



AS tests to be taken October 23-25

The TAAS tests will be offered this October at Gorman High School to those students who need a passing score in one or more parts of the test. By current state law, students must pass all sections of the test in order to receive a high school diploma.

Anyone in the community who has completed all graduation requirements except for passing the TAAS may take these tests to try to earn a high school diploma. A person only has to take that portion of the test that he or she did not pass in high school. Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and who wish to retake a portion of the TAAS may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus. At Gorman High School registration forms are in the Counselor's office.

Forms must be completed and are to be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than September 21, 2001. Students who are currently enrolled in Gorman High School do not need to register for this test.

Persons who have not finished high school and who are interested in obtaining their diplomas, must fulfill the requirements for graduation that were in effect when their class graduated. Therefore, if the TAAS was not required for a person's class, it would not be required today. Texas Tech also has a correspondence program enabling a person to receive a high school pma through correspondence courses. GED tests are offered monthly at







On September 11, 1991, at 7:00 a.m., one million students gathered at school flagpoles all over the country for the first national See You at the Pole" From Boston, Massachusetts, to Los Angeles, California, students came together to pray. Some sang some read Scripture, but most importantly, they prayed for their schools, for their friends, for their leaders, and for their country

As in all great movements of prayer, See You at the Pole" did not begin in the hearts of people. It began in the heart of God. He used the obedience of a small group of teenagers to ignite what has become an international movement of prayer among young people.

Since 1991, See Hin at the Pole" has grown to God-sized proportions. Within only a couple of years, students were praying in several countries around the world. PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 52)

tion to relinquish the state's child to certain distribed land in Bastonp Mounty. The amendment would confirm legal title to that land, excluding any mineral interests, to the individuals who hold a disputed title to the land. The amendment would prevent a loss of title by people who bought and paid for property that was never transferred by the state because of faulty surveys.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the cleaning of land titles by the release of a state claim of its interest to the corners of certain land in Brestrop County."

PROPOSITION 2 (SJR 37)

Proposition 2 would amend the constitution to establish the process for issuing up to \$175 million of state general obligation bonds and notes to provide aid to counties for access road projects to serve border colonias. Generally, a colonia is an economically distressed pecgraphic area with inadequate public services (such as water supplies, sewer services, or payed roads) in a county without adequate resources to provide such services. These projects could include the construction of access reads, the acquisition of materials used in maintaining those roads, and projects related to the construction of those roads, such us road drainage. The Texas Transportation Commission, in consultation with the Governor, would be authorized to determine what constitutes a bonder colonia for purposes of selecting the counties and projects that would receive assistance.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of state general obligation bonds and notes: to provide financial assistance to counties for reachagy projects to serve bonler colonias."

PROPOSITION 3 (SJR 47)

Proposition 3 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt green coffee and raw occoa held in Harris County from property taxes in order to qualify Harris County as an exchange port for coffee by the New York Board of Trade. The authorization of exemption would not apply to any other county.

The proposed amendment will appear on the bullet as folkres: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation raw cocca and green coffee that is held in Hamis County."

PROPOSITION 4 (HUR 1)

Proposition 4 would amend the constitution by setting the term of the fire fighters' pension commissioner at four years. The constitution currently provides that the duration of all offices not otherwise fixed by the constitution may not exceed two years.

The proposed amendment will appear on the bullet as follows: 'The constitutional amendment providing for a four-year term of office for the fire fighters' pension commissioner."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 32) 17 2-011

Proposition, I would amend the constitut Proposition 5 would amend the constitution to althe a municipality by donate spiritus sastatinas entrus an destabusa or other materials used in fighting fires to an underdeveloped country. Current state law does not allow anything of value belonging to the state or its political subdivisions to be clanated to adother retion.

> The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing municipalities to decade outdated or surplus firefighting equipment or supplies to underdeveloper countries."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 45)

Proposition 6 would amend the constitution to require the povernor to call a special session of the legislature so that the legislature can appoint presidential elecfork when the governor determines that it is reasonably likely that the outcome of the election for a presidential candidate's electors will not be clearly determined in time for the appropriate electors to meet before the federal deadline to cast their votes. Under current law, when the people viste for a particular candidate for president, in reality they are voting for that candidate's electors who will meet to cast their votes for president. If the electors are not determined by the certification date, no electoral votes may be that for the state. The proposed amendment ensures that the state's electoral graces will be cast.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional smerchient requiring the governor togall a special session for the appointment of presidential electors under certain circumstances."

PROPOSITION 7 (HJR 82)

Proposition 7 would amend the constitution to unthorize the Veteraris' Land Board torissue and sell up to \$500 millien of additional general obligation bonds to firance additional home aportgape loans to veterans. Additionally, the proposed amendment would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to use assets from the land and housing assistance funds to create, operate, and improve veterans' cometeries.

