




Johnnie Tunnell Laid to Rest

Think Like an Investor, Not a Job Hunter, says Career Expert

When searching for your new job, stop thinking like a job hunter, and start thinking like an investor, says Mary Foley, co-author of Bodacious! An AOL Insider Cracks the Code to Outrageous Success for Women (AMACOM, 2001), and Woman in Charge of her own Reston, VA-based consulting firm Bodacious Ventures, LLC.

"More than ever before, employees are partners with their employers in their mutual success," says Foley. "How well the company does directly affects how well you do. You're providing your time, talent, availability and intelligence in exchange for a dividend, called a paycheck. That makes you an investor."

"And investors conduct 'due diligence' before agreeing to sign on with a company," says Foley. "So you need to conduct your job interview with an eye toward what kind of return you can expect to realize from your investment."

Here's what you need to know:

· The company's past performance record: What has been the company's percentage growth in the last three to five years? How did they recover from past mistakes?

· The company's future plans: Where does the company see itself in the next three to five years? What is its long-term vision? What is the long-term vision for the department you are interviewing in? Is your position a key, strategic one? Or, is it ultimately a cost-center that could easily be eliminated during the next budget cut?

· What is the company's exit strategy? Does the company intend to position itself for an acquisition, merger or public offering? When? What could that mean to your own career?

Competitors: Who are they and how is the company is ranked among them? Does the company understand its competitive position?

·The innovations and improvements the company has recently made to stay competitive: What new products has the company introduced to the market? What cost-saving measures has the company implemented? What do those measures say about the company's overall values and people philosophy?

· The company's marketplace: Is it in a growth market? Will you be investing in the future or would you be wasting precious time trying to revive a doomed industry?

Key players: Who are they? What are they about? Every investor wants to know who is on the management team. Search for articles or ask others. It may even be a smart career move to take a pay cut or a shortterm position just to have the opportunity to work with certain stars in your field of expertise.

· The company's culture: What three words would the hiring manager use to describe the company's culture? It's important that the culture fits with your own personality.

·The company's purpose: What is its mission statement? What does the company stand for when everything else (the fancy address, the furniture, the advertising budget, the primary customers) falls away? Do you identify with those values?

·Investing in you: What is the company's employee development program? The employee development program is a stock option program in yourself. Your relationship with the company should improve the value of your own personal shares — your own net worth in the marketplace. This is achieved through training, conventions, and "stretch" assignments.

"Whether the employer is a large corporation or a small, entrepreneurial firm, if it is asking you to consider joining their staff, it is asking you to invest in its future," says Foley. "Treat it as a very valuable business proposition. That's the bodacious way!"
