Panthers Have Open Week

The Gorman Panther football team will have an open week this Friday and will resume play next Friday at Baird in their Dist. 12-A opener. The Panthers closed out non-district play with a 63-6 loss to Throckmorton. That puts the Panthers' record at 0-4 going into district play. "We made some strides this past Friday even though the score doesn't quite show it. We executed much better on the offensive side of the ball and had some players step the play up a level. We still had too many turnovers and busts, we can become a lot more competitive. Defensively we showed some promise when we evaluated the film. We were often one step away from making the play. A lot of that comes from getting a late start on the year and from not being able to see things in practice since we have had low numbers. With some more time and hard work, I believe we can make that 'one step.'" The Panthers will have this week off, but they aren't treating it like an off week. "We told our men that we needed to take advantage of the off-week and use it as an opportunity to get better. District is just around the corner and if we want to compete, we can't wait til next week. It has to start right now. We are getting stronger in the weight room, we're executing better, and our attitudes are good; with that in check we believe we can make things interesting in District 12-A. We have a ways to

Panthers Open This Week After Throckmorton Loss; Start District October 12th

The Panthers traveled to Throckmorton on Friday night to take on a very strong Greyhound team and came out on the short end of a 63-6 margin. The Hounds scored 23 in the first period and 21 in the second for a halftime lead of 49-0. They added 14 more in the third and coasted the rest of the way for the 63-6 victory. The lone Panther score came in the fourth period.

The Hounds got a score on their first possession going 53 yards in just 4 plays with Alex Conteras running in from 25 yards out with 8:24 left in the first. Caleb Hodges booted the point after and the score was 7-0.

The Hounds came right back after recovering a Panther fumble on the Gorman 40. Matt Bellah raced the entire distance in one play with 8:01 left. Hodges kicked the PAT and the Hounds led 14-0.

After holding the Panthers on their next possession and taking the ball on their own 46, the Hounds scored in 4 plays with Conteras going the final 18 with 3:03 left in the first. Hodges added the point after for a 21-0 score.

Again the Hounds got the ball on a Panther bobble at the Gorman 9 and scored on one play with 2:42 left. Hodges kicked the point after to give the Hounds a 28-0 first period lead.

Then with 8:12 left in the second the Hounds took the ball on the Gorman 47 and scored in one big play with Bellah hitting Clint Kirby on a fine pass over the middle and he raced the distance. Hodges added the PAT to make it, 35-0.

The Hounds hit the score board again with 3:38 left in the half when Bellah hit Kirby on a 37 yard pass for the score. Hodges booted the point after to make it 42-0.

Then with 1:28 left in the half the Hounds scored on a 5 yard run by David Pensyl. Conteras kicked the point after to make it 49-0 at halftime.

Both the Panther Marching Band and the Throckmorton Band put on a fine performances for the fans at halftime and received big ovations from the fans.

The Hounds scored again with 9:54 left in the third period when they took the ball on their own 33 and scored in 3 plays with Kenny Clark catching a 75 yard pass for the score. The extra point made it 56-0.

The final Throckmorton score

came with 1:48 left in the third with the Hounds going 85 yards in just one play when Monty Serogum caught a pass and raced the distance for the score. The point after gave the Hounds a 63-0 score.

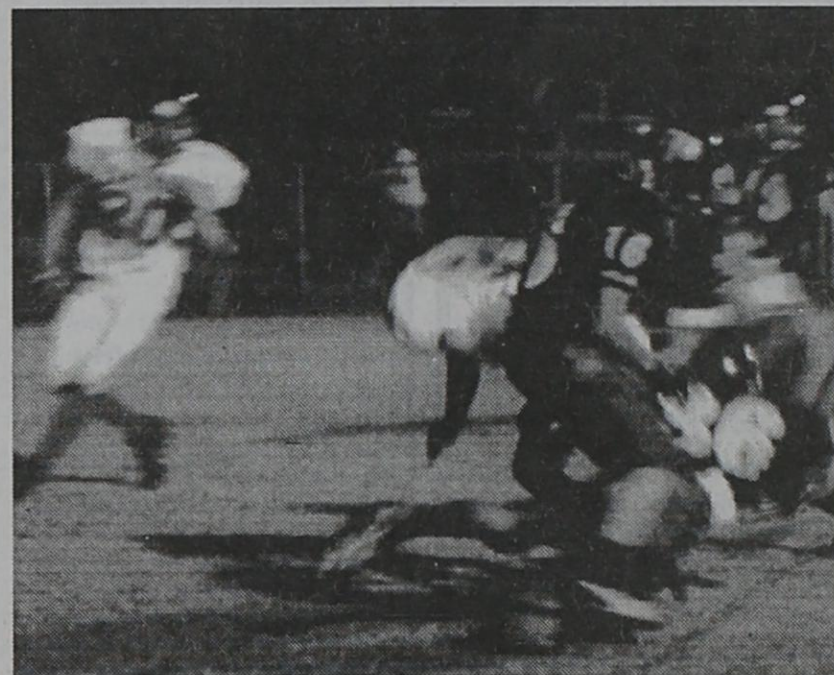
The lone Panther score came with 7:40 left in the game when Roberto Rodriguez ran in from 1 yard out for the score to cap a 58 yard drive. The point after failed and the final score was 63-6.

