CONTRACT AWARDED Co-operation Is Pledged

500 or 600 Farmers of Howard County Pledge Compliance With Control Regulations for Worse

That the farmers of Howard County are keenly interested in doing everything in their power to help combat the pink boll work menace and get our county away from the harm of a non-cotton sone just as soon as possible was apparent from the large attendance, and the fine spirit of cooperation which marked the meeting held in the district court room in Big Spring at 3:30 oclock last Monday afternoon to discuss the pink boll worm situation

Fred J. Kealing presided as chairman and gave alk who cared to an opportunity to express their views on the various problems which came up for solution.

It was pointed out that the State Pink Bollworm Commission had been convinced that the regalated zone was the best plan to follow this year, and R. E. Me-Donald, state entomologist, going to work with the seven West Texas counties in an effort to prevent the Federal authorities from es from high noon light to night inflicting the non-cotton zone on us. That we may escape the noncotton zone next year it is absolutely necessary to keep our county free of pink boll worms and it is believed this can be done if every farmer will follow to the letter, every quarantine and control measure prescribed by the federal and state inspectors. Even. a few failing to abide by the regulations will cause trouble for the entire county-so a cheerful and wholehearted cooperation is the

best policy for our people C. T. Watson stated Mr. McDonald was now fully convinced the non-cotton zone was unnecessary and was going to do everything in his power to belp West Texas. He stated that Mr. McDonald had a hard fight to overcome the place of the federal department of agriculture and other cotton states to force a non-cotton zone in West Texas and he deserved the hearty ecoperation of our people in this. If we all stand by McDonald we may prevent this calamity being visited upon us.

He advised that during a rece visit Mr. McDonald had made arrangements to install two cotionseed sterilization plants in Big Spring, and one at Coahoma, and these would be ready to begin operation just as soon as the material could be received and set

up. A motion prevailed that all cotton seed in Howard County be sterlized that as soon as the state department of agriculture installs making is a source of gratifica- its sterilization plants. State Entomologist McDonald was given the assurance that the citizenship of Howard County was going to cooperate 100 per cent since they realized that only by cooperation can we hope to eradicate the boll worm and prevent our county from being placed in a non-cotton zone. It was furthermore agreed that a representative from Howard County be sent to the Southern States Cotton meeting at Memphis, Tenn., March 30, to back up Mr. McDonald in his efforts to prevent West Texas from being placed in a non-cotton zone.

This representative was authorized to pledge to the meeting at Memphis that Howard County Tarmers were going to faithfully and fully cooperate with the state and federal forces in eradicating the pink boll worm. C. T. Watson. secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, was elected by acclamation to represent Howard County at the Memphis meeting.

A subscription list was started in the meeting and \$86 raised in grick time. It was suggested by representatives of the three banks that the \$80 be returned be the donors and that the Chamit of Commerce would pay the penses of the representative Those who donated the \$80 voted

Sterilization Plants for County

Three Sterilleation Plants Author ized by State Department to be Installed Hero Immediately

Machinery is now on the road for three sterilization plans to be installed in Howard County and these plants will be put in operation just as soon as possible. Two of the plants will be located in Big Spring and one will be located at Coahoma. An effort is being made to have another plant installed at Ackerly.

R E. McDonald, chief entemplogist of the state department of agriculture, was here Thursday and Friday of last week to confer with chamber of commerce executives and make arrangements for the installation of the sterilization plants.

One of the plants will be set up at the Planters Cotton Gin and the other at the White Gin Co.'s place on East Second street.

There will be no charge for sterilizing the planting seed for the 1928 crop.

Just as soon as the machinery in set up and ready to start operation, notices will be sent to all parts of the county so the work of sterilizing all cotton seed in How. and County can be carried forward. As we understand the operation a great amount of time is not required to properly treat the cotton seed, so no great inconvenience is going to be visited upon anyone.

KILLING PLANT LICE

Plant lice feed on plants in untold numbers, and cause considerable damage to vegetables and fruit crops, states C. Woolsey, Extension Service, College of Agriculture. University of Arkansas They get their food by sucking the sap from the plant and therefore, cannot be poisoned like the chewing insects, but killed by some contact spray that covers their body or sends off "fumes" that produce the same effect.

The nicotine spray and dustcontaining nicotine are commonly used. The recommendations for small gardens is a teaspoonful of nicotine of sulphate or "Black eaf 40" to one gallon of water. Add to this mixture a one-inch cube of soap. Thoroughly mix the soap with the water by first shav ing it into small bits. If possible use the yellow type of laundry

1. Peter's Confession of Christ

(vv. 27-30).

Two questions of Jesus provoked this confession. 1. "Who do men say that I am?" (vv. 27, 28). This question referred to the opinions of the people regarding Jesus. Some believed Him to be John, the Baptist, some Elljah, and some, one of the prophets. They all recognized Him to be a teacher or prophet with more than human authority and power. Jesus was not content with this acknowledgment. Had He been satisfied with this He would not have been molested in Jernsalem, for the Jews willingly acknowledged Him as much more than a human teacher. 2. "Who say ye that I am?" (vv. 29, 30). Jesus persistently claimed to be the God man, the very Son of God in carnate. He wanted the personal opinion of the disciples concerning Himself.

Himself.

11. Jesus' Teaching Concerning the Cross (vv. 31-33).

He charged the disciples not to make public His Mossiahship as that would precipitate the crisis. The disciples had much need of instruction yet, to prepare them for the crucial hour of the cross.

1. What He taught (v. 31)

(1) "The Bon of Man must suffer many things." He suffered physical weariness and hunger, ridicule and contempt and even misunderstanding and inck of appreciation on the part of his friends and disciples.

