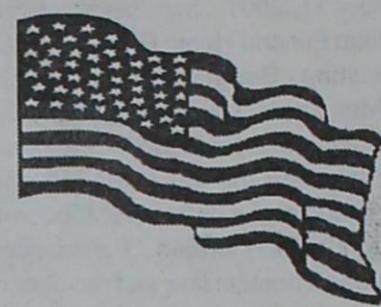

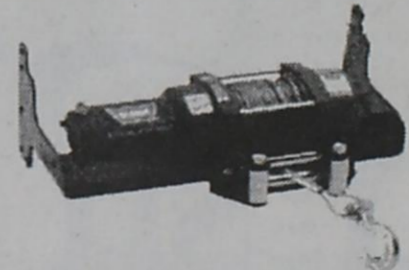

Exit TAAS Tests To Be Taken February 19-21

The TAAS tests will be offered this February at Gorman High School to those students who need a passing score in one or more parts of the test. By current state law, students must pass all sections of the test in order to receive a high school diploma.

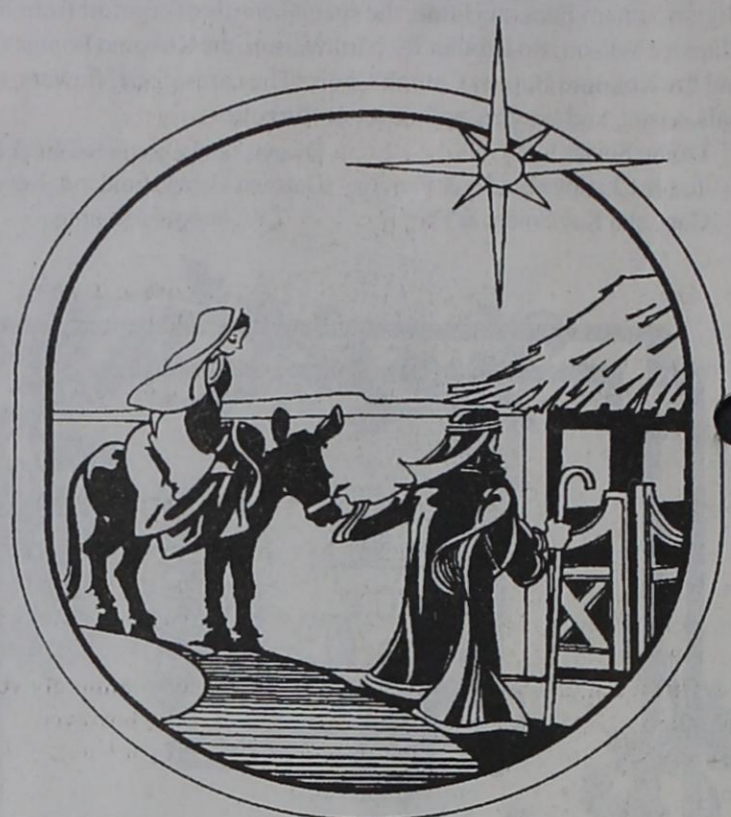
Anyone in the community who has completed all graduation requirements except for passing the TAAS may take these tests to try to earn a high school diploma. A person only has to take that portion of the test that he or she did not pass in high school. Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and who wish to retake a portion of the TAAS may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus. At Gorman High School registration forms are in the Counselor's office. Registration forms may also be completed online by accessing the web site at <http://k12testing.tx.ncspearson.com/oos>.

Forms must be completed and are to be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than January 18, 2002. Students who are currently enrolled in Gorman High School do not need to register for this test.

Persons who have not finished high school and who are interested in obtaining their diplomas, must fulfill the requirements for graduation that were in effect when their class graduated. Therefore, if the TAAS was not required for a person's class, it would not be required today. Texas Tech also has a correspondence program enabling a person to receive a high school diploma through correspondence courses. GED tests are offered monthly at Ranger College and Cisco Junior College.