Rolando Torres led the Panthers with 70 yards on 14 carries. Juan Martinez had 51 on 12 carries. Sawyer Wright got 43 on 13 tries. Josh Carruth had 21 on 5. Roberto Rodriguez got 21 on 6 and Wesley Wilkins had 1 carry for 4 yards. Conteras led the Hounds with 87 yards on 6 carries.

The Panthers have an Open Date this week before starting District play at Baird on October 12.

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Gorman Economic Development Corporation News

In May of 1998, the citizens of Gorman voted in a general election to pass the half-cent sales tax increase to for a 4-B Economic Development Corporation. After several months of legalities to be cleared and filed, we became an active corporation in November 1999. At that time the City Commissioners appointed seven community leaders to the first EDC Board. They were Jud Maxfield, Judy Warren, Bill Vaughn, James Mears, Bill Mears, George

Simmons, and Bob Hammtree. The next step was to hire a part-time director. The city hired Lori Dodd, new to Gorman, but had several years experience in Economic Development, Main Street, and Marketing. In an excellent show of community spirit, and as to not put a burden on the small corporation's budget, the Chamber of Commerce, the City of Gorman, and the EDC split the directors salary.

The year 2000 was spent mostly getting organized. However, we attended several trade shows, economic conferences, and grant-writing workshops. Gorman continued its membership with Texas Midwest Community Network and also became a member of the TMCN Marketing Alliance. We also hosted the Texas Rural Development Council's Resource Team. For three days in April, five members from different state and federal agencies talked to a variety of groups here in town. Over 270 people participated in this evaluation, from clergy, farmers, teachers and students, to the elderly, the single-parents, the business owners, and the county officials. All this information was compiled and put into a report that the EDC Board, City Commissioners, Chamber, and other groups have used as a tool to determine problems and make progress for the improvements of our community.

In February of 2001, we (the EDC) received our first grant. It was for just under \$1000 from TNRC/WCTCOG for a Community Cleanup. The City Staff and Gorman GROW worked diligently to make this a successful event. And it truly was, BFI picked up just under 18 tons of trash from that one weekend! The Before and After Contest was well received, and the donations of prizes by G & H, Pizza Pro and Gorman Video, and the t-shirts from Gorman GROW made it a very fun event.

In May of 2001, we were

awarded \$6005 grant from Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for a Community Outdoor Outreach Program grant. This will be in conjunction with the Gorman Jr. High students and a clean-up time at Bass Lake, and will in the Spring of 2002.

In June of 2001, we received a grant from the Criminal Justice Dept. of WCTCOG. This was a 10% matching grant in the amount of \$10,848 for the Gorman Police Department. It purchased in-car video cameras and monitors for our four patrol cars. It also purchased three digital cameras for investigations and a designated color printer to download and print these photographs.

On August 31, we were awarded one of five grants to Eastland County from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Funds Board (TIF) for \$525,000. This is part of a county-wide effort to provide wire-less Internet service to our community. This opens up a whole wonderful opportunity for our local residents in the area of distance-learning, tele-medicine, and so much more.

And, lastly, the first of September we received a \$2000 match funding for a Community Improvement Grant from the Leon-Bosque RC&D. This will go toward a new water fountain in the downtown park and repair of the current playground equipment. There is \$2000 cash, with the match to be made with in-kind services and/or cash. This one will take the help of the community to donate time and labor to repair the playground. But it will be a fun workday, look for the time and day sometime very soon.

