The Gorman Panthers traveled to Santo on Friday night to take on a strong and experienced Wildcat team and came away with a 24 to 0 defeat. Gorman played the Wildcats on fairly even terms until midway through the second period when the Wildcats got the ball on the Gorman 37 and scored in nine plays with Colt Price getting the final 4 yards on a run with 5:53 left in the second. the kick of point failed and Santo was up 6-0.

The Panthers came back with their longest drive of the night when they took over at their own 38 yard line and moved to the Santo one yard line in 11 plays with John Torres setting up the Panthers with a 17 yard run to the Santo 1. However, the Wildcats held the Panthers on 3 downs before losing 5 yards on a penalty to move the ball back to the Santo 6, on a pass try Ryan Wright was caught for a loss and the drive failed. The Panthers then held the Wildcats scoreless on their next possession and the halftime score stood

The Wildcats got another break with just over 7 minutes left in the third when they got the ball at the Gorman 11 yard line and on the first play Levi Richards ran it in for the score. A pass try for 2 points failed and the score rose to 12-0.

The game continued on even terms until 10:13 of the fourth period when the Wildcats took over the ball on the Gorman 17 after blocking a Panther punt. The Cats scored on a 1 yard run by Cal Parker to make the score 18-0. A run for 2 points failed.

On the next Panther possession the Wildcat defense intercepted a Panther pass by Preston Mata who returned it for a score with 9:49 left



Preceded by his father, mother and his Mama Linda Clark Strawbridge; and son Matthew James Strawbridge.



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Hospital Happening and Healthful Hints Triage

Have you ever been in an Emergency Room, waiting to see a doctor, and a person who came in after you was seen first? This is called Triage. I have heard them talk about it on "M.A.S.H." I wanted a better definition so I went to Dictionary .com to find out the meaning. "Triage- A process for sorting injured people into groups based on their need for or likely benefit from immediate medical treatment. Triage is used in hospital emergency rooms, on battlefields, and at disaster sites when limited medical resources must be allocated." I thought, o.k. what's involved in triage? I went to Kathy Carpentier, our RN, Certified Emergency Nurse (CEN), and Special Services Manager. She gave me everything I've always wanted to know about triage but was afraid to ask. Here is the Cliff Note's version.

Eastland Memorial Hospital uses a comprehensive triage system called the Emergency Severity Index or ESI. ESI is supported by the Emergency Nurses Association (ENA) Standards of Emergency Nursing Practice. Certified Emergency Nurses, Critical Care Nurses and medical doctors developed this system. The Emergency Nurses Association Standards of Emergency Nursing Practice is working towards having all of the hospitals in the United States use the ESI Triage System because it is the most comprehensive triage system and reduces the cost of education. If all hospitals used the ESI triage system, triage training would be the same, so retraining would not be necessary. Eastland Memorial Hospital is one of the first hospitals, in the area to utilize the ESI triage system; we are on the cutting edge.

The Emergency Severity Index is a 5 level triage system. Four decision points are critical to the accurate and reliable application of ESI levels, which include:

A. Is this patient dying? This includes intubated/pulseless or unresponsive.

Is this a patient who shouldn't wait? This includes a high-risk situation, confused/lethargic/disoriented, or severe pain/distress.

How many resources will this patient need? None, one or two, or more? Resources include specialty consultation, lab, ECG, x-rays, ultrasound, or medications.

D. What are the patient's vital signs/ and level of consciousness?

ANOTHER EASTLAND COUNTY JURY SAYS: WE WILL NOT TOLERATE METH LABS IN EASTLAND COUNTY

JAMES DAVID KEYSER, 39, formerly a city of Cisco resident, is now an inmate awaiting transfer to state prison to serve a 80-year sentence for the manufacture of Methamphetamine.

Keyser was arrested for the offense on September 14, 2001 after Cisco Police Officers on routine patrol in the City of Cisco, noted a strong odor of ether in and around a residence on East 10th Street. With the assistance of Chief Deputy Robert Rains of the Eastland County Sheriff's Office, who was then an agent of the West Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force, Cisco Police Officers went to the residence in reference to the odor to determine if there was anything illegal going on. Once obtaining permission to search the premises from one of the occupants of the residence, officers came upon a Nazi Methamphetamine Lab and approximately 13.11 grams of Methamphetamine. Keyser, who was discovered underneath a pickup at the residence, was arrested and ultimately indicted by an Eastland County Grand Jury. Keyser had been set for trial in March of 2004 but on the date of jury selection in the case, he absconded. He was later found and arrested in the State of Oklahoma and brought back to stand trial in Eastland.

An Eastland County jury of twelve citizens deliberated for less than 12 minutes and returned a verdict of guilty against Kesyer, after hearing two days of testimony and closing arguments by Assistant District Attorney Brenda Gray and Defense Counsel Kirby Roberts. During closing arguments on punishment, Criminal District Attorney Russ Thomason asked the jury to send a message with their verdict that meth labs will not be tolerated in Eastland County, to not only Kesyer, but to others who operate illegal drug labs in the county. Approximately 20 minutes later, the jury came back with punishment on the manufacturing charge set at 80 years confinement in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice and a fine in the amount of \$2,500.

District Judge Steven R. Herod presided over the proceedings and formally sentenced Keyser in the presence of the jury.

The prosecutors expressed gratitude for the joint efforts of the Cisco Police Department and the West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force for shutting down another meth lab. Thomason was very complimentary of the jurors who were selected in this case, stating: "These jurors actively listened to the evidence in this case and, by the 80-year sentence, sent a strong message to those who are manufacturing illegal drugs in Eastland County... Don't."



