


The Panthers defense did a superb job against the Tigers and will need another outstanding game next Friday night when they travel to Ranger for another important district battle.





STENHOLM ANNOUNCES APPROVAL For Port-to-plains plan

Washington, D.C. -Congressman Charlie Stenholm announced final approval of S. 1646, the authorization for a

Port-to-Plains Corridor Plan which identifies certain routes in the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico as a high priority corridor on the National Highway System. The legislation has received final approval

from the Congress and is now being sent to the President to be signed into law.

The roadways proposed in the approved legislation were identified by the Ports-to-Plains Coalition, which consists of federal, state and local leaders from throughout the four states affected by the corridor. The coalition spent three years studying transit needs and the feasibility of various routing options.

The designated corridor is expected to encourage additional international trade traffic between the United States,

Mexico and Canada. It should improve transportation service to an underserved part of the country and strengthen economic development in areas that long have suffered from depressed commodity prices and drought.

"I have been very pleased by the community support we have seen for this project and I have little doubt that this Corridor could provide an economic boost to numerous West Texas towns," noted Stenholm.



Over the same 4 year period, the county misdemeanor criminal case load has blossomed from 470 in 1998 to slightly less than 700 in 2002. The Court holds dockets calls from 2 to 3 days per week with jury trials scheduled 1 week per month to process the increased caseload.

The Judge comments; "I am blessed to bring to this job, the support of my family, a bachelors degree in Business Administration from Texas Tech University, a law degree from Texas Wesleyan School of Law, 13 years of independent business experience as an Oil and Gas Operator and 2 years as a Farm Bureau representative."



My wife, Kathy, and I live in Cisco. My Grandfather, Robert Tucker, worked a farm in Carbon his entire life. My mother, June Tucker Hicks, lives on that farm today. In moving my family to Eastland County to help with the family farm, Kathy and I believe that the problems and temptations that faced our family in the Houston area could be avoided. With children in the Cisco High School and Tarleton State University, we share similar concerns with each of you about drug dealers, sexual predators, and the temptations facing our children on a daily basis. Those concerns are magnified when I see drug offenders walking our streets unafraid and mocking the law enforcement community. If given an opportunity, I will change that attitude.

Many of you have asked where I have been lately? While my opponent has been riding in parades and shaking hands, I have been working to convict and punish criminals. That is my job and I take it very seriously. The office of Criminal District Attorney should be filled on the basis of qualifications and experience instead of personality. As Chief Prosecutor of the 42nd District Court in Taylor County I have prosecuted hundreds of criminal cases. My felony jury experience includes trials for Capital Murder, Manslaughter, Drug Manufacturing and Sales, Sexual Assault and violent crimes. Working for James "Butch" Edison the past several years has given me invaluable incite on how a District Attorney's Office should be run. I know that it takes to run a successful office since I have been personally involved with one of the largest District Attorney offices in this area of Texas. In my experience, I have learned that nice guys sometimes lack the passion and aggression needed to get the job done. In my job, you deal with criminals, thieves, dope addicts, and their defense lawyers. If you don't have a backbone of steel and gravel in your gut, the will run over you. If elected, I will stand up for Eastland County, making sure that you have successful prosecution of criminal cases based upon the crime committed. Eastland County deserves a PROVEN PROSECUTOR to represent you for the next four years.

My office will be committed to the premise that we need to close the drug dealer down. Whether they chose to leave the county, change professions or go to prison is up to them. I have an established record for sending drug pushers to prison. If elected, I will continue this effort for Eastland County. We all know someone that has an alcohol or drug problem. The penitentiary system is not the answer for all drug offenders. In cases of drug addiction, the goal should be to help restore people with chemical dependencies to productive sober citizens in this community. The way to do this is send the pusher away and convince the addict that rehabilitation is their only hope for success. I operate my court in Abilene on this premise and it works. This also requires the District Attorney to have a strong working relationship with local law enforcement. My office will make sure that the punishment meets the crime. People that are manufacturing drugs to poison our community belong in prison and not on probation. I agree that each case is different, however repetitive drug offenders need to be removed from the street. This is the only way that we protect our families from them.

Proper Sentencing is also very important in Sexual Assault Crimes and Violent Crimes. It takes a strong prosecutor to successfully try these type of cases where it is common that the victims are very young. These type of cases require a strong prosecutor to get the job done. My last trial involved a four year old girl that was terrified to take the stand. Her reliance on me had to be bases upon trust and the belief that I was strong enough to protect her and get the job done properly. The jury sentenced her molester to 50 years. I CAN GET THE JOB DONE.

On of the most difficult problems facing my office is case management. There should not be any reason for a case to remain on the docket for years without prosecution. Our office makes every attempt to move cases from Grand Jury to Disposition within 18 months. Since I am already accustomed to this pace, I will strive to manage my docket in Eastland County to promptly dispose of cases. This means that defendants will be required to take care of business. If they fail to show up for court, their bonds should be forfeited. I will require that forfeited bonds be collected. This must be done in an effort to efficiently dispose of cases. The process of collecting forfeited bonds is recognized as cost of business for bonding companies but it also has the effect of recovering the criminal and returning him to the judicial process. 


Texans get 'catty' about eating

Farm-raised catfish sales are jumping in Texas. According to a survey by the Texas Aquaculture Association, aquaculture producers plan to construct 1,734 acres of ponds for commercial catfish production over the next five years, with the majority of these ponds functional within three years.

Texas producers are confident that factors such as the growing season, water guality and feed guality provide them with a competitive advantage over other regions in the United States. Such expansion can also benefit rural economies.

And there is plenty of room to grow. Texans consume 45 percent of all catfish grown in the United States, which shows plenty of potential for sales in the rest of the country.