All of this was written for you, the citizen of Gorman, to know that even though there may not be 5 or 10 new businesses, there is a great foundation being laid. What company would come to a community if there were no amenities to share with their employees/families. We have housing issues to address, more community development issues to pursue, as well as taking advantage of the many marketing opportunities made available through TMCN.

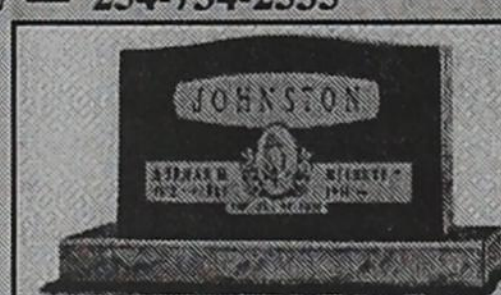

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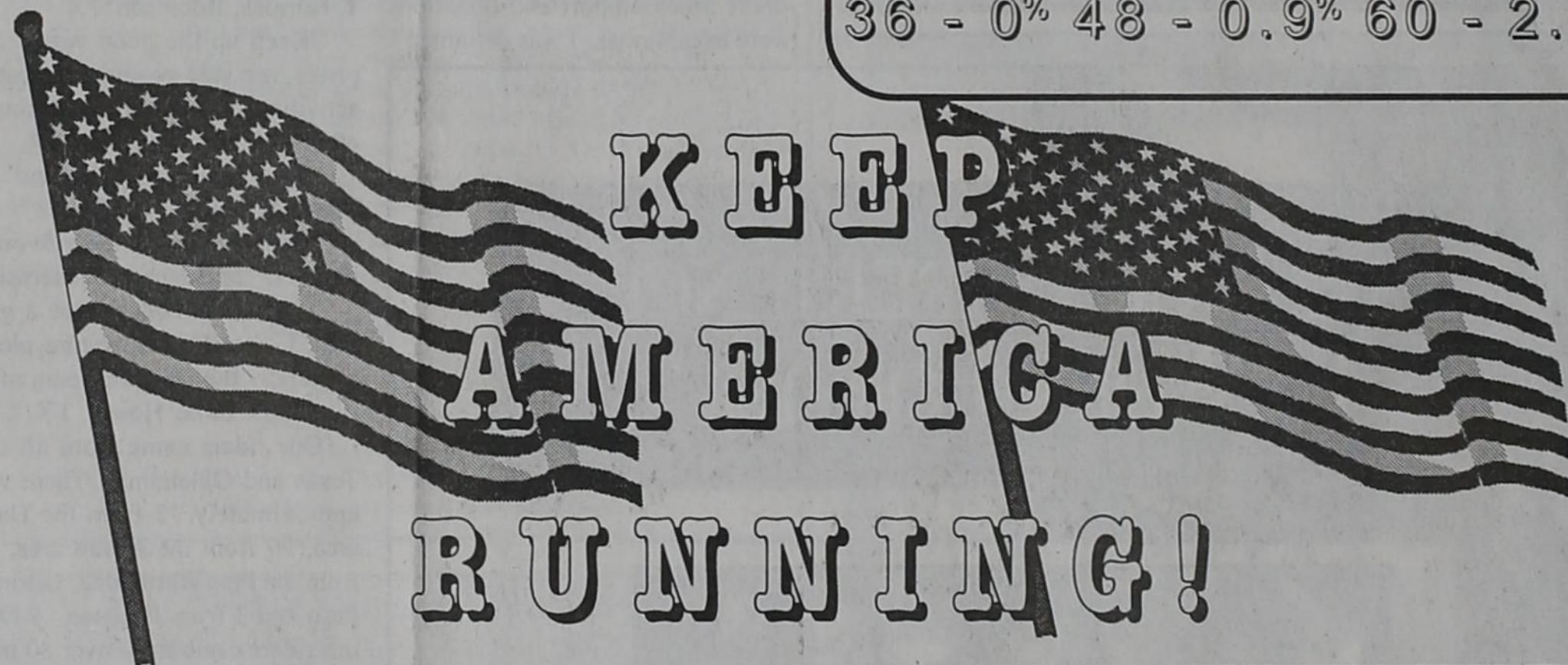
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
