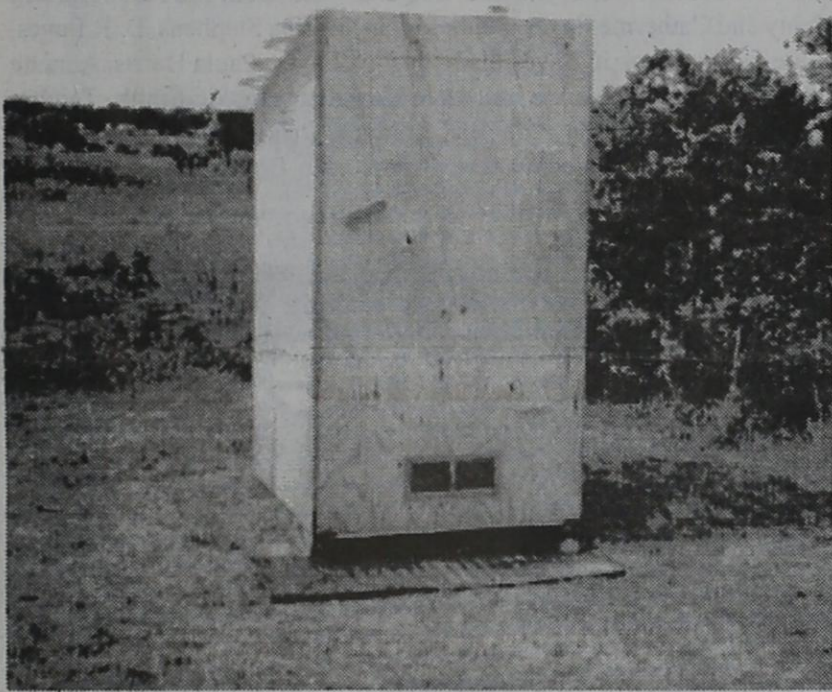

Gorman Peanut Festival - 1984-2004 and Still Going

The Gorman Peanut Festival will mark 20 years of "Festivals" this year on the 2nd Saturday in September.

In 1984 the Gorman Peanut Festival was revived by a group of local citizens who formed the "Gorman Business Alliance." Some of the first members were: Brent Lasater, Larry and Ramona Stewart, Gerald and Ina Scitern, Brad and Jeannie Whittier, Al and Nelda Hunter. To be able to finance the first Peanut Festival fund raisers were held—hamburgers were sold downtown once a month, a softball tournament was held, and businesses donated items for raffles. On the 3rd Saturday in Sept. 1984, Gorman's Annual Peanut Festival was started again. For six years the Business Alliance raised money through fund raisers through out the year to be able to have the Peanut Festival.

Some of the other things the Business Alliance did through out the year was sponsor a Free Spook House and dance at Halloween, and later the Halloween Parade. And at Easter we sponsored the Easter Treasure Hunt. We also sponsored a young lady in the Gorman Chamber of Commerce's Miss Gorman Pageant every year.

We had new members join and old members to leave. In 1989, only Brent Lasater, Brad and Jeannie Whittier and Gerald and Ina Scitern were left from the original organizing members of the Business Alliance. Without the help of all the volunteers at Peanut Festival time we would not have been able to continue.

In June 1990, Gerald Scitern was diagnosed with cancer and underwent surgery in August. After that he was unable to take an active part in the Peanut Festival. So the Business Alliance felt it was time to reorganize or throw in the towel.

In 1991 a new group was formed named, "The Gorman Peanut Festival Committee." Since Gerald and Ina were unable take part, the only original Peanut Festival members to serve on this committee were Brent Lasater and Jeannie Whittier.

In 1991, the Eastland Chamber of Commerce ask the Peanut Festival Committee to change weekends with the Old Rip Festival which was held the 2nd weekend in September and it was voted to do so. Therefore, the Gorman Peanut Festival was changed from the 3rd Saturday to the 2nd Saturday in September and is still held on that date.

In Sept. 1992, Gerald Scitern passed away and Ina was asked to become apart of the Peanut Festival Committee.

At this time (2004), Jeannie Whittier and Ina Scitern Smith are the only original members to still be on the Peanut Festival Board of Directors.

