

Peanut Growers of the Southwest-primarily Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Arkansas, California, and Louisiana-will meet at the Oklahoma State University Extension Service Building, 930 North Portland Avenue (at intersection of Northwest 10th & Portland), Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, on Saturday, March 9, 2002, to elect a grower member and alternate to the Peanut Administrative Committee.

The meeting is scheduled for 10:00 a.m. (CST) in conjunction with a meeting of the Annual Meeting of Oklahoma Peanut Growers' Association. The nominations portion of the meeting will occur early in the

Lane Campbell, Compliance Officer, Peanut Administrative Committee, will conduct the nominations.

Robert R. Tabb, Manager, of the Peanut Administrative Committee explains that the Committee administers the Peanut Marketing Agreement. The Committee is made up of growers, shellers, and the Area Association Managers, and recommends peanut marketing regulations to be issued by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture under the Agreement. These regulations apply generally to the entire industry.

The grower member position to be filled is currently held by Billy F. Coe of Hydro, Oklahoma. The Alternate position is occupied by Donnie Sodders of Hydro, Oklahoma. Both terms expire on April 30, 2002. Both men are eligible for renomination.

A special program of interest to the peanut industry will be held in conjunction with the meeting, says Jack Coppedge, President of Oklahoma Peanut Growers Association. He invites and urges peanut growers from all Southwestern Area states to attend and participate in the nomi-

With children in the Cisco I.S.D. and Tarleton State University, we share similar concerns with each of you about drug dealers, sexual predators, and the temptations facing our children on a daily basis. Those concerns are magnified when I hear or see know drug offenders walking our streets without fear of prosecution. I want that to change. The most

common question asked during my campaign is "Why are they just rethem?" I want that to change. Many report that drugs are freely available in our neighborhoods. This also needs to change. I vow that a vote for James B. Hicks on March 12 in the Democratic Primary will begin that change.

This month, the U.S. Department of Agriculture will begin issuing Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) payments. NAP is an ongoing program that provides financial assistance to producers for noninsurable crop losses and prevented planting as result of natural di- vice fees which equates to more than 40,000 crop policies. sasters. Applications are filed at the county level so the total amount being paid and the number of producers receiving benefits are unknown acreage report and necessary crop loss documentation. USDA recomat this time.

As a reminder, producers interested in obtaining a 2002 crop policy may file an application for coverage and pay the applicable service fee.

The service fee is equal to \$100 per crop per county or \$300 per producer per county, not to exceed a total of \$900 per producer for all counties. In 2001, USDA's Farm Service Agency received close to \$4 million in ser-

In order to be eligible for benefits, applicants must have a timely-filed mends producers contact their local USDA Service Center for further information and 2002 eligibility requirements.

Under NAP, eligible crops are those produced for food (including livestock feed) or fiber for which catastrophic federal crop insurance is not available. Also eligible for NAP coverage are controlled-environment crops (mushroom and floriculture), specialty crops (honey and maple sap) and value loss crops (aquaculture, Christmas trees, ginseng, Ornamental nursery and turfgrass sod).

Other program restrictions may apply. Further information on NAP is available from local USDA service centers or on FSA's website at www.fsa.usda.gov.






