City Commission Changes Existing Ordiance For The Keeping Of Animals

The City Commission has made some changes to the existing ordinance for the keeping of animals. This ordinance is not going to prohibit anyone from having pet animals, and or some livestock. It will however, limited the number or numbers of livestock that may be kept in a residential area, or the number kept in an area not adequate for more than one.

The City will try to publish parts of the new ordinance in the paper for a couple of issues so that the citizens will be aware of these changes. Please know that the city officials are trying to find a "happy medium" for all the residents inside the city of Gorman. There is much hope that everyone can work together and keep resolved any indifferences.

Examples:

Section 4.11. Creating a Health Hazard.

A. Any person who shall harbor or keep animals on his/her premises, or in or about a premises under his/ her control, and who allows such premises to become a hazard to the general health and welfare of the community, or who shall allow such premises to give off obnoxious or offensive odors due, to the activity or presence of such animals, shall be guilty of a Class "C" misdemeanor.

B. Any person who shall allow his/her animal to eliminate/defecate on public property or the property of another and does not removed same shall be guilty of Class "C" misdemeanor.

Section 3.03. Estray and Other Livestock.

It shall be unlawful for the owner of any horse, mule, jack, jennet, cattle, hog, chicken or other foul, goat or sheep (estray) to permit any such animal to run at large on land that is not his own or under his control, or on any street, alley, or other public place in the City.

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor any combination of two or more of any of the following animals: horses, mules, jacks jennets, or any species of cattle.

It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or harbor any combination of six or more of any goats or sheep. It shall be unlawful to keep or harbor any member of the swine family within the corporate City limits except as a temporary project of an approved 4H or FFA project.

Section 4.14. Excessive Noise

Any person who shall harbor or keep on his premises, or in or about any premises under his control, any animal or poultry which by loud, continual or unusual noise of any kind shall cause the peace and quiet of the neighborhood or the occupant of adjacent premises to be disturbed, shall be guilty of a Class "C" misdemeanor, and a separate offense shall be deemed committed each day during or on which such violation occurs or continues; provided that where only one rooster is kept in compliance with this ordinance, the crowing of such rooster shall not be a violation of this section.



Agriculture Secretary Veneman **Announces Peanut Data Verification**

Agriculture Secretary Ann M. Veneman announced that peanut producers with a qualifying peanut acreage history will soon be asked to update their peanut acreage history and yield information with USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA). The information will be used to determine each peanut producer's peanut base and yield for direct and countercyclical peanut payments for 2002 through 2007 under the Farm Security and Rural Investment Act of 2002, the 2002 Farm Bill.

"The new farm bill makes significant changes in the peanut program and provides direct and counter-cyclical payments to eligible peanut producers," Veneman said. "We are asking producers to review and help update this information now so payments can be issued more promptly when signup begins this fall."

FSA county office employees are now updating acreage and yield

data for each peanut producer in counties that planted or were prevented from planting peanuts in crop years 1998 through 2001. If acreage and yield information included with the letter is correct, producers do not have to respond. If the information is wrong, producers need to provide verifiable documentation of their acreage and yields to their local FSA office by Aug. 5, 2002. Producers who have questions regarding their acreage and/or yields should contact their local county FSA office.

AG TALK By Charlie Stenholm

Packer Ban Ownership

The issue of banning meatpackers from owning livestock prior to slaughter has been the subject of intense debate in recent months, particularly during consideration of the 2002 Farm Bill.

This week, the Senate Agriculture Committee took a close look not only at the proposed ban, but also at

USDA's enforcement of the Packers and Stockyards Act. The hearing focused on a proposal that would prohibit packers from owning, feeding, or controlling live-

stock more than 14 days before slaughter.

The House Agriculture Committee will hold a similar hearing in the near future.

USDA Hopes to Update Farm Bases & Yields

USDA officials believe they can complete the complicated process of updating acreage bases and farm yields for individual farms by August.

Agriculture Deputy Undersecretary Hunt Shipman noted that the farm bill allows for a rule-making process that will allow for a shorter time to issue the new figures upon which payments will be based.

I am advised that farmers should plan on sharing as many production records as possible with county FSA personnel to speed up the process.

Farmers should also gather together all of the records they have, including crop insurance records, elevator receipts, etc.

Producers will have ample time to see the rule and go by the county offices to discuss their options with the

county office staff.

Crop Biotechnology

Turning now to the world of crop biotechnology, a report has been released indicating that the widespread adoption of plant biotechnology in major U.S. crops is resulting in higher yields, lower pesticide use and savings for farmers.

A study by the National Center for Food & Ag Policy says the successful development of additional biotech cultivars for pest management would have similar effects on other crops.

