



Robert Lee Stubblefield

Services for Robert Lee Stubblefield, former psychiatry department chairman at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School at Dallas and chief of psychiatry at Parkland Hospital, was Tuesday, January 22, 2002 at Christ Church Cathedral, 1117 Texas Ave. in Houston.

Dr. Stubblefield, 82, died on Friday (January 18, 2002) at Memorial Hermann Hospital in Houston.

Dr. Stubblefield was brought to UT Southwestern in 1957 as its first full-time professor to expand psychiatry at the school and its then partner hospitals, Parkland Memorial Hospital and Woodlawn Memorial Hospital. He spent 14 years building the department.

"He was an articulate speaker and a fine scholar," said Maurice Korman, a psychiatry professor at UT Southwestern.

Dr. Stubblefield also had a passion for educating and training other doctors.

"His favorite thing to do was educating," said his wife, Alice Ostermayer Stubblefield of Houston.

Dr. Stubblefield was a volunteer psychiatry. clinical professor at schools including the University of Colorado School of Medicine, Louisiana State University, Tulane University School of Medicine, University of Texas Medical School at Houston, Yale School of Medicine, University of Texas Medical School at Galveston, and Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

He was among those appointed to work on several high-profile law cases. He examined Edwin A. Walker, a retired army major general who was one of the leading spokesmen for conservative causes in the 1960s.

He attended John Tarleton College, now Tarleton State University, before graduating from the University of Texas with a bachelor's degree in 1939. He earned his medical degree from the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston in 1942. He served in the Navy Reserves from 1942 to 1944.

After leaving UT Southwestern, he served for three years as an associate director of Western Interstate Commission of Higher Education, as a medical director in Connecticut. He became medical di-

In addition to his wife, Dr. Stubblefield is survived by daughters Carol Rowley of Denton and Susan Fisk of Dallas, sister Frances Bishop of Eastland, and four grandsons.