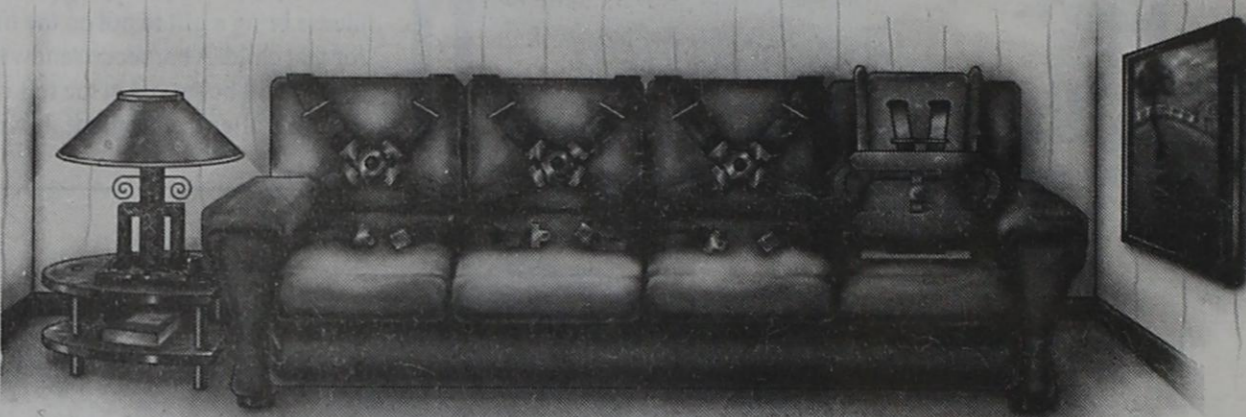

Senate Farm Bill

The Senate continues to work on the farm bill and, as of Thursday, December 13, this legislation is still a work in progress.

Farm groups have continued to urge the Senate to complete work on the farm bill as soon as possible so that Senators and House Members can meet in a conference committee to work out differences between the two bills.

Once a conference is completed, both the House and Senate would still have to vote on the final version before it could be sent to the president for a signature.

The House pushed hard to complete a farm bill this year and I hope Senate will do likewise.

Senate Finance Committee Approves TPA

Last week, the House passed legislation granting the President trade promotion authority (TPA). Formerly known as fast track authority, TPA would increase the president's authority to negotiate international trade agreements with other countries.

This week, the Senate Finance Committee overwhelmingly voted to give the president such trade authority. It appears, however, that this measure will not be brought before the full Senate until sometime next year.

U.S. Extremely Unlikely to Get Mad Cow Disease

Harvard University has now released a study indicating that the U.S. was "extremely unlikely" to get bovine spongiform encephalopathy (BSE or mad cow disease).

According to the report, the measures that have been taken by government and industry make the U.S. robust against the spread of mad cow disease, in the event it should occur in the U.S. at some point in time.

The U.S. livestock and meat industries were understandably pleased with the report that confirms the effectiveness of the steps that have already been taken to suppress mad cow disease.

These include import controls that block imports of meat and live animals from nations with BSE; feed controls that prevent the introduction of the disease into herds; and a surveillance program that is statistically designed to detect, with a high degree of certainty, BSE in cattle.

The USDA indicated that next year it intends to double the number of cattle it tests for BSE to more than 12,500.

U.S. Ag Exports on the Rise

U.S. agricultural exports for fiscal year 2002 are expected to reach \$54.5 billion, according to USDA. This will be the highest export figure in five years.

I should point out, however, that this forecast is \$2.5 billion less than USDA's August projection. This is because growing world surpluses and shrinking demand have reduced the prices that had been expected.

The fact of the matter is that the strong U.S. dollar makes U.S. exports less competitive with other nations. In terms of agricultural imports into the U.S., the figure remains steady at \$39 billion, which is unchanged from last year.

In an interesting development this week, a ship carrying 24,000 tons of U.S. corn is on its way to Cuba. This is a very positive development for U.S. agriculture.

The decades old embargo the U.S. has had on trade with Cuba has only served to hurt our own farmers and ranchers. Our trading partners benefit from trade with Cuba, and the U.S. needs to do likewise.

The trade potential with Cuba is tremendous, and I am hopeful this shipment of corn will be the first of many future shipments of U.S. commodities to Cuba.

Ethanol Production Increases

Ethanol production continues to rise and, in October, averaged a record-high 121,000 barrels per day, according to the U.S. Department of Energy.

This year, U.S. ethanol production is on course to produce an annual record of 1.8 billion gallons, according to the Renewable Fuels Association. Increased ethanol production is another positive development for U.S. agriculture.

