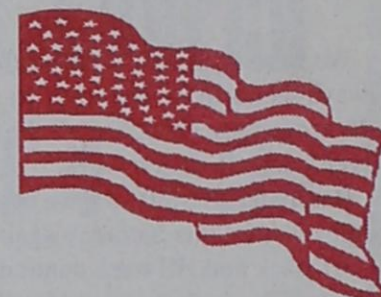

Randy Burns and Glenn Glasson Receive Chamber Honors

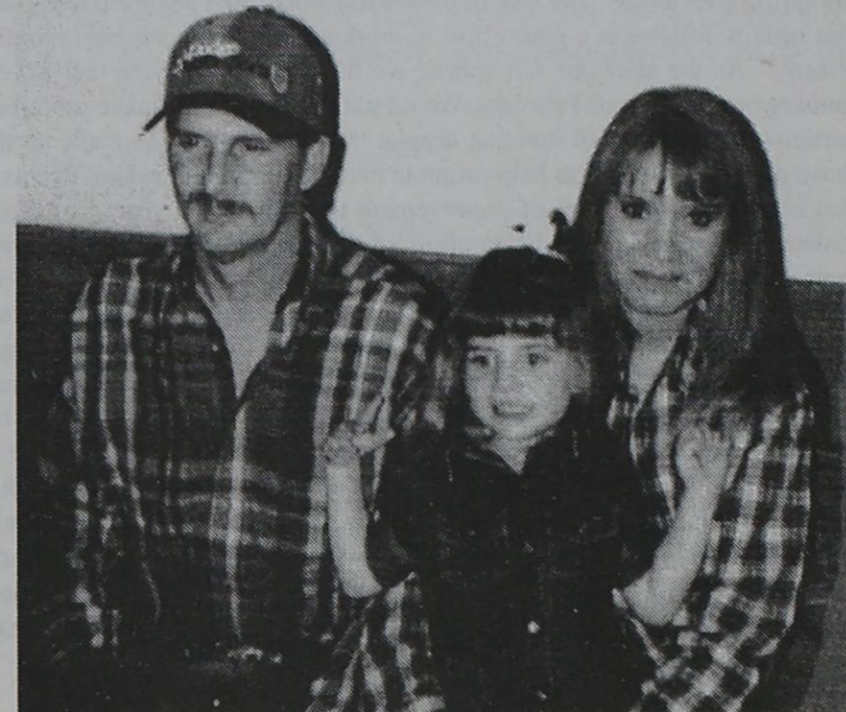

Letter From The Chief

REDUCED SPEED AHEAD Definition: Means to begin slowing down that the speed limit will change. It reduces. It has been brought to my attention, Doug Caffey Chief of Police, that Gorman is a "speed trap". I would like to take this time to make a few statements for your information.

Yes, it is true that the Gorman Police Officers have written many citations. But please note that the driver is also given a ten (10) mile per hour tolerance. This means that the citation is written only if the driver is exceeding ten (10) miles an hour over the allowed limit.

From the **Reduced Speed Ahead** sign to the 55 MPH sign is 3/10 of a mile. From the 55 MPH sign to the City limits sign is 2/10 of a mile. This allows 1/2 mile to reduce speed.

To date, March 18, 2002, 75 warning tickets have been issued.

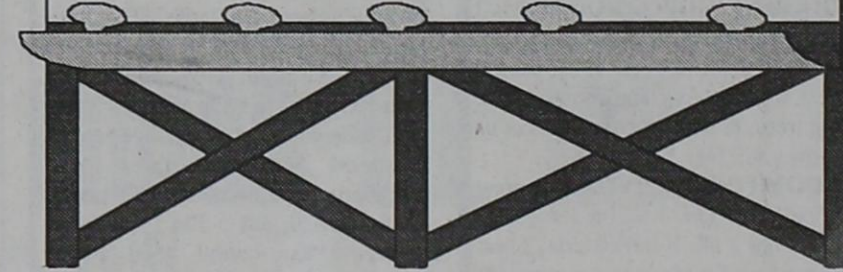
In reference to the information stated on the www.speedtrap.org, the statements made are incorrect. Also the department issues as many warning tickets as citations.

Athletic Director Report

We have been very busy on the athletic front these days. The spring always seems to be this way. In addition to all the athletic events going on, we must work with and around UIL academics, OAP, and all the stock shows. Sometimes we look up and have a player on the field that we haven't seen in over a week.

Baseball and Softball have been improving from game to game and are approaching district play. Softball begins district this Saturday against May. Baseball begins district play on the 29th against Cross Plains.

JH track and HS track continue their seasons this week in DeLeon. The HS runs on Thursday and JH on Friday. They both travel to May the following week with the JH running on Tuesday and the HS on Thursday. The JH district meet is tentatively set for April 4th in May. The HS district meet is set for April 5th in Bronte.

