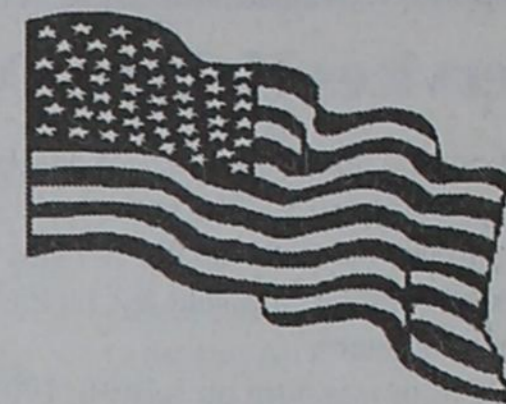

## Gorman Vs. Baird District 12A Opener

The J.H. Volleyball teams continued to play well as the 7th grade took 2 games and the 8th grade split games with Stephenville. The J.H. takes on Dublin this Thursday in Gorman at 4:00. The Varsity dropped games to Lingleville and Ranger to fall to 0-3 in District play. The Lady Panthers did look much improved against Ranger on Saturday. They will play Moran here on Tuesday and travel to Lingleville on Saturday. Saturday's game was tentatively changed to 3:00 p.m. tentatively in order to allow the band members who play to get back in time for the game.

The J.H. Football team fell behind early in a 37-8 loss to the Baird Bears. However, the boys looked much better the second half controlling the ball all but 3 minutes of the half. The Varsity football team dropped a District game to Baird 35-0. Both teams try to bounce back against Cross Plains this week. The J.H. plays here at 6:00 p.m. on Thursday. The Varsity travels to Cross Plains Friday for a 7:30 p.m. kick-off.

Note: Three week grade check are Friday. If the students which failed the 1st six weeks are passing all classes, then they regain their eligibility to play at 3:36 p.m. on October 26th.

## Gorman at Cross Plains Friday at 7:30 p.m. Coach Tyson

The Gorman football team travels to Cross Plains this Friday to take on the Buffaloes. Cross Plains is 5-1 on the year and 1-0 in Dist. 12-A. The Panthers are 0-6 and 0-1 on the year. "We will definitely have our hands full this Friday. Cross Plains has been playing some fine ball and has good athletes and size on both sides of the ball." The Buffaloes are led by #7 Butler on offense. He plays quarterback and is a threat to run or pass. Butler's favorite target is #40 Dillard, a big athletic tightend. #9 Beggs is their best runner out of the backfield. Cross Plains bases out of a Pro I and Pro Wing set on offense which averages right at 300 yards per game and 26.3 pts per game (their 28-6 win over Santa Anna was called at half). On defense, Cross Plains bases out of a split 6 look that allows less than 150 yards per game and 13 pts per game." The Buffaloes have 2 stout defensive ends in #40 and #59. In addition, their inside linebackers are as good as any in district (#55 and #9).

**Coaches comments on Baird game and upcoming Cross Plains game:** We said we had to do 3 things to have a chance to win.

Those 3 things were no turnovers, no busted assignments, and no more than 15 yards of penalties. We had 8 turnovers, several busted assignments and 25 yards of penalties. Without a doubt the turnovers were devastating to us. Baird had a short field to play with the whole first half. The turnovers were a result of a combination of things and no one person can take the blame. When we busted an assignment as a backer lineman it causes problems. Hopefully as we gain experience we minimize the effect of a bust and just take our loss on the play. The Baird defense caused a couple of turnovers by their play as well. We will continue to work on our assignments so in the future we have fewer and fewer busts. As for as penalties, I was not too disappointed since we only had three. I have to give Baird credit, they played more aggressively on defense then they had all year.

They stacked the line of scrimmage and manned up on our eligible receivers. They had good athletes and took our passing game away with pressure on the QB and great coverage. The key to defeating their defense was to crash down on their gap penetration and kickout to find a scam. The problem was we didn't down block consistently enough to establish a drive. Combine that with busts and turnovers and you can see why we struggled offensively. Defensively we had some busted assignments early in the game that resulted in big plays or touchdowns for them. When we played assignment football, we had better success slowing the Beard down.

We still have a lot to work on and we have a few position changes due to injuries. We have to get better at protecting the football and tackling. Consistent execution is a priority as well. We must do a better job of trying to wind the field position battle. Cross Plains will be a difficult task for us. Once again however, if we do those "3" things we'll be right there in the ballgame.