In 2003, the Gorman Ex-Student Association began having their program in conjunction with the Peanut Festival.

This year we are happy to add the First Peanut Festival Annual Shin Oak Cook off. Judging will be on beef brisket, chicken, pork spare ribs and jackpot beans.

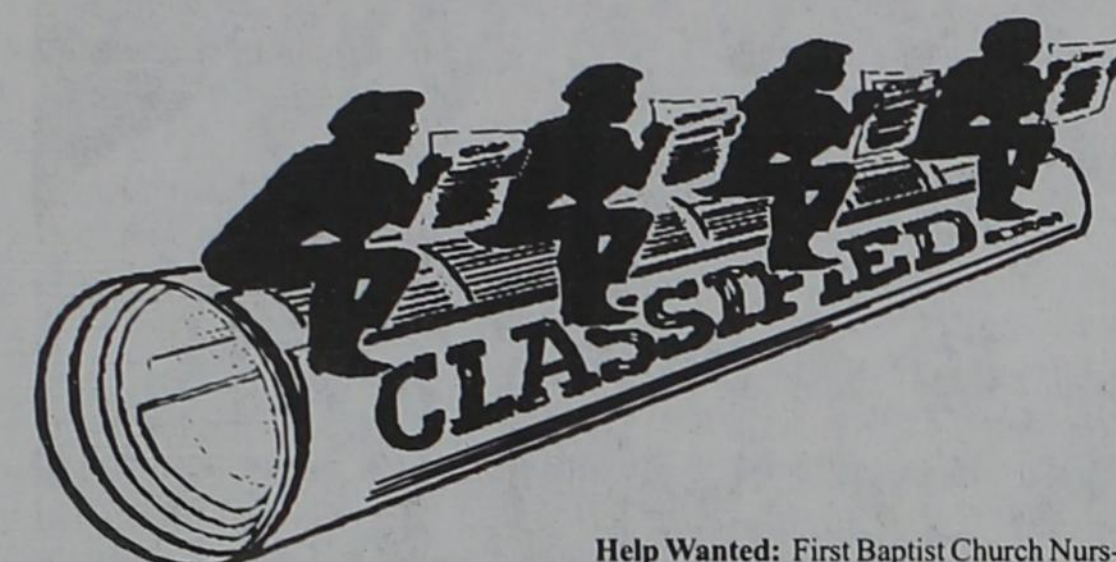
A memorial service for Barbara was held on Saturday, May 15, 2004 at the Kokomo Community Center.

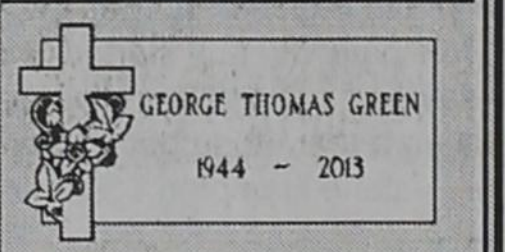

Emergency meeting called for the Oakland Cemetery. Due to the rain stopping our Cemetery Business Meeting on May 1, we are calling another one for May 22.

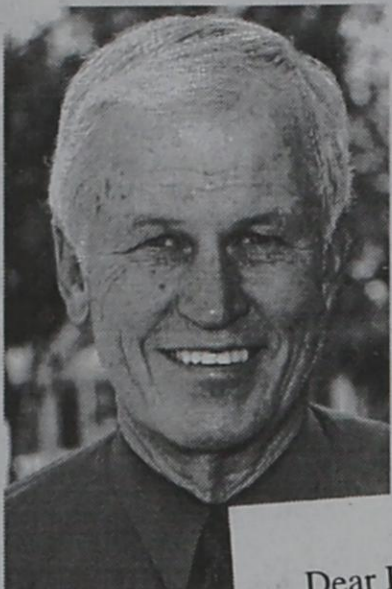
It's important that we have this meeting so we can elect some officers.

John Hullum will be in charge of sign-up for the Musical. Country Western musicians and signers wishing to participate are requested to contact John at 254-653-2641.

