## Students May Earn College **Credit While in High School**

Ranger College will be participating in Tech Prep statewide articulation beginning with the 2002-2003 school year. What does this mean to high school students and recent graduates? If a student enrolls in one of RC's one-semester, one-year, or twoyear technical programs in Computer Information Technology or Office Technology, he or she may have already earned some college credit hours toward a certificate of a two-year degree.

RC has, in the past, participated with high schools on an individual basis by formal agreements. Now Ranger College will award Tech Prep credit to students from any high school in Texas that is participating in the statewide articulation program.

Some of the many high school courses that could count in this program are BSIS I Business Computer Information Systems I) and Word Processing Applications. There are other requirements to earn this college credit, such as earning at least an '80' grade in the high school course. Also, the student must complete 6 credit hours in Ranger College technical program within 15 months of graduation from high school.

Tech Prep credit earned while in high school is intended to earn hours toward a technical Certificate or two-year Associate of Applied Science Degree at a junior or community college. This credit is not intended for transfer to a four-year university to count toward a Bachelor's degree. ### GISD Board Sets Long-Range Goals

The Gorman ISD Board of Trustees met Thursday, June 27 in a special meeting. President Windell Treadway called the meeting to order following the invocation by Glenn Glasson. Leslie Vann, Superintendent, informed the board that there were no recommendations to be made at the time of the meeting. However, the administration was actively searching for a secondary science teacher and an elementary science teacher.

The remaining portion of the meeting was devoted to developing a long-rang plan for Gorman ISD. Mr. Vann provided the board with an outline for the spillway or morning glory as some call it, for the first time in several years. development of the plan. The board began deliberation on the long-range plan following the May board meeting. Board members brought their ideas to the meeting and focused on four categories: Education, Finance, Facilities, and Extracurricular activities. The board identified specific areas to be addressed in each of the four categories.

Education received the most discussion in the planning. Providing students with challenging and motivating courses in the four-core subject areas of math, English, science and social studies were identified as a goal to be addressed during the 2002-2003 school year. Providing the students with a stable teaching staff was a five-year goal. Finally, establishing continuity of course offerings was the final area to be addressed in the long-range plan.


The second category discussed was facility needs. Several areas were discussed, but the immediate concern identified by the board was the need to upgrade the science labs in the secondary and elementary. The need for upgraded facilities for all areas was discussed and the board determined the need to begin working on plans for a new secondary campus.

Overseeing the finances of GISD is one of the major responsibilities of the Board. Investing the funds was identified as a goal to be addressed this school year. The need to research and apply for facilities funding was also identified as a major

Extra-curricular activities was the final category discussed by the GISD Board. Continuity of staff and programs, as well as, providing the students with a staff that will motivate students to participate in all extra-curricular areas were identified as a needs. The board also discussed the need to upgrade the band and to provide the resources necessary to provide a quality One Act Play program.

Goals established by the board will be relayed to the campus administrators and staff members. Parents and community members are always welcome to provide input. One venue in which parents and community members can provide input is by serving on the various campus and district site base committees. 
# Lake Leon Levels Rise Above Spillway

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

### RAISING THE BAR IN HIGHER EDUCATION

At a chemistry building on a college campus, researchers work feverishly to continue experiments on something they have dubbed "H1" - a promising an- sun. tidote to anthrax. At another university, computer analysts are trained to think like cyber-terrorists so they can protect the military's computer infrastructure. And in a third situation, doctors miles from their patient monitor his condition minute-by-minute with advanced digital technologies and diagnostic tools in a video-linked ambulance.

These are not the plots to Hollywood's summer blockbuster movies - they are real-life scenes right here in Texas, at UT-Austin, UT-San Antonio and at the Texas Medical Center through the work of Texas A&M and UT-Houston. And they are just a few of the examples of how Texas is out in front, protecting our homeland in the war on terrorism.

Branches of the federal government, from the Defense and Energy departments to the National Institutes of Health (NIH), rely on the academic world to conduct research projects on their behalf. Nearly 60 percent of all funding for academic research comes garlic, onions or fish, wash it with lemon juice. from the federal government.

Because we are the second most populous state and home to some of the world's leading research universities, a large percentage of this money should be going to Texas. But a few years ago I was shocked to discover we rated only sixth in the nation. We needed to address this disparity and build a stronger bridge between our academic institutions and the money the federal government has already allocated for research.

Working closely with our colleges and universities, I encouraged them to identify their "centers of excellence" - areas where their schools could carve out a niche. Unique research capabilities attract talented students, professors and researchers to the state. They bring money into our economy, and elevate the edustudents alike.

In addition we needed to help facilitate a direct dialogue between our leading institutions and the government agencies that direct research projects. In 2000, I convened the first annual "Texas Higher Education Summit" in Washington, D.C.

This May, at the third summit, we began the event Fights Arthritis with some important news. Texas has moved up to fifth place. According to the latest figures from the RAND Corporation, our universities received \$900 million in R&D funding in 2000, an increase of more than \$100 million over 1999, when we received \$788 million and ranked sixth. The funding increase was across the board, for a spectrum of projects, putting Texas in a very strong position for the future.

To continue this upward trend, Texas universities must continue to cultivate their centers of excellence. While all of the projects listed above were started before September 11, the war on terrorism will focus federal dollars on homeland security and health care. At the summit, our universities' chancellors and presidents met with experts from the Office of Homeland Security, the Departments of Justice and Agriculture, as well as NIH. It was a give-and-take session - an opportunity for the Texas deans and the federal agency heads to discuss priorities and coordination.

As our government works on the challenge of developing a comprehensive homeland security plan, it will increasingly require research into vaccines, communications technologies and border security initiatives to safeguard our nation.

Texas research prowess continues to drive our economy in new and exciting ways; from the Silicon Hills of Austin, to the excellence in agriculture, biotechnology, and engineering in College Station, to world-famous biomedical research facilities in Galveston, Houston, San Antonio and Dallas.

My goal is for Texas to continue to showcase its research expertise, attract talented students and professors, and continue to play a leading role in our federal research projects. We have our own stars out here in Texas, and they deserve top billing.

#### Pucker Up: Lots Of Uses For Lemon Juice

(NAPSI)-Lemonade, marinades and salad dressing aren't the only things you can make with that bottle of lemon juice in your refrigerator; it can do a lot more.

The next time life gives you lemons, don't make lemonade. Instead, try some of these handy household cleaning tips and health-and-beauty uses that have been collected over the years. Some are true, while others may be old wives' tales, passed down from generation to genera-

Create blond highlights. Rinse your hair with one-quarter cup lemon juice and three-quarter cup water. Follow it up by sitting in the

Whiten, brighten, strengthen fingernails. Soak fingernails in ReaLemon juice for 10 minutes, then brush with a mixture of equal parts white vinegar and warm water. Rinse well.

Get rid of dandruff. Apply one tablespoon lemon juice to your hair. Shampoo, then rinse with water. Rinse again with a mixture of two tablespoons lemon juice and two cups water. Repeat every other day until dandruff disappears.

Eliminate blackheads. Rub ReaLemon over blackheads before going to bed. Wait until morning to wash off the juice with cool water. Repeat for several nights until you see a big improvement in the skin.

Relieve constipation. Before breakfast, drink four tablespoons ReaLemon in one cup warm water. Sweeten with honey.

Deodorize a cutting board. To rid your cutting board of the smell of
