The Gorman Panthers opened their season on Friday night when they traveled to Santo to take on the Wildcats and came out on the short end of a 13-6 score. The Big Red blew a couple of good opportunities after getting turnovers, but also missed some good chances to score via the fumble route and 2 intercep-

The Wildcats got the opening kickoff and on the first play from scrimmage the Panthers defense intercepted a pass on the Gorman 48, but failed to take advantage of the

After being forced to punt, the Panthers gave the Wildcats the ball on the Gorman 45 after a bad snap on a punt try. From there the Wildcats scored in 5 plays to set them up at the Gorman 27. From there Cal Parker broke thru the Big Red defense and ran in for the TD with 5 minutes left in the first period. After the point after the Wildcats lead 7-0.

The Panthers came right back with a drive to the Santo 18 before losing the ball on downs.

The teams played on even terms until the Panthers got the ball on their own 38 yard line and went the distance for the score in 16 plays with Ryan Wright getting the final yard on a quarterback sneak with just 47 seconds left in the half. The try for point failed and the halftime score was 7-6.

Both the Panther and Santo Bands did real good jobs with their routines at the intermission.

The teams played on fairly even terms until late in the fourth period when the Big Red gave the Wildcats the ball on the Gorman 19 yard line on a fumble. After a 6 yard run, Cal Parker again got thru the Panther defense and raced for the final


13 yards for the score with 4:53 left in the game. The kick for point after Santo failed and the Wildcats were up 13-6.

The Panthers failed to move the ball on two more occasions and the 27/131 final score stood at 13-6.



Children's Textbook Fund Jeopardized by Proposition 9

Proposition 9 on the upcoming Constitutional Amendment election on September 13 gives the Legislature added power to access funds from the Permanent School Fund (PSF). The PSF was created in 1876 with 2 million dollars and now has a value of about 18 billion dollars.

The Texas Constitution forbids touching the corpus or capital of the fund. All that can be spent are the earnings. Since the early 1900s, the earnings of the PSF have been used to buy textbooks for every child in every subject in Texas public schools. The PSF has also been used to guarantee bonds sold by local school districts to build new schools, which means that the local districts get their money at a lower interest rate. This has saved local taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars over the years.

The PSF consistently outperforms all other similar State funds. A key to the performance is the requirement to preserve the corpus and use only the earnings. All that will change if voters approve Proposition 9. The proposed change will allow the Legislature to demand a payout of up to 6% of the value of the fund in each

In addition, section (g) of the Proposition 9 requires a payout in THIS biennium of about 300,000,000 dollars in addition to the \$1.4 billion the fund has earned. This is a raid on the PSF to help balance the state budget. That is NOT the purpose of the PSF.

Every withdrawal from the corpus of the fund decreases its earning power for future generations and will Mary Ann Alexander of require future tax increases to make up for those lost earnings. Vote NO on Proposition 9.