The HS golf team competed in the Iredel Invitational at Glen Rose back on March 4th. Those competing were Derek Adams, Sawyer Wright, Robert Abbott, and Blake Van Dusen. Their next competition will be on April 2nd at either San Saba or Abilene. This will be the first round of district competition. The second round will be April 8th.

Powerlifting came to an end over spring break. Brian Hunt finished fifth in the regional competition at Floydada. Ashley Maupin repeated as the Class A State Champion in the 97lb class at the THSWPA State Championships in Fort Hood/Killeen, Tx.

It is this time of the year that often separates the athletic teams for next year. With all of the activities that are taking place, the foundation of our program is often compromised. We have several athletes that miss our offseason workouts while competing in the wide array of events. These missed workouts begin to add up as the spring goes along. The lack of off-season work often begins to show during our last testing. The next step that usually follows is a poor effort to workout during the summer months since they are out of the pattern already. As we start our fall sports, we have several players that haven't consistently worked out since January or at least mid-February. We do not make our kids make up missed off-season workouts if they are participating in a school function despite the fact that they do make up their classwork that they missed on those days. We do this to help promote participation in all school events. However, it is also the one thing that can hamper our level of improvement throughout the year. To combat this, we constantly remind our athletes the importance of 100% effort when they are present and the importance of putting in extra time on their own. For example, I remember competing in UIL academics when I was in HS. Our district competition was in Eastland. We would be gone most of the day and I would miss track practice. Instead of blowing off the afternoon goofing around with my friends after my competition, I went down to Eastland's track and ran my usual workout for that day. In another instance I missed our usual weight workout while attending a golf tournament. When we returned from our meet, I went to track workout and followed that up by going back to the weight room and making up what I had missed. The idea was that I and all our players, never wanted to fall behind. We as coaches are trying our best to instill this work ethic into our athletes. We need your help as parents to accomplish this. We need your reinforcement that doing the extra helps keep us from falling behind. I know the kids will often say they are too tired and sometimes that is really the case. However, most of the time an athlete has told me they are too tired to do extra and then I see them driving around with their friends that evening when I head home. Help us instill a quality work ethic and since of true commitment in our youth and restore our once proud program.

Lady Panther Softball

The Lady Panthers picked up their first victory of the season on March 1st against Dublin. Both teams had lead at various times during the game with Dublin having the lead going into the final inning. The Lady Panthers retired all three batters they faced in the last inning and paved the way for a dramatic comeback in the bottom of the inning. The Lady Panthers scored 3 runs in the bottom of the 7th inning in dramatic style to record the victory. I was very pleased with their ability to never give up and they knew they could win if the hits would start coming. In the Dublin game, Ashlee Hornback led all hitters with three hits while each of the nine batters recorded at least one hit each. This was the best hitting performance the team has had all season. The Lady Panthers struggled a little on defense committing eight errors. Without the errors the game would have been no contest.

I want to commend all the players for giving up a part of their spring break to practice. There were 13 our of 14 girls at practice each day. These practices were not mandatory; therefore, these girls need to be acknowledged for their hard work and determination to get better and winning. Each player became better in some aspect of the game this past week. The girls managed to get in 500 swings at the plate and around 250 balls fielded. All the coaches have noticed how much improved

they already look. I hope and pray this leads to rewards on the field. I feel these girls deserve to win, as does every coach. I want Gorman to become what it once was and hopefully these girls can start that resurgence.

The next games will be the first district game of the year against May. It will be played Saturday at 2:00 p.m. in May. I would like to encourage everyone to come and support the softball girls and the baseball guys as we start competing for a district championship.

Ordinance Calling and Ordering

AN ORDINANCE CALLING AND ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE PARTICIPATED IN BY THE QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS, SETTING AN ELECTION DATE, SAID ELECTION TO BE HELD IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AND THE ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION 1. There is hereby ordered a Special Election to be participated in by the qualified voters of the City of Gorman, Texas, to be held on the first Saturday of May, 2002, being the 4th day of May, 2002, between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. at the Gorman Community Center (formerly Senior Citizens Center) 120 S. Kent St., for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the City of Gorman the propositions of whether or not the City of Gorman should adopt a 4A Sales and Use Tax.

SECTION 2. The Mayor shall cause notice of the election to be published by posting notice of the election at a public place not later than twenty-one (21) days before the election, and by publishing notice at least once not earlier than the thirtieth (30th) day not later than the tenth (10th) day before election day, in a newspaper published in the City of Gorman, Texas.

SECTION 3. The propositions submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Gorman, Texas shall be placed on paper voting ballots and absentee paper ballots as follows:

PROPOSITION 1. The adoption of a sales and use tax for the promotion and development of new and expanded business enterprises at the rate of 1/2 of one percent.

SECTION 4. If any section or part of any section or paragraph of this ordinance is declared invalid or unconstitutional for any reason, it shall not invalidate or impair the validity, force or effect of any other section or sections or part of a section or paragraph of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its adoption and approval, and it is so ordained.