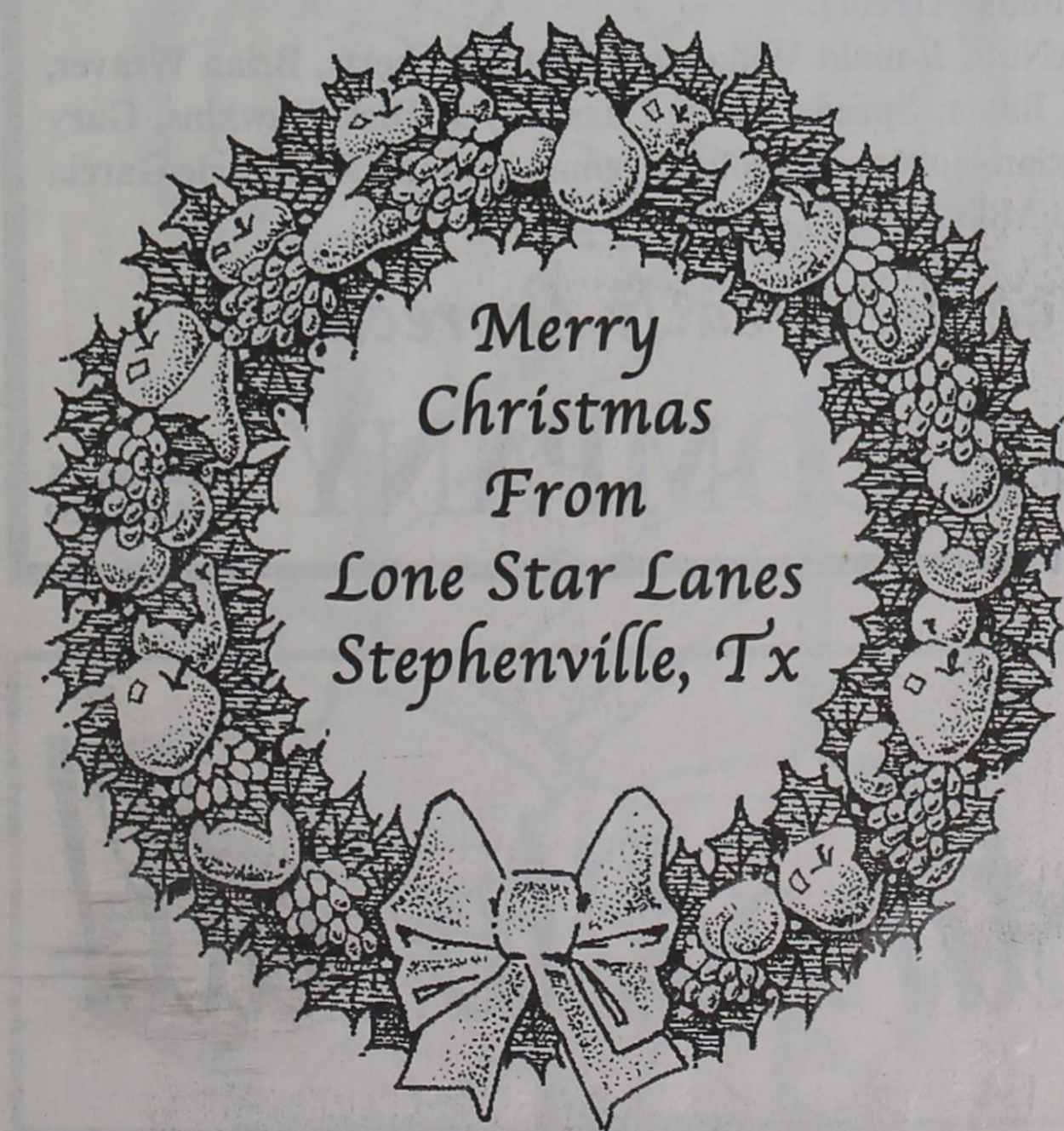

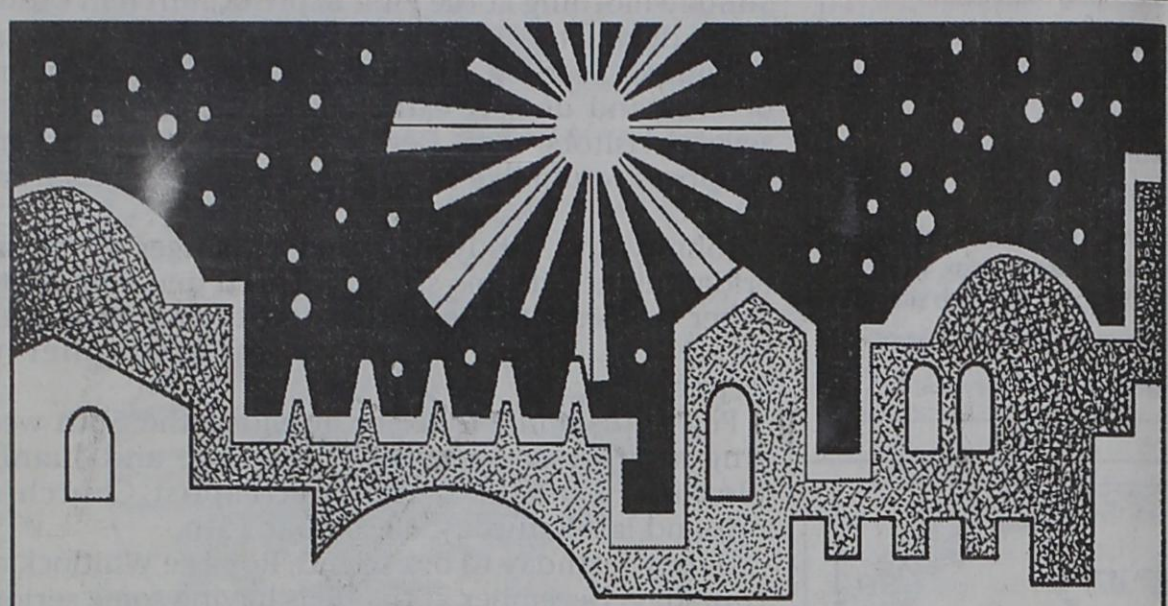

Keep the faith!

