Things slowed down this week as there was little action on the athletic front. With volleyball season over for both JH and HS, the girls had a week with no games. They began basketball practice this week and the JH plays their first game next Tuesday in Huckabay.

The JH football team traveled to May and played well in the second half, but couldn't make up for a slow start. The Cubs lost by a score of 26-14. The JH plays host to Santa Anna this Thursday at 6:00 p.m.

The Varsity football team found the win column for the first time this season with a 20-14 victory over the May Tigers. The Panthers try to make it two in a row when they travel to Santa Anna on Friday for a 7:30 kick-off. Thanks for your continued support and hope to see you Friday in Santa Anna.

Gorman vs Santa Anna, There, 7:30 p.m. Friday

The Gorman Panthers (106, 1-2 Dist) travel to Santa Anna (0-7, 0-3) to take on the Mountaineers and try to make it two in a row to even their district record.

Santa Anna has struggled for wins and players this year just like the Panther have. Santa Anna, however, has just over 60 students in high school and will be moving to six-man competition next year. The Mountaineers have 19 players on their roster, but injuries have limited them to suiting out 16 the last 3 games. Gorman has 19 on the roster and suited out 14 this past week. Santa Anna hopes to have 2 of their 3 injured players back this week.

"Santa Anna's record is real deceiving. They were picked 3rd in our district, but injuries and low numbers have hampered them. When they're healthy, they can really get after you." The Mountaineers have been in the wishbone, I formation, one-back, and shotgun trips. "I'm not sure if injuries have dictated the change in offense or if they have just wanted to change. They looked their best out of the bone, but if all their players are healthy they can be effective in any one of them." Defensively, the Mountaineers have been just as multiple. They have been in a 5-2, 5-2 flex, 5-3, 5-4, split, split flex, and a 7-1. "Again injuries may have a lot to do with that. They can be real aggressive when they want to. They have some size, but their smaller guys worry us because of their quickness and ability to mess things up." #25 Salazar is a quality quarterback with a good arm. #86 Blanton is a favorite target of Salazar, #44 Fellas has been a RB, SE, slot, TE, etc for the Mountaineers. #7 Guthrie and #10 Morgan have been injured, but when healthy are very athletic and dangerous. On defense #69 Spiers plays linebacker very well. #72 Pritchard has good size and plugs up holes. #36 Lapin is quick and aggressive and can cause problems.

Panthers Win First Game; Play At Santa Anna Friday

The Gorman Panthers won their first victory of the season on Friday when they hosted the May Tigers at Brogdon Field and took a 20-14 win. The Panthers scored first before the Tigers answered with a score to make it 8-8 at the end of the second period. The Big Red scored twice in the third while holding the tigers to one score to take the 20 to 14 victory.

Following 5 changes of possession in the first period the Panthers took the ball on their own 30 and scored in 12 plays with Roberto Rodriguez getting the final 6 yards with 4:13 left in the second period. The drive featured runs of 8, 11, and 13 by Rodriguez before scoring. There were also runs of 11 and 3 by Ryan Wright on keepers. Rodriguez ran for the 2 point play to make the score 8-0.

Then following the Gorman score May took the kickoff on their own 33 and scored in 7 plays with the help of a Panther penalty when James Harris hit Dalon Stone with an 8 yard pass for the score with 1:15 left in the half. A pass to Aron Cawdill added the point play to tie the score at 8-8 at halftime.

Both Bands performed routines at halftime and received big ovations from the fans. Also the Panther Cheerleaders performed a great routine for the fans who showed their approval with huge ovation.

