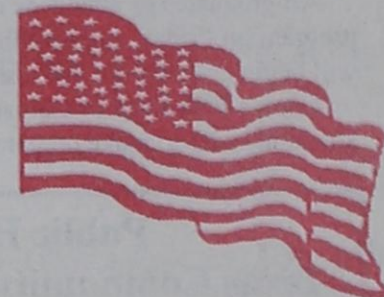

## Local ISD Board Action

July 15, 2002

Prior to the beginning of the board meeting, Board members had the opportunity to use the new Dell notebooks that will be available to students this year. Gorman ISD purchased two portable wireless labs. Each lab contains 15 Dell Pentium III notebooks. The labs can be moved from classroom to classroom. Using wireless capabilities, students will be able to conduct research on the Internet from the classroom or simply use the notebook to type a paper. The two labs will greatly enhance the availability of computers for all students.

The agenda for the regular meeting for the Gorman ISD Board of Trustees was relatively short this month. However, the items discussed were very important to the operation of the district. Before the board began addressing the business items, Superintendent, Leslie Vann read the board a letter of resignation from Windell Treadway. The letter expressed the he had enjoyed the many years of serving on the School Board of Gorman ISD. Treadway began his service on the board April of 1986 and served on the Board for sixteen years.

Following the general business of authorizing the payment of bills and payroll, the board addressed the items of new business on the agenda. First, the board approved the 2002-2003 student handbook presented by Bettie Morris and Ronny Wright. The dress code and UIL Extra Curricular absence policy were two of the items revised in the new handbook that were approved. The dress code will be published in next week's edition of the Progress. In conjunction with the approval of the student handbook, the board approved a motion that revises the current policy permitting students to wear shorts to school. Beginning Spring break of 2003 students in grades 3 - 12 will not be permitted to wear shorts. Next, the board approved a budget amendment. Personnel was the final area to be addressed by the board. The board accepted the resignations of Linda Glover, Ricky Taylor, and Thomas Wilson. Next the board approved the hiring of Troy Doyle and Shelia Johnson as teachers. Mr. Doyle will teach secondary math and coach in several areas including boy's basketball. Mrs. Johnson will teach fifth and sixth grade science filling the vacancy with the assignment of Latricia Hampton as counselor for Gorman ISD.

The board received the monthly tax report and a report from Morris and Wright on the search for employees to teach secondary social studies/coach and content mastery. Superintendent Vann reported that GISS had received the State Comptrollers values of 40,498,140 dollars. The assigned values are 1,959,898 dollars more than the values assigned by the county appraisal district. The difference in values will result in a reduced amount of state aid to Gorman ISD. Vann also informed the board that a special meeting needed to be scheduled for July 25 to select a roofing company from the bids presented. Finally, he reported that Bob

Powell's name had been presented to all forty-three districts in Region 14 for approval as a candidate for the Texas Association of School Boards slate of trustees.

The board met in closed session for the purpose of discussing the Tax Collector/Superintendent Secretary position. No action was taken.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is moving to implement a new peanut quality program as outlined in the new Farm Bill.

Under the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002, all peanuts marketed in the United States must be officially inspected and graded by federal inspectors or federally licensed state inspectors. Imported peanuts will be subject to the same quality and handling standards as domestically produced peanuts.

The new Farm Bill terminates the existing Peanut Administrative Committee and requires USDA to appoint a new Peanut Standards Board comprised of members of the peanut industry. USDA will consult with the board before establishing or changing quality and handling standards for domestically produced and imported peanuts.

In order to assure the quality of peanuts marketed during the transition period from the peanut marketing agreement to the new peanut quality program, current requirements under the marketing agreement will continue to apply while quality and handling standards are being written to implement the new peanut program. The regulations under the companion programs for imported peanuts and domestic peanuts not covered under the marketing agreement will also apply. However, under the transition to the new program, assessments on the 2002 crop will not be collected from peanut handlers.

In addition, USDA is announcing the following actions: (1) appointment of 18 persons to serve as interim members on the new Peanut Standards Board; (2) termination of the existing Peanut Administrative Committee effective July 1; and (3) designation of trustees to locally administer the mandatory peanut inspection program until new regulations are established.

The interim producer members appointed to the new standards board are: James E. Godwin of Camilla, Ga.; Wayne Shannon of Tifton, Ga.; Walter L. Corcoran of Eufaula, Ala.; Dan J. Hunter of Gorman, Texas; Billy F. Coe of Hydro, Okla.; Harvey Schneider of Pleasanton, Texas; Thomas R. Cotton Jr. of Franklin, Va.; C. Frank Jordan of Suffolk, Va.; and Lennie P. Hinton Jr. of Hobbsville, N.C.

The interim industry representatives appointed to the new standards board are: Dennis R. Finch of Opp, Ala.; Joseph A. Parker of Eufaula, Ala.; Sally Tabb Wells of Blakely, Ga.; Byron Warnken of Pleasanton, Texas; Alan L. Ortloff of Madill, Okla.; Robert T. Parker IV of De Leon, Texas; Charles R. Birdsong of Suffolk, Va.; Dallas Barnes of Severn, N.C.; and Linda Lee of Windson, N.C.

These interim board members will serve for a period not to exceed 180 days. During that period, USDA will announce nomination procedures and appoint members to serve terms of up to three years on the new Peanut Standards Board.

In the meantime, USDA will notify all handlers and importers of any changes to the existing program requirements.

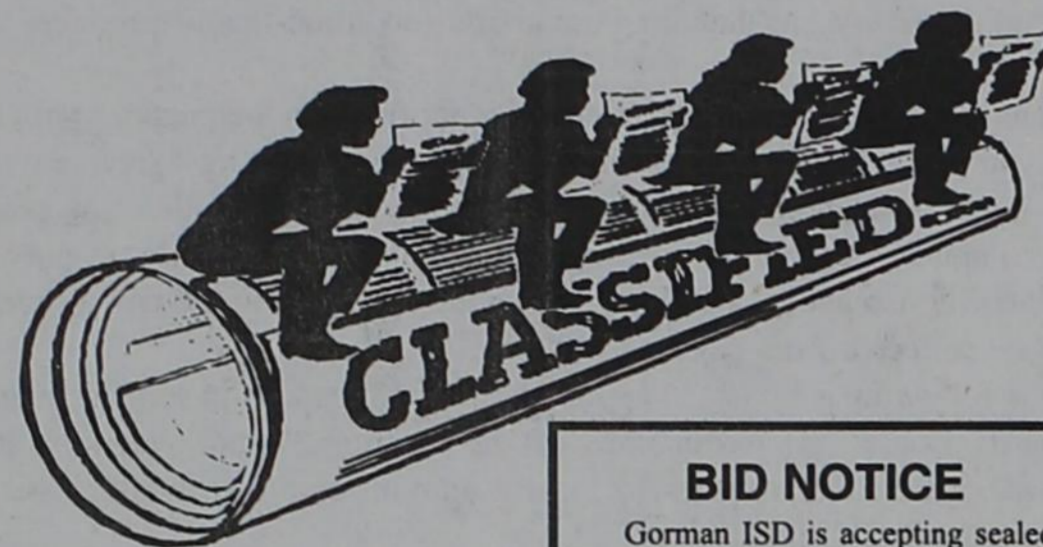