The Gorman Panthers opened District 12-A play Friday night at Baird and came away on the short end of a 35-0 score. The Panthers got behind 26-0 in the first period after fumbling the ball on their own end of the field to give the Bears good field position. The halftime score was 33-0 and the Bears got a safety on the Panthers to make it 35-0.

Baird scored first following a Panther fumble on the Gorman 9 and Todd Vestal going 9 yards with 8:16 left. The kick failed and the score was 6-0.

The Bears scored again with 7:56 left in the first after intercepting a Panther pass on the Gorman 18 and L. J. Mendez returning the INT for the score. Again the kick failed and Baird led 12-0.

Baird got another score off a Gorman fumble on the Panther 42. The Bears scored in 4 plays with Zack Harmon going the final 16 yards with 3:58 left in the first. A pass to Sean Rountree added the 2 point play and the Bears led 20-0.

In the next possession the Bears got the ball on the Panther 4 after another fumble and the Bears scored in 2 plays with Todd Vestal getting the final 15 after a Baird penalty with 18 seconds left in the first period. Again the kick failed and Baird was up 26-0 at the end of the first period on 4 Gorman turnovers.

In the second the Bears scored on a 3 yard run by Harmon after the Bears got another turnover on an interception on the Gorman 49 with 7:00 left in the period. The drive took 7 plays. Harmon booted the point after and Baird was up 33-0.

Baird got a safety in the third period when the Gorman punter stepped out the end zone on a punt try to make the final score 35-0.

The last half the teams played on a fairly end terms.

The Gorman Panther Band and the Baird Bear Band both turned in fine performances for the fans and received great ovations from the fans.

Rolando Torres led the Panthers with 28 yards on 9 carries. Josh Caruth got 25 yards on 9 tries and Sawyer Wright had a plus 3 on 9 snaps but lost 17 yards on pass tries.

Next week the Panthers will travel to Cross Plains to play the Buffaloes on Friday in a 7:30 p.m. game at Buffalo Stadium. The Buffaloes have a very good team and this one should be another tough one for the Panthers. So come on out and give the Panthers all the support we can give them.

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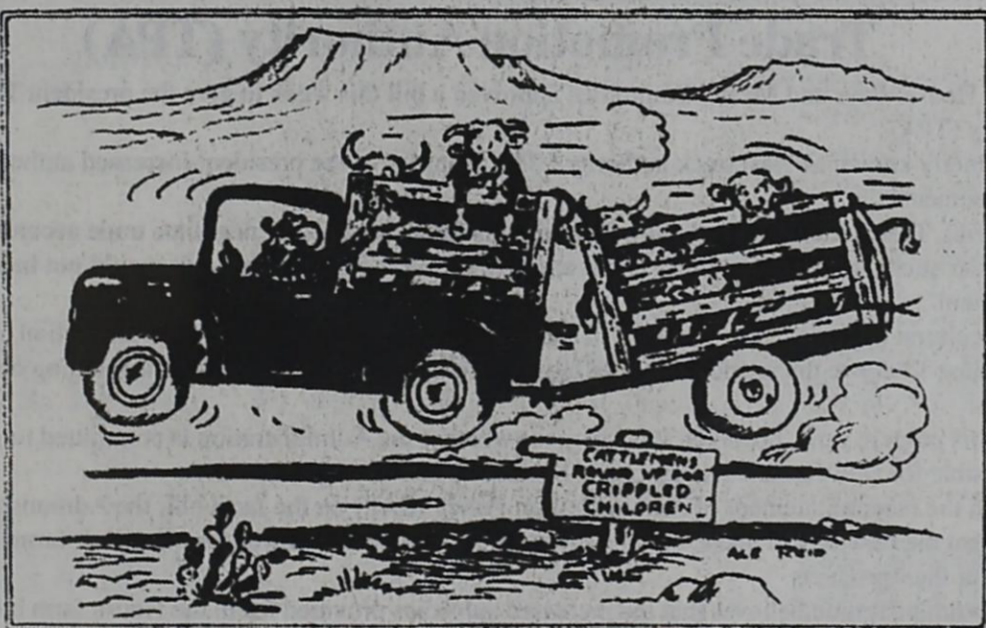

**Senate Now Working on Farm Bill**

As I indicated last week, the House has passed "The Farm Security Act," a farm bill that reauthorizes federal farm programs through the year 2011.

While this was a significant step, it is important to keep in mind that this was just the first step in a long process of developing a farm bill.

It is now up to the Senate to take further action.

I understand that Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle wants the Senate to consider a farm bill before the end of the first session of this Congress.

This could be some time around Thanksgiving.

The Chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee has scheduled a hearing to begin marking up legislation this coming week.

It is generally believed that the Senate version will differ from the House version in that there will be more emphasis on conservation, and a reduction in spending for commodities.

In addition, the Senate may add a section dealing with concentration among agricultural sectors, a so-called "competition title."

The White House would prefer that further action on a farm bill not be taken until next year, when the 2002 farm bill expires.

Despite the fact that the Administration declined repeated offers from the House Agriculture Committee to provide input on the farm bill, the Administration has indicated they intend to work closely with the Senate in writing their version of the farm bill.

Once the Senate passes a farm bill, it will be necessary for the House and Senate to hold a conference to work out a compromise between the two bills.

Following that, each chamber will have to take one more vote on the final version before sending it to the White House for a signature.

At this point in time, a presidential signature is not a sure bet, even if the House and Senate can come to a final agreement on farm bill legislation.

I am hopeful that we will soon have a bill that will be good for producers and one that provides a greater level of certainty to the nation's agricultural economy.

**Trade Promotion Authority (TPA)**

The House Ways and Means Committee approved a bill this week to give the president Trade Promotion Authority (TPA).

Formerly known as "fast track authority," TPA would give the president increased authority to negotiate trade agreements.

In brief, TPA authority would allow the Administration to speedily negotiate trade accords.

Under such authority, Congress could approve or reject such treaties, but would not have the ability to amend them.

Agricultural trade would be included in these accords. I have supported "trade promotion authority" in the past because I believe the president should have the full support of Congress in negotiating on behalf of U.S. interests.

At this point in time, however, it is not clear whether the Administration is committed to getting the best deal possible for U.S. farmers and ranchers, businesses and other job interests.

With the recent Statement of Administration Policy (SAP) on the farm bill, the Administration seems to believe that the best way to make U.S. agriculture competitive is to lower the prices our farmers and ranchers receive for their products.

The Administration believes that the increased subsidies provided for in the House farm bill would undermine the ability of the U.S. to negotiate in the next round of negotiations by the World Trade Organization (WTO).

I disagree with their opinion, and I believe that the restriction on counter-cyclical payments is a clear indication of our own commitment to free and fair trade.

I also believe that until we get our competitors to reduce their agricultural subsidies, we should do everything within the current WTO limits to ensure that our farmers and ranchers receive a fair price for what they produce and a fair deal in trade. This is currently not the case.

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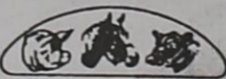

## AVIATION SECURITY

"These are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman. Tyranny, like hell, is not easily conquered; yet we have this consolation with us, that the harder the conflict, the more glorious the triumph. What we obtain too cheap, we esteem too lightly; it is dearness only that gives every thing its value. Heaven knows how to put a proper price upon its goods; and it would be strange indeed if so celestial an article as freedom should not be highly rated."

That was written by the American revolutionary Thomas Paine in his pamphlet "The Crisis" to inspire the Continental Army as it fought for freedom and independence. It is as true today as it was 225 years ago. As we maneuver our way through this unimaginable time that tries our souls, freedom is even dearer.

Our world is a different world now. Ever since September 11th, everything has changed. Yet some things will remain the same: Americans, and our leadership, are still strong. With heavy hearts for those who lost their lives, we will go on. We will keep our nation strong, our economy strong, and our spirits strong.

We began work immediately after the horror: when the President spoke out forcefully about our will and resolve; the FBI and CIA immediately began tracking suspects; the State Department reached out to other nations to build a coalition to stop terrorism; and, here at home, the Defense Department called up reservists to help patrol our airports and our air space. In addition, the FAA banned all knives on airplanes and increased security in airports across the nation.

This issue of aviation security is of particular interest to me, and one on which I have long been working as the ranking member on the Aviation subcommittee and a former vice chairman of the National Transportation Safety Board.

One of our key priorities is to restore the public's confidence in air travel as quickly as possible. Therefore, in the days immediately following this tragedy, I introduced legislation to expand the air marshal program, wherein trained, armed security officers would be assigned to passenger flights to help ensure our safety. This program would free our pilots to concentrate solely on their job - flying. I have already seen peace officers on some flights - detailed from other law enforcement agencies - but we need to make this a permanent and organized effort.

I believe that federalizing all aviation security functions is an important step in that direction. Currently, security is the responsibility of the airlines - who have different concerns and priorities besides national security. Our transportation security must be a priority, with the focus, coordination and influence that having a dedicated federal office would give.

