Panthers Outlast Buffs 9-6; Host Baird Bears On Friday

The Gorman Panthers traveled to Cross Plains on Friday night to meet the Buffaloes in an important District 13A game and came away with a 9-6 win. The game was played on even terms for the first quarter with each team exchanging possessions before the Buffs got the ball deep in their territory and completed a desperation pass to score and make the halftime score read 6-0. But the Panthers came back to score 9 points in the third and held the Buffs on defense for a final of 9-6.

The Buffs got the ball on their own 24 early in the second quarter and after being held to one first down the Big Red defense set the Buffs back on 2 consecutive plays for loses of 3 and 9. Then the Buffs were hit with a motion penalty to set them up at their own 17 yard line with a third down and 27. But the Buffs end got behind the Panthers defender and caught a pass at his own 34 and outran the defender for a 83 yard touchdown with 9:18 left in the second period. The kick try failed and the Buffs were up 6-0. This score stood up until halftime.

During the intermission both the Panther Marching Band and the Cross Plains band performed their routines they were to present at the Band Contest and really pleased the fans. They did a great job.

Following the halftime break the Panthers took the kickoff and were moving the ball well after starting on their own 35 and moving deep into the Buff territory before two big penalties to cause them to be stopped at the Buffs 19. From there the Big Red Defense again did their job and after a big loss on third down forced the Buffs to punt from their own 5 ball and was caught in the end zone for a safety with 6:52 left in the period to make the score 6-2.

The Panthers then took the kickoff on their own 46 and scored on a long, time consuming drive with Ryan Wright getting the final 2 yards on a keeper play with 11:55 left in in the game. The drive covered 55 yards in 13 plays. Wright carried 5 times for 18 yards; Reggie Sanchez carried 5 times for 43 yards. Joey Jones carried 3 times before Wright carried in for the score. Clint Jones booted the point after and Gorman was up 9-6.

The Big Red Defense again did their job and held the Buffs scoreless the rest of the way. Gorman had two good drives before ending up with a first down at the Cross Plains 5 and killed the clock by dropping a knee on 3 plays to end the game.

Sanchez led the Panthers with 109 yards on 17 carries. Wright had 53 on 17 keepers; Joey Jones got 47 on 12 tries and John Torres had 15 on 6

The Big Red did a very good job most of the way to hold the large Buff team to only 1 first down in the second half. They will need another big defensive effort when they host the Baird Bears at Brogdon Field on Friday in another important District game.







PUBLIC NOTICE

Texas Community Development Program

Date of Publication: October 21, 2004

The City of Gorman is giving notice of the City's intent to submit a Community Development fund application for a grant from the Texas Community Development Program. The grant application request is for \$239,000 for the following activities:

Construction of 11,000 LF of 6" water line; service/main line connections; gate valves/fire hydrants; and related street repair. Project activities will be located in the eastern and southern parts of town.

The application is available for review at City Hall during regular business hours.

The City of Gorman, PWS #0670003. water system collected four (4) water samples during the month of September 2004, that contained coliform bacteria. This water system is required to submit a minimum of two (2) routine water samples each month for bacteriological analysis. Two (2) routine samples were coliform found and two (2) repeat samples were coliform found for the month and year indicated above.

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) sets drinking water standards in Texas and has determined that the presence of total coliform is a possible health concern. Coliforms are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful, bacteria may be present. Coliforms were found in more samples than allowed and this was a warning of potential problems.

For water systems analyzing at least 40 samples per month, no more than 5.0 percent of the monthly samples may be positive for total coliforms. For systems analyzing fewer that 40 samples per month, no more than one sample per month may be positive for total coliforms.