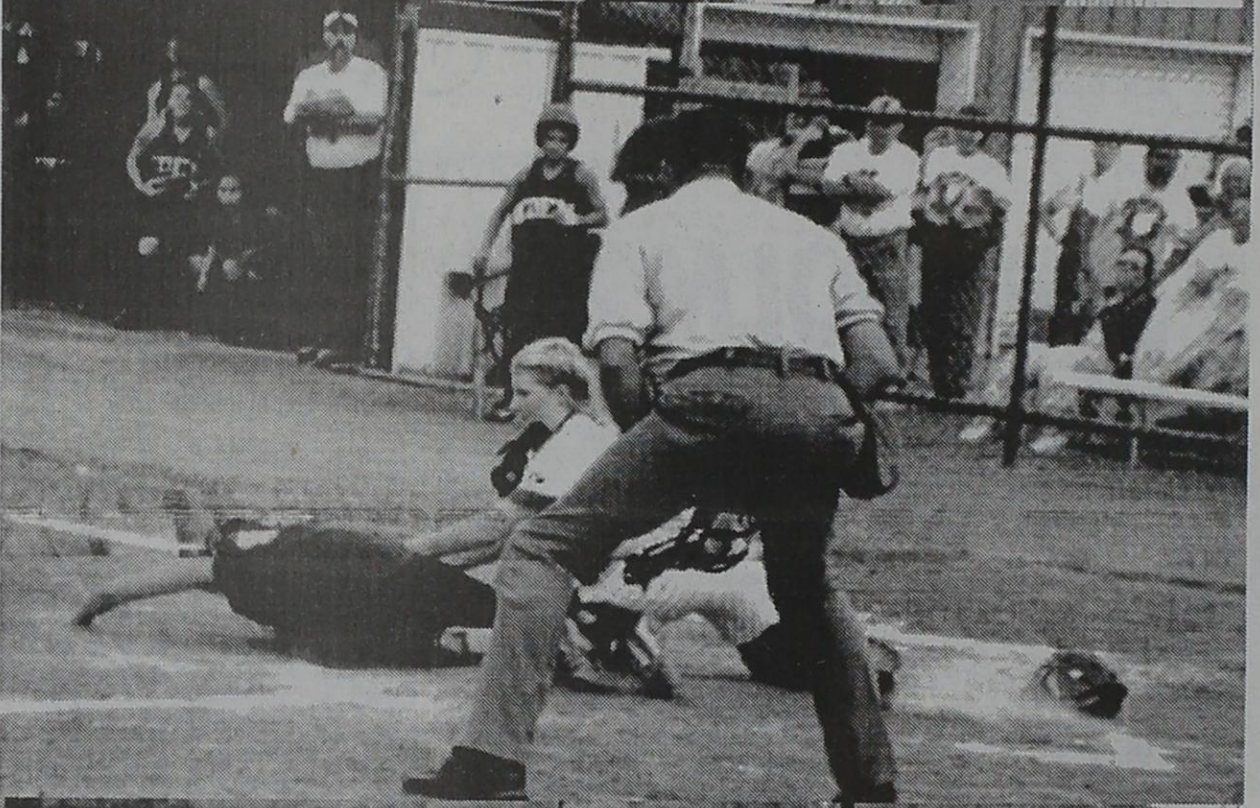

CareFlite Crew: Craig Hilton-Pilot, Jackie Keele, RN and Neil Laws, EMTP

