means the conduct of any owner in allowing an animal to: 1: Engage in conduct which establishes such animal as a "dangerous

2: Damage, soil, defile or defecate on private property other than the owner's or on public property unless such waste is immediately removed and properly disposed of by the owner of the animal;

3: Be at large (excluding house cats);

4: Cause a disturbance by excessive barking or other noise made near the private residence of another;

5: Produce odors or unclean conditions sufficient to annoy persons living in the vicinity; or

6: Chase vehicles or molest, attack or interfere with other animals or persons on public property. Owner means any person who has right of property in an animal and/or is harboring an animal.

Proper Enclosure means a house or building, or in the case of a fence or structure/pen, the fence or structure/pen must be at minimum dimensions of five feet by ten feet. The fence or structure/pen must form an enclosure suitable to prevent entry of young children and must be locked and secured such that an animal such that an animal cannot climb, dig, jump or otherwise escape of its own volition. The enclosure shall be securely locked at all times and have secure sides to prevent a dangerous animal or registered dangerous dog from escaping from the enclosure. The structure/pen shall provide protection from the elements for the animal. The Animal Control Officer may require a fence higher than four feet or require a secure top and/or a secure top and/or a secure bottom to the structure/pen if the need is demonstrated.


Obituary