These cultivars include insect-resistant corn and cotton, herbicide-tolerant canola, corn, cotton and soy-

beans. The greatest yield increases among the eight crops studied came from insect resistant corn and insect resistant cotton. In addition, high yield increases in future products are expected in herbicide-tolerant wheat, among other various crops.

The first biotech crops were introduced in 1996, and planting has expanded every year since.

In the U.S., grower acceptance of biotechnology products in major commodity crops has been rapid and widespread, with U.S. growers having steadily increased their biotech average in recent years.

Group Formed to Build Ethanol Plant

Recently, a group has been formed to chart a course of action with hopes of constructing the first modern ethanol production facility in Texas that would convert corn and milo into a gasoline additive.

The group, now known as the Central Texas Ag Development (CTAD), has established an eleven-member board representing eight different counties.

This group believes that ethanol production can help provide a market for Texas grain, while contributing to

our nation's energy security. Several countries are already ahead of the U.S. in ethanol fuel use. However, we grow the grain that ethanol is made from. Our state used nearly 60 million gallons of ethanol in 2001, and we ranked number twelve out of states in corn production and second in milo production.

This new alternative will provide a clean, domestic energy resource for a large supply of our own Texas

grain. **British to Generate Electricity From Straw**

On the subject of generating power, here's a story I never thought I would live to see. Construction is currently underway in Great Britain to build an \$85 million power plant that will use 200,000 tons of straw annually to generate 36 megawatts of power.

This plant will generate enough electricity to heat and light 80,000 homes. In fact, the British have been very innovative in terms of using biomass to generate power.

The United Kingdom already has the world's largest power plant that uses poultry litter as feedstock. This 38.5 megawatt plant in eastern England burns 700,000 tons of poultry litter a year, along with 60,000 tons of woodchips and other biomass products.

Not only is Britain producing energy from poultry waste, they are also finding a useful way of addressing

the problems created by animal waste, a growing problem all over the U.S. I was also interested to read about two other power plants in Britain that specialize in burning meat and

bone meal to produce power. As the U.S. considers future methods of energy production, we are going to have to be as innovative as the British have been.

SECURING OUR NATION'S BORDERS

For too long, the federal government has inadequately addressed border security. Our checkpoints are riddled with security flaws and a patchwork quilt of laws and agencies designed to protect our borders has left gaping holes in our security.

But September 11 changed everything. The border policies Texans have long regarded as ineffective, were suddenly placed in the national spotlight. Our country is now forced to determine how best to protect our homeland.

Department of Homeland Security

In June, the President proposed bringing more than 100 government agencies under the umbrella of a newly created Department of Homeland Security. If passed by Congress, implementing this plan would be the largest restructuring of the federal government since 1947, when President Truman consolidated the nation's armed forces into the Department of Defense. A single authority to oversee homeland security would strengthen our nation's ability to protect its citizens And it is a massive undertaking.

I am pleased that the first of the President's four-point plan is to "control our borders and prevent terrorists and explosives from entering our country." Currently the agencies that operate our border crossings - Customs, the Border Patrol and the Immigration and Naturalization Service - are disparate organizations with no effective collaboration. No one person or organization is in charge. A single authority will improve coordination, communication and efficiency.

Manning the Borders

I have consistently fought for increased funding for our borders. I support free trade - I voted for the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) and know the economic benefits it has brought to our state. But we must ensure there are adequate personnel and facilities to monitor the goods and people flowing into our country. Agents at our borders must be well-trained, appropriately paid, and have access to the high-tech tools needed to allow legitimate visitors' and workers' entry, and keep out potential terrorists and illegal drugs. We must also look at the vehicles, specifically the trucks and buses, that cross our borders by the thousands each day.

Truck Safety


Increased trade creates more opportunities for unsafe vehicles and illegal substances to cross our borders. Nearly 70 percent of truck traffic coming from Mexico into the United States enters through Texas.

This past December I helped secure \$12 million for the Texas Department of Transportation to build more safety inspection facilities along the state's border with Mexico. This funding was in addition to the \$103 million already allocated for safety facilities and inspectors along the entire U.S.-Mexico border.

High-Tech Tools

In April the Senate passed the Enhanced Border Security and Visa Entry Reform Act, which authorizes funding for these agencies and goals. The bill emphasizes high-tech capabilities to track foreign nationals, including biometric data cards to prevent false identities. It also implements an automated system to record the entry of every non-citizen arriving in the U.S. and match it with a record of departure.

The President has asked Congress to pass his homeland security plan by fall. As we work to build a safer, more vibrant border, we must pave the road into our country with good policy that protects us from terrorists, while acknowledging the social and economic contributions legitimate visitors and trade can make.