The proposed amendment will appear on the bullet as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for veterans' housing assistance and to use assets in certain veterans' land and veterans' housing assistance funds to provide for veterans cemeteries."

PROPOSITION 8 (HJR 97)

Proposition S would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Public Finance Authority to issue and sell up to \$850 million of general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the sale of the bonds would pay for construction and repair projects or for the purchase of needed equipment by the General Services Commission, the Yexas Youth Commission, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the

Texas Department of Mertal Health and Mental Retardation, the Parks and Wildlife Department, the adjutant peneral's department, the Texas School for the Deaf, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Public Safety, the State Preservation Board, the Texas Department of Health, the Texas Historical Commission, or the Texas School for the Blind and Visually lapaired.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendagent authorizing the issuance of up to \$850 million in boards parable from Proposition 13 would amend the constistroution and repair biojecul and filt the purchase of needed equipment."

PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 47)

Proposition 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for filling vacancies in the legislature without an election if only one person is a qualified candidate in the election to fill the vacancy. Under current law, a special election must be held to fill. a speancy in the legislature even if there is only one qualified candichte.

The proposed americanent will appear on the ballet as follows: "The constitutional mmendment authorizing the filling of a vacuncy in the legislature without an election if a candidate is nurring thropposed in an election to fill a vacancy."

PROPOSITION 10 (SJR 6)

Proposition 10 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to exempt certain items of personal property from property taxation by political subdivisions of the state if the property is warehoused temporarily in a location in Texas to be assembled, stored, manufactured, processed, fabricated, or repaired and then forwarded to another location irride or outside Texas. The proposed amendment would authorize a political subdivision that imposes ad valorem taxes, at its option, to tax this type of property after a local public hearing on the matter.

The proposed americanent will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote equal tax treatment for products produced, acquired, and distributed in the State of Texas by authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation tangible persocial property held at certain locations only temperarily for assembling, manufacturing, processing, or other commercial purposes."

PROPOSITION 11 (HJR 85)

Proposition 11 would amend the constitution to allow a schoolteacher, a retired schoolteacter, or a retired school administrator who serves as amember of a goventing hody of a school district, city. town, or other local governmental district, including a water district, to receive compensation for serving on such a goventing body. Currently, state employees or other individuals who are compensaed directly or indirectly from state funds are barred from receiving a salary for such service.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballet as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow current and retired public school teachers and retired public school administrators to receive compensation for serving on the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, including water districts."

PROPOSITION 12 (HJR 75)

Proposition 12 would amend, repeal, or relocate several sections of the current

constitution to improve the clarity, organization, and consistency of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional rememblement to eliminate obsolete, archaic, redundant, and unnecessary provisions and to clarify, update, and haunonize certain provisions of the Texas Constitution."

PROPOSITION 13 (SJR 2)

Proposition 14 would amend the constitution to allow the legislature to authorize a taxira unit, other than a school district, to exempt travel trailers from property taxation as long as the travel trailers are lawfully registered with the state and are not held or used for the production of

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot us follows: "The constitutional americanent to authorize the legislature to authorize texing units other than school districts to exempt from ad valorem taxation travel trailers that are not held or used for the production of income."

PROPOSITION 15 (SJR 16)

Proposition 15 would amend the constination to create the Texas Mobility Fund, which would be administered by the Texas Transportation Commission. The Fund would firmine the construction, acquisition, and expansion of state highways and would pay a portion of the costs of public toll reach and other public transportation projects. The legislature may reserve specific sources of state revenue for the Fund and may authorize the Commission to guarantee the payment of any obligations or credit agreements with the full faith and credit of the state. The attorney general shall determine the legality of any such obligations or credit agreements.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballet as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Mobility Fund and authorizing grants and loans of money and issuance of obligations for financing the construction, reconstruction, acquisition, operation, and expansion of state highways, tumpikes, toll roads, toll bridges, and other mobility

PROPOSITION 16 (HJR 5)

Proposition 16 would amend the constitution to reduce the waiting period required for a valid home improvement lien on a homestead from 12 days to 5 days. Currently, a lien may not attach to a homestead for a home improvement loan if the homeowner executed a contract for the improvements less than 12 days after applying for the loan. In addition, the proposed amendment would

authorize the corrersion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on a homestead

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prescribing requirements for imposing a lien for work and material used in the construction, repair, or tenovation of improvements on residential homestead property and including the conversion and refinance of a personal property lien secured by a manufactured home to a lien on real property as a debt on homestead property protected from a

PROPOSITION 17 (HJR 53)

Proposition 17 would amend the constitution to allow the state to relinguish claim to certain state land and to title defects for persons who claim ti those lands. The proposed amendations would apply to land whose comers hime disputed title to the land, but for which no patent from the state, giving clear title to the land, was ever issued. Among other requirements, all of the taxes che on the land must have been paid. Under current law, there is no procedure allowing the state to settle title disputes without a constitutional amendment for each

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to settle land title disputes between the state and a private party."