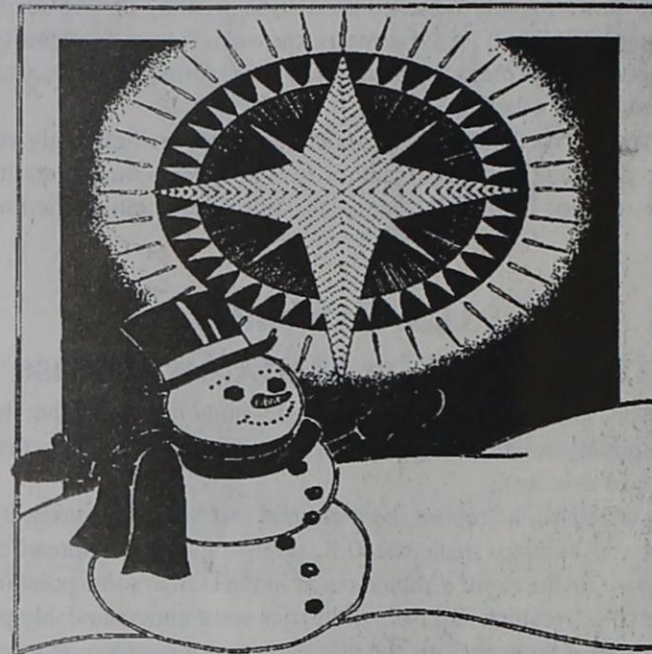

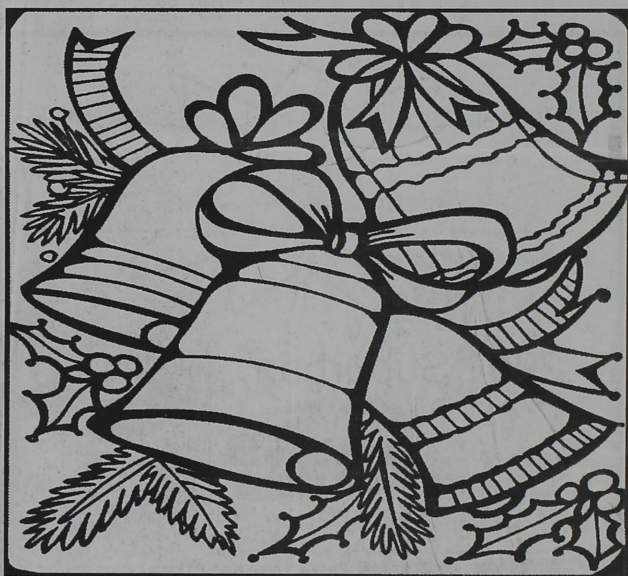

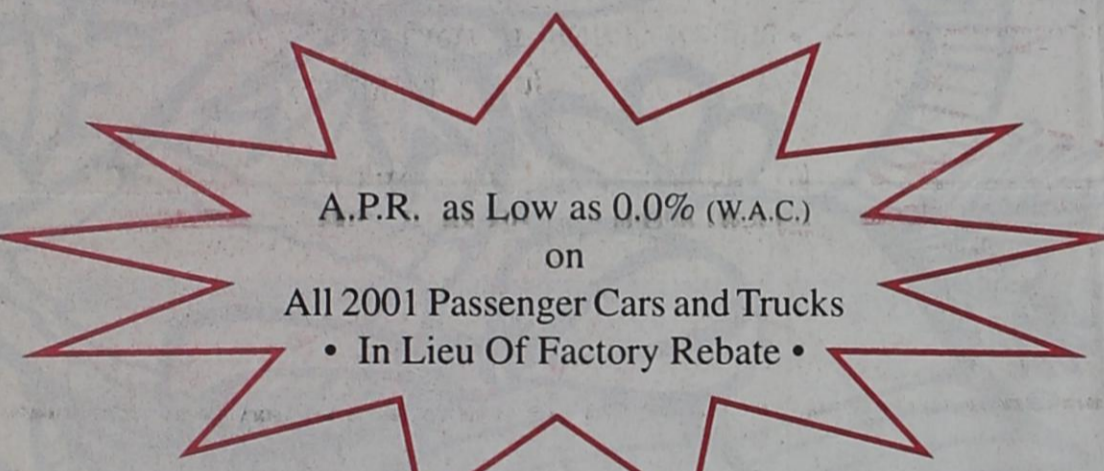