(2) "Be rejected of the ciders, chief priests and scribes." These were the nation's afficial representatives, the very ones who should have known and received Christ and recommended His reception on the part of the nation. Truly He

the part of the nation. Truly He came to His own and His own received Him not (John 1:11).

(3) "Be killed." This announcement was startling to the disciples. They had not yet come to realize that redemption was to be accomplished through the passion and the cross. Jesus now states with definiteness and certainty that He must die on the cross.

(4) "Rise again." Though this was utterly incomprehensible to the disciples. He showed them that this would be the glorious issue of His death.

2. How the disciples received His teaching (v. 32).

So unwelcome was His teaching touching the cross that Peter, the spokesman of the disciples, rebuised Him. Peter later saw through this darkness the light of glory on the hillitops beyond (I Pet. 1:3, 4).

HOWARD COUNTY ACTS

One hundred per cent coopera Services for the 5th Sunday in tion with the government in eradicating the pink bollworm was pledged by 500 farmers of Houard County in a mass meeting at Big Spring.

The Howard Countlans agreed to sterlife all cottopseed ships into and out of the county, including seed two years old; cotton gins will burn all loose cotton and seed in and around their plants. Committees representing each community in the county, cooperating with a general committee will supervise sterilization of seed and oversee the work of eradica-

. This is what might have been expected. West Texas has no thought, and has had no thought but to do its atmost in the fight against the pest.

The only controversy has centered about the question of method. Some have held out for a noncotton sone; others have contend, ed it would be better to establish regulated sones, in which cotton would be grown under strict supervision. This latter step was fin-ally put into effect by the state pink bollworm commission.

It was the only thing to do under the circumstances. The state farmers for the loss of their revsaue should a non-cotton sone be declared. The federal government has shown an inclination to extent indemnification only if the affected areas accept the government's proposals. Opponents of the non-cotton sone plan have argued that such a plan would not be effective, because the worms enter this country every year fro macros sthe border, leaping a 100-mile natural barrier in which no cotton is grown.

Texas counties, dozens of them, have eradicated the Texas fever tick not by forbidding the running of cattle in infested pastures, but by a cazeful system of control and regulation. Dipping of cattle has cleared tens of thousands of square miles of ticks, and sterilination of cotton seed can just as easily clear Texas of pink boll.

The prompt and convincing action of Howard county should be followed by equally prompt action on the part of the other counties where bollworms have been found Only by this sort of cooperation can Texas stave off a quarantine

to be turned to a new area, in the opinion of many oil operators The new area is that on the Howard-Glasscock line, south of Big Spring, where several pro-ducers, capable of large production, have already indicated the presence of Permian Big Lime production of caliber equal to that of any other area.

At present all these wells are shut in due to lack of pipe line

However, a project for a small pipe line and another for a refinery at Sweetwater to rue on crude from this area are very well under way according to cur-

As these projects are designed to care for the needs of certain producers, it threatens to bring to Howard County the old prob-

Running of oil from some of these producers will force its pre. duction by neighbors to protect their leases from drainage.

This in turn, means the buildng of storage tanks, which, with carriage of the oil for a term of years, will, it is estimated, more than double the cost of the oil to the eventual consumer and at the same time cut into the return to the producer and land-owner.

RADIO REALIZATION

Radio interests throughout the country are speculating on what will be the results of the new Federal control legislation, which has passed the conference stage in congress. The conference commed some of the rough edges of the equalization clause which he. cords Congress' intent that each section of the country shall have its share of radio pawer, but that clause remains in language strong enough to impose a policy Up Campaign. of equalisation upon the radio

Absolute equalisation would of course, mean drastic reduction in the power of many large stations in the East, where at present the greater part of the available radio wattage is concentrated. Four broadcasting stations in and about New York employ a total wattage of 186,000, which is more than four times the total power used by the 102 stations in the Southern District which includes Texas and Oklahoma and most of the South. Attempted analysis of the effects of the new law, however, indicates the possibility that equalisation will be accomplished largely through permitted increases of power of stations in other sections rather than through drastic cuts in the

There does not appear now the alarm that was first manifested by radio interests regarding the equalization clause, nIdeed, there is a feeling that the net results may be entirely good. The breaking up the monopoly which Eastern stations have had on power is calculated to build up broadengling throughout the country. as a whole a result which cerninly cannot be damaging any interest whose connection et-ther with manufacture or trans-mission is direct. Fort Worth, Texas, March 16. A plan to regulate oil production in the Hendricks pool Winkler county, recommended by producers in that field, was considered last Saturday by committee appointed by the Railroad commissio nof Texas. The session started at 9:30 o'clock in the Texas Hotel.

The plan has to do with pro rating the production of the field It contemplates dividing the field up into forty-acre tracts, each section to be given a certain maximum production in such volume that the entire production of the field can be taken care of by the pipe line capacity, which is 185-000 barrels dally.

However under the proposed plan all oil contracts already signed between producers and buyers will be recognized by per. mitting those producers to flow their wells more than pro rata shore if the pro rata shore does not fill the contracts made,


The plan is to be effective for a period of six months the producers propose.







We have tried to make money out of cotton and failed. In our efforts to produce cotton at a profit we have depleted our soils and increased our acreage. Insects have multiplied, and wilt and root rot take an annual toll of approximately 35 per cent in some of the richest sections of Texas. Cotton, as we are now pro-ducing it, is not profitable, nor can it be. But cotton, produced on a smaller acreage and on soil best adapted to it, can no doubt be made an important part of ev- ips