PROPOSITION 18 (SJR 49)

Proposition 18 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to create a program to consolidate againstandanlize the collection, deposit, reming, and payment of criminal and civil court fees. If the legislature creates such a program, any new fees imposed by the legislature may not take effect before January I of the following year, unless an earlier effective date is approved by a vote of two-thirds of the members of each house

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to promote uniformity in the collection, deposit, reporting, and remitting of civil and criminal fees."

PROPOSITION 19 (HJR 81)

Proposition 19 would amend the constitution to allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue up to \$2 billion of additional general obligation bonds. The Board issues hands to pay for water supply projects, water quality enhancement projects, flood control projects, state participation in water and wastewater facilities, and projects for economically distressed areas. Current law limits the amount of bonds that the Board can issue.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$2 hillion."

Farm Bill Update

Congress is back in session this week and one issue that is receiving considerable attention is "The Farm Security Act of 2001," the farm bill that was reported by the House Agriculture Committee just before the August recess.

Very briefly, this ten-year farm bill would maintain maximum planting flexibility, while providing counter-cyclical protection to help producers survive tough market conditions.

While this legislation was scheduled to come to the floor next week, there is now uncertainty about its future.

Recent reports from the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) and the White House Office of Management and Budget (OMB) indicate that the government will return to the practice of using funds borrowed from the Social Security and Medicare trust funds to make up for shortages in

I support the priorities President Bush has outlined, including strengthening our national defense, meeting our commitments to veterans and providing resources for schools to meet the goals of education reform.

And as a congressman who represents a rural and agricultural district, I am committed to maintaining an agricultural economy that provides our nation with the food and fiber we need to guarantee our own national security.

However, I am concerned about moving forward with spending that would be financed by borrowing from the Medicare and Social Security trust funds. This is money that has already been designated for future generations

Congress should not act on any legislation that spends the Social Security and Medicare surplus until there is an agreement on how spending on defense, education, agriculture and other items fits into a responsible federal budget framework.

I want to work with the President in an effort to meet priorities, but this becomes very difficult when he says he will veto any bills that are over and above the established budget. These include the defense bill, the agriculture bill, the energy bill, and the pharmaceutical benefits bill.

It's time for accountability and I hope the House leadership will not bring the farm bill to the floor at this time under these conditions.

It is also imperative that the Secretary of Agriculture gives us some idea of what the administration likes and dislikes about the current bill. Thus far, they have not done so.

We have been told that they may soon send over some general principles, and I look forward to reviewing those. Amendments may also be added to the bill.

In any case, I am not comfortable with the current situation but the decisions that need to be made remain with the House leadership. I will be talking more about this next week.

Emergency Payments Have Been Delivered

On a more positive note, USDA officials have indicated that 95 percent of direct emergency payments authorized by the agricultural economic assistance package have been sent out to eligible producers.

Producers who have not yet received their checks should contact their local Farm Service Agency (FSA) office.

The economic assistance package also authorized \$84.7 million in payments to cotton ginners.

These payments will be shared with producers in order to make up for the low prices received by producers. The payment rate is estimated to be about \$13 per ton.

Exports Expected to Rise

There is some good news for U.S. producers exporting agriculture products overseas.

Recent projections from USDA expect agriculture exports to reach \$57 billion for fiscal year 2002. This represents a 7% increase over last year and is the highest figure since 1997.

These reports signify three solid years of growth that should prove to be promising for all agriculture producers. These figures also point out how important trade is for agricultural producers.

Crop Insurance to be Strengthened

The USDA has announced a nationwide effort to strengthen and reform crop insurance.

The Risk Management Agency, FSA and private reinsured companies have joined forces to improve the integrity of the program by help-

ing to stop program abuse. Violators are now subject to criminal prosecution, civil suit, and administrative sanctions, including fines and disqualification from the program.

These efforts should help save money for taxpayers, farmers, and ranchers.

Bio-Energy Program Signup Underway

Signup for USDA's Bio-Energy Program began September 4 and will continue through September 28. This program encourages the use of agricultural commodities in bio-energy production.

Under the program, USDA will make up to \$150 million in payments to commercial bio-energy producers that increase production from eligible commodities between October 1, 2001 and September 30, 2002.\

It is expected this will increase demand domestically for producers of barley, corn, sorghum, oats, wheat, soybeans, and other oil crops.

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
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