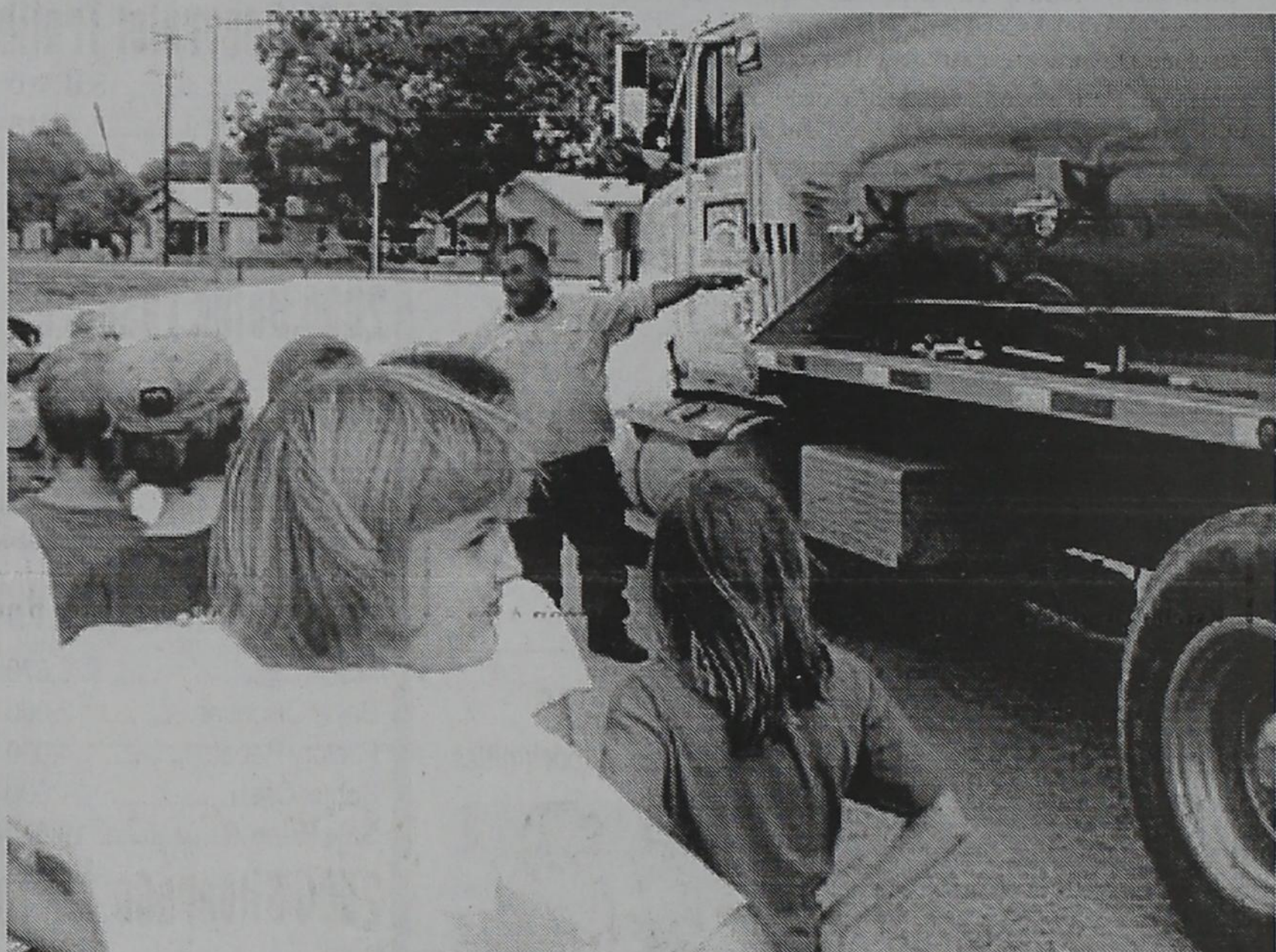

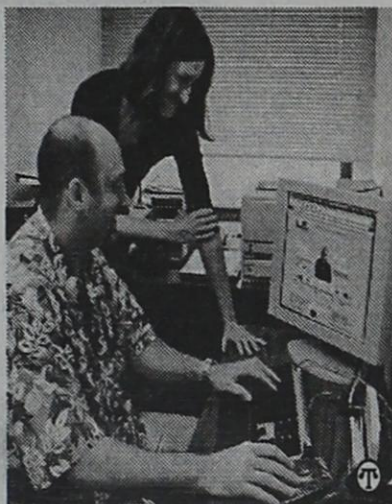

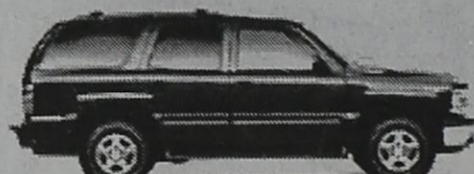