That is why I am introducing legislation that would completely revamp aviation security, and place baggage security screeners and federal air marshals under one umbrella. We will institute a higher performance standard for our security practices and personnel, including extensive background checks, as well as more rigorous training that would result in a stronger, more consistent security system in our nation's airports.

Currently, airport security is a mishmash of private security firms employing low-paid workers with a staggeringly high turnover rate. To attract competent, dedicated people who can ensure our safety, I firmly believe that airport security needs to be a career, not just a temporary minimum-wage job.

We will fortify the cockpit in the aircraft. We are also upgrading the equipment used to screen passengers and their luggage to the new state-of-the-art technology available.

A columnist recently wrote, "The World Trade Center isn't the place where our intelligence agencies failed. It is the place where our imaginations failed." Until September 11th, we believed nothing like this could ever happen on our lands. That sense of security has now been shattered, but our spirit has not. We will institute new security measures. We will defend our citizens - and we will defend our freedom.

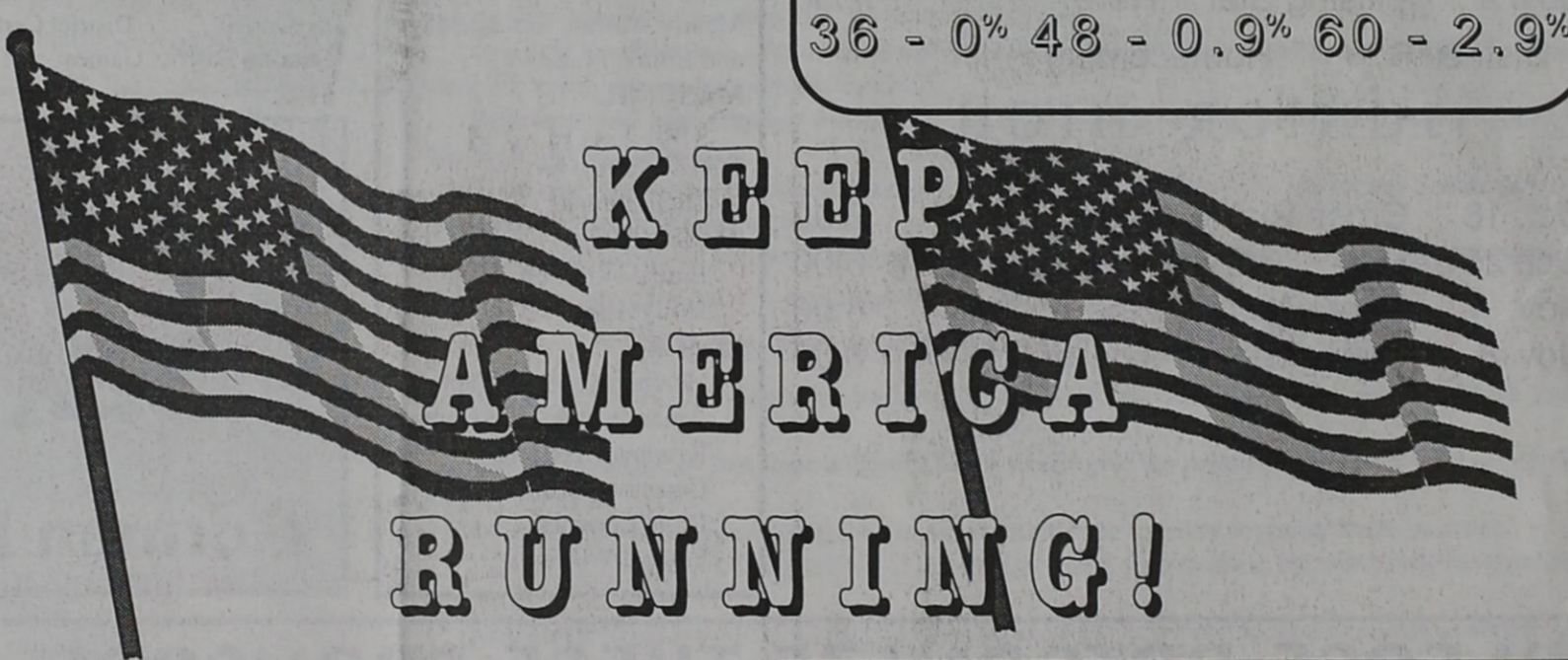

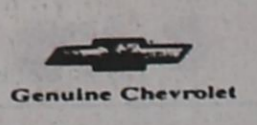
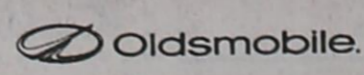