Our kids played hard and almost every down and our execution was as good as at any point this year. We had only one turnover--although it did take away a scoring opportunity for us. 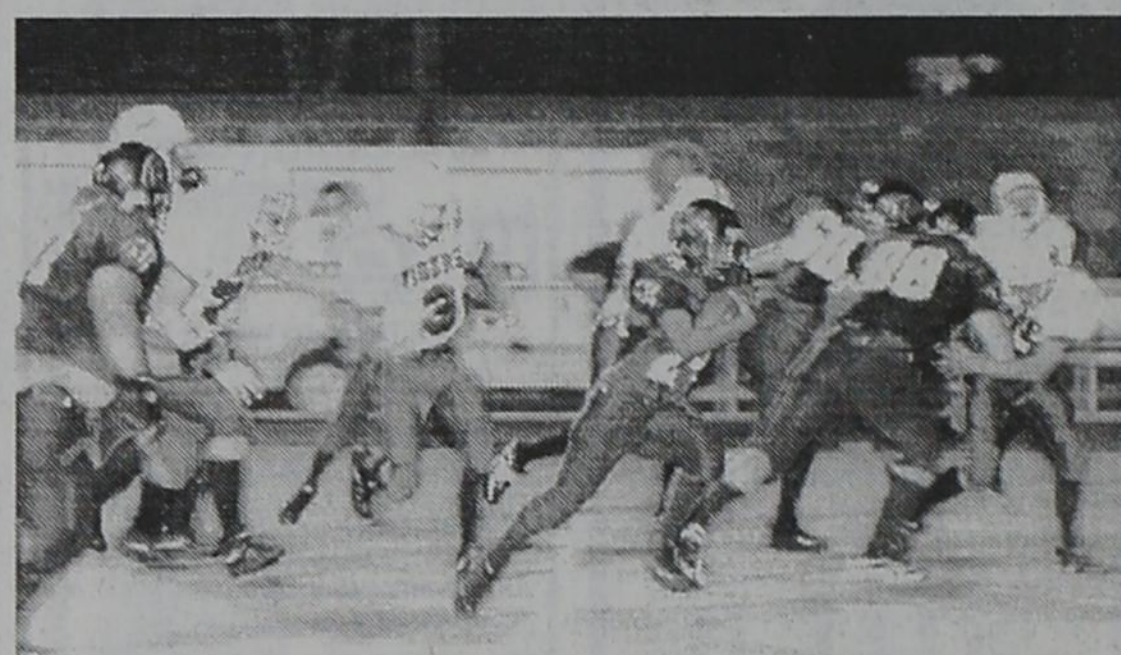

Rodriguez led the Panthers with 137 yards on 20 carries; Torrez had 57 on 9 tries; Carruth had 30 on 8 carries and Wright got 21 on 7 keepers. Cooper Thornhill led the Tigers with 62 yards on 16 carries.

This week the Panthers travel to Santa Anna to take on the Mountaineers in another 12-A District game at 7:30. The Big Red has shown a lot of improvement and should give the Mounties a very good game. So follow the Panthers to Santa Anna and back them all the way.

Gorman ISD Special School Board Meeting Held October 25, 2001

The Gorman ISD Board of Trustees met in a special meeting Thursday, October 25, 2001 at 6:30 pm at ZJ's Restaurant. President Windell Treadway called the meeting order at 6:39 pm. All seven board members were present for the meeting. Leonard Schwartz, Gorman ISD's legal counsel, and Leslie Vann were also present.

The trustees entered closed session at 6:40 pm with Leonard Schwartz, legal counsel, and Leslie Vann to discuss the insurance settlement. The Board exited

closed session at 6:56 pm at which time the Board recessed and reconvened the meeting at the Maxfield Elementary Conference room at 7:46 pm.

Glenn Glasson moved that Gorman ISD as defendants in the David Glover, individually and as Next of Friends and parents of Mark Glover vs. Gorman ISD, Bryant/Bell and Associates, Inc. and Special Insurance Services, Inc. pay their equal portion of the agreed sum to the plaintiffs as specified in the settlement agreement, the payment is approved as

discussed, and the superintendent and Board president are authorized to execute the final settlement papers. Bob Powell seconded the motion and the motion passed unanimously.

The final item of business was the annual report presented by Burl Lowery. Bobby Rich made the motion to approve the audit report for the 2000-2001 school year and Beth Underwood seconded the motion. The vote was 7 - 0.

2. Know your triggers. It is important to be aware of the things in your child's environment that tend to make his or her asthma and allergies worse, and to minimize exposure to those triggers. A complete list of asthma triggers can be viewed at www.FreeBreather.com.

3. Take care of allergies. Asthma is often associated with allergies. Some allergens, including pollen, mold, animal dander, dust mites, and irritants like cigarette smoke, can trigger an asthma attack. To control asthma, talk with your child's physician about appropriate treatment and avoiding exposure to allergens. For possible treatment options talk to your doctor and visit www.MyHealth.com.

4. Go with the peak flow. The peak flow meter can be the single most important tool in managing asthma. It measures how well air moves out of the lungs and can detect subtle lung changes hours or even days before a patient feels symptoms. For specific information on how to measure with peak flows, log on to www.SchoolAsthmaAllergy.com.

5. Take medications as directed. Because each case of asthma and allergies is different, treatments are tailored for each child. Asthma medication are divided into two types-quick-relief and long-term control. Talk to your child's doctor about which type to use when.

Many kids with asthma and allergies feel self-conscious or different from other children. Assure your child that these conditions are nothing to be embarrassed about and encourage your child to talk about his or her health with you.

Important asthma and allergy information and interactive health management tools are just a click away on the World Wide Web. Children with asthma and allergies should see their doctor regularly, not only to monitor these conditions, but also maintain their overall health.
