

Tolar Defeats Panthers in Season Opener

The Gorman Panthers were defeated 0-56 Friday by the Tolar Rattlers. The Rattlers amassed 451 yards offense and held Gorman to 169 years offense. Josh Carruth led all Panther rushers with 51 yards on 14 carries. Ryan Wright had 11 carries for 29 yards and completed 2 or 3 passes for 16 years. Gorman suited out 13 players and lost Juan Martinez to a rib injury early in the second quarter. Juan is feeling better right now and goes back to the doctor on Thursday for further xrays. The injury caused the Panthers to move Clint Jones (normally an offensive lineman) to split end and Scott Lewis (normally a split end) to half back.

"We had a lot of busted plays. Some were due to nerves and other due to a lack of reps at those positions." Due to injuries, the Panthers have cancelled the game against Menard. "We have too many injuries and instead of hoping that they would all be healthy and released by Friday, we felt we needed to notify Menard as soon as possible. As of right now, we plan on playing Covington here for Homecoming on September 15th."

The Panthers have plenty of room to improve and now have the time to get some work in. "We are pleased with the effort on Friday, but we need that kind of effort ev-





As a community, we should be sadden by the present state of this hundred twenty four year old landmark. There are seventy-two graves at the cemetery carefully identified through the forethought of Brother Frank Skaggs. As most markers are sandstone, Brother Frank numbered and recorded the names of those buried in the cemetery. Many hours have been spent in locating and identifying the graves that Brother Frank recorded. Our frontier families lost as many as five infants and five men served in the Civil War honored by the 2nd Texas Frontier District Memorial Day.

Saturday, September 8th, Boy Scout Troop #37 will assist in cleaning the cemetery. Others will be on site to help repair markers and reestablish the gravesites. A PRESCRIPTION FOR MEDICARE

Thirty-six years ago, when Medicare was created to provide health coverage for elderly Americans, hospital stays and doctors' treatments were the most costly portion of the care that was to be provided. Prescription drugs represented only a small percentage of medical expenditures.

Today, that picture is very different. Nearly 400 new drugs have been developed in the last decade alone to fight diseases such as cancer, heart disease, diabetes and arthritis. While the drugs themselves are expensive, their use has proven to save health-care dollars in the long run. nents:

Take, for example, anticoagulants: A year's worth of recurrence of strokes, costs \$1,000. Compare that to \$100,000 in lifetime costs for taking care of an indiual who has suffered a stroke. Similarly, the new 'H2 anagonist' drugs are used to treat ulcers in patients who A year's worth of such drugs can cost \$900.

Medicare would pay for the ulcer surgery. But Medicare does not provide prescription drug coverage. Although two-thirds of seniors have private, supplementary coverage that helps with the cost of prescription drugs, health care. the other third are paying 100 percent of their escalating percent of employer-sponsored health plans pay for prescription drugs. Medicare's benefit package has yet to be updated to include this benefit.

Congress and the Bush administration are trying to figure out the best way to address this situation. We are looking for a way to provide prescription drugs to those who need them but are unable to afford them. We must be careful to design a plan that is responsible, and tailored to those who truly need the help. Seniors who are happy with their existing coverage should not be forced into a more costly, one-size-fits-all government program.

Nor should the elderly be handed a government program that decides which drugs they may and may not have. Such decisions are best made by doctors and patients, not an anonymous bureaucrat in Washington. An effective prescription drug benefit proposal has to meet certain criteria for common sense and effective-Government should not set up a plan that would ness.

News From the Gorman School Superintendent

Several highly publicized incidents of bacterial meningitis promoted the legislature to require notification to parents informing them about the symptoms and prevention of the disease. The following provides information on the disease's symptoms, methods of transmittance and prevention, and the vaccination process.

BACTERIAL MENINGITIS

What is meningitis?

Meningitis is an inflammation of the covering of the brain and spinal cord---also called the meninges. It can be caused by viruses, parasites, fungi, and bacteria. Viral (aseptic) meningitis is common; most people recover fully. Medical management of viral meningitis consists of supportive treatment and there is usually no indication for the use of antibiotics. Parasitic and fungal meningitis are very rare. Bacterial meningitis is very serious and may involve complicated medical, surgical, pharmaceutical, and life support management.

There are two common types of bacteria that cause meningitis:

- Strep pneumoniae causes pneumococcal meningitis; there are over 80 subtypes that cause • illness
- Neisseria meningitidis-meningococcal meningitis; there are 5 subtypes that cause serious illness-A, B, C, Y, W-135

What are the symptoms?

Someone with meningitis will become very ill. The illness may develop over one or two days, but it can also rapidly progress in a matter of hours. Not everyone with meningitis will have the same symptoms.

Children (over 1 year old) and adults with meningitis may have:

- Severe headache •
- High temperature •
- Vomiting .
- Sensitivity to bright lights .
- Neck stiffness, joint pains
- Drowsiness or confusion .

*In both children and adults, there may be a rash of tiny, red-purple spots or bruises caused by bleeding under the skin. These can occur anywhere on the body. They are a sign of blood poisoning (septicemia), which sometimes happens with meningitis, particularly the meningococcal strain.

How serious is bacterial meningitis?

If it is diagnosed early and treated promptly, the majority of people make a complete recovery. In some cases it can be fatal or a person may be left with a permanent disability, such as deafness, blindness, amputations or brain damage (resulting in mental retardation or paralysis) even with prompt treatment.

How is bacterial meningitis spread?

Fortunately, none of the bacteria that cause meningitis are as contagious as diseases like the common cold or the flu, and they are not spread by casual contact or by simply breathing the air where a person with meningitis has been. The germs live naturally in the back of our noses and throats, but they do not live for long outside the body. They are spread when people exchange saliva (such as by kissing; sharing drinking containers, utensils, or cigarettes).

The germ does not cause meningitis in most people. Instead, most people become carriers of the germ for days, weeks or even months. Being a carrier helps to stimulate your body's natural defense system.

The bacteria rarely overcomes the body's immune system and causes meningitis or another serious illness.

What is the risk of getting bacterial meningitis?

The risk of getting bacterial meningitis in all age groups is about 2.4 cases per 100,000 population per year. However, the highest risk group for the most serious form of the disease, meningococcal eningitis, is highest among children 2 to 18 years old.

How is bacterial meningitis diagnosed?

The diagnosis is usually based on a combination of clinical symptoms and laboratory results from spinal fluid and blood. Spinal fluid is obtained by a lumbar puncture (spinal tap).

How can bacterial meningitis be prevented?

Do not share food, drinks, utensils, toothbrushes, or cigarettes. Limit the number of persons you kiss.

Vaccines against pneumococcal disease are recommended both for young children and adults over 64. A vaccine against four meningococcal serogroups (A, C, Y, W-135) is available. These four groups cause the majority of meningococcal cases in the United States. This vaccine is recommended by some groups for college students, particularly freshmen living in dorms or residence halls. The vaccine is safe and effective (85-90%). It can cause mild side effects, such as redness and pain at the injection site lasting up to two days. Immunity develops within 7 to 10 days after the vaccine is given and lasts for up to 5 years.

What you should do if you think you or a friend might have bacterial meningitis?

Seek prompt medical attention.