There are four levels of consciousness (AVPU) that must be considered when assigning a level to a patient. Is the patient:

> A-Alert V-Verbal

P-Painful

U-Unresponsive

All of these questions are then rated and each patient is assigned an ESI level, 1 being the greatest risk up to 5 being the least risk. Examples

ESI level 1: A 65-year-old with CPR in progress, a respiratory arrest, or a critically injured trauma patient who is unresponsive

ESI level 2: A 53-year-old with 30% body surface area (BSA) burn, a 45 year-old involved in a motor vehicle collision (MVC), that was ejected from vehicle, and has a blood pressure of 100/60

ESI level 3: Right lower quadrant pain: 22-year-old, pain started early this morning, also nausea, and no appetite. ESI resources=2 or more, (possible) surgery consult

Urinary tract infection symptoms: ESI resources=1, ESI level 4: exam, urine & urine culture, prescriptions

ESI level 5: Poison ivy: ESI Resources=0, exam, prescription This system gives clinical staff the most comprehensive way to determine the order in which to examine patients in the Emergency Room.

So the next time you come to the emergency room and an ambulance arrives with an unconscious person, that person will be treated first. This





THREE YEARS LATER

This month marks the third anniversary of the tragic September 11 terror attacks. That fateful day was the first time since Pearl Harbor that we were assaulted on our own soil and the first strike on the continental United States in over a century. Everyone, even young children, remembers where they were when they heard the terrible news and saw the grisly images. Those terrorist acts have forever changed the American mindset. But despite the losses of that day, Americans have proven they are up to the challenge. Citizens, soldiers and law enforcement have answered the call in the war on terrorism.

That we did not see the attacks coming is a collective burden that transcends political parties and falls on all branches of government, past and present. Since that horrible day, we have made tremendous, bipartisan progress to make America far safer. We have designated a new department with the sole mission of protecting our country and nearly tripled homeland security funding. I'm especially proud to have co-authored a law to better safeguard our airplanes - enhancing baggage and passenger screening and expanding the air marshals program. Law enforcement officials estimate more than 100 planned terrorist attacks on our soil have been thwarted since 9/11, from an airplane passenger's simple plot to carry explosives in his shoes, to more complex designs that remain classified for our safety.

Abroad and At Home

Al Qaeda has been chased from Afghanistan and is on the run. In Iraq the brutal Saddam Hussein regime that supported terrorists is no more, though our enemies are making a desperate last stand. We must continue to help establish democratic governments in Afghanistan and Iraq to eliminate safe harbors for terrorists across the globe. We will see this mission through and send a message to terrorists and the world that freedom will triumph.

Clearly, we have more work to do to better protect our homeland, especially to improve rail and port security. Earlier this year, I introduced legislation that would strengthen and coordinate security measures for cargo shipping and use smart box technology. We must ensure our borders with Canada and Mexico are a priority and have the resources needed to stop would be terrorists while keeping commerce flowing.

What Next

We must also ensure our law enforcement has the tools they need. The PATRIOT Act has helped us thwart terrorist attacks by granting new authority to law enforcement. But this law will expire at the these tools slip away.

The September 11th Commission recently proposed a number of changes including a single national intelligence director. Our commander-in-chief must receive comprehensive and accurate national security data, so I will give this recommendation serious consideration. Congress has already held many hearings and I believe more action should follow within the coming months.

Moving Forward

In the three short years since the terrorists struck, we have achieved significant progress. The surprise attack on our country in 1941 created the climate that produced the Greatest Generation. These men and women overcame evil regimes and other hardships with determination and humility. Today we are in the midst of a similar battle. It is a calling we did not ask for but that we have no choice but to accept. Working together, we are on the path to defeat the terrorists, expand freedom and ensure our children and grandchildren enjoy a more secure future.

Meatsafety.org: A Recipe For Healthy Food

(NAPSA)-As Americans enjoy the healthy benefits and good taste of grilling, experts warn it's important not to push food safety to the back burner. Government data show that meat and poultry are safer than ever.

"New technologies in meat and poultry plants have reduced bacteria to record low levels," says Dr. Randall Huffman, vice president of scientific affairs, American Meat Institute (AMI). "But because all fresh products-from burgers to broccoli-naturally contain bacteria, safe handling is still vital to good health." Huffman says simple steps detailed on the new Web site, www.meatsafety.org, can make a big difference in food safety.


Clean

Always wash your hands with soap and hot water before and after handling raw meat, poultry and produce-and use soap and hot water to wash utensils and surfaces that have contacted raw meat, poultry or produce. Also, it isn't necessary to wash raw chicken before cooking it. Any bacteria will be destroyed by cooking. Separate

Always separate raw meats from all other foods. Bacteria in raw meat juices can contaminate foods that have been cooked safely or raw foods that won't be cooked, such as salad ingredients. Do not use the same platters for raw and cooked meat or poultry. Never reuse raw meat packaging or marinades.

Chill

When grilling in the warm weather, keep raw meat and poultry products chilled until they are

ready to be cooked. Bacteria grow when food is in the "danger zone," between 40 and 140 degrees. If using frozen meat, keep it cold while thawing. The best method is to thaw it slowly in the refrigerator. To defrost more rapidly, put the meat in a watertight plastic bag in cold water. Cook immediately or refrigerate after thawing. Do not refreeze.

Cook Always use a meat thermometer. It's the best way to know your food has been cooked to a safe temperature. Ground meat and poultry products should be cooked to an internal temperature of 160 degrees. For cooking temperature recommendations on other products, follow the manufacturer's guidelines as listed on the thermometer packaging.

Entries must be made by the contestant entering the item. Judges' decisions are final.


