Panthers Clinch District Title; Travel To Evant

The Gorman Panthers clinched the 14A District Title on Friday night when they defeated the Santa Anna Mountaineers by a 41-0 margin at Brogdon Field. The Panthers are now 4-0 in district and have only the Evant Elks on their regular schedule. Gorman scored 14 points in each of the first two quarters, then coasted the rest of the way for the victory. The Big Red Defense held the Mounties to a total of 163 yards, 87 rushing and 76 passing.

Gorman hit the scoreboard first with 4:10 left in the opening quarter when Adon Rodriguez ran it in from 4 yards out. The drive covered 54 yards in 9 plays and featured a 10 yard run by Sanchez, a 10 yard pass by Nick Guthery, and a 16 yard pass to Paul Petree to set Gorman up at the 4. Justin Snider added the point after and Gorman led 7-0.

Then following an interception by Jason Johnson of a Mountie pass at the Gorman 41, Paul Petree got the final yard on a run with no time remaining in the quarter. The drive covered 59 yards in 7 plays and featured 2-7 yard runs by Petree, then another 6 yarder by Petree for a first down, and a beautiful 33 yards scamper by Rodriguez before Petree scored. Snider booted the point after and the score was 14-0.

On the next possession by the Panthers they took the ball on the Santa Anna 44 and scored in just 4 plays with Rodriguez getting the final 12 yards on a nice run with 8:33 left in the second. The drive featured a beautiful 34 yard pass from Guthery to Ronald Majors to set Gorman up at the Santa Anna 10. Following a two yard loss, Rodriguez got the score. Snider kicked the extra point and Gorman led 21-0.

The Panthers got another drive going following an interception by Ronald Majors. They got the ball on the Santa Anna 39 and scored in four plays with Petree catching an 8 yard pass from Guthery with 6:10 left in the half. The drive featured a fantastic run of 24 by Petree to put Gorman at the 20. Then Guthery hit Majors with a 12 yarder and then Petree caught the TD pass. Snider booted the point after and Gorman led 28-0 at halftime.

The Gorman Panther Marching Band and Santa Ann Band performed their routines at halftime and did a great job.

Paul Petree led the Panthers with 114 yards on 16 carries and 2 pass receptions for 24 yard. Rodriguez had 63 yards on 5 tries and 1 pass for 15 yards. Marco Herrera got 44 yards on 9 tries. Margarito Sanchez ran for 22 on 8 carries. Jeremy Bryan carried four times for 6 yards and Guthery had 4 yards on 7 keepers. Ronald Majors had 5 catches for 67 yards.

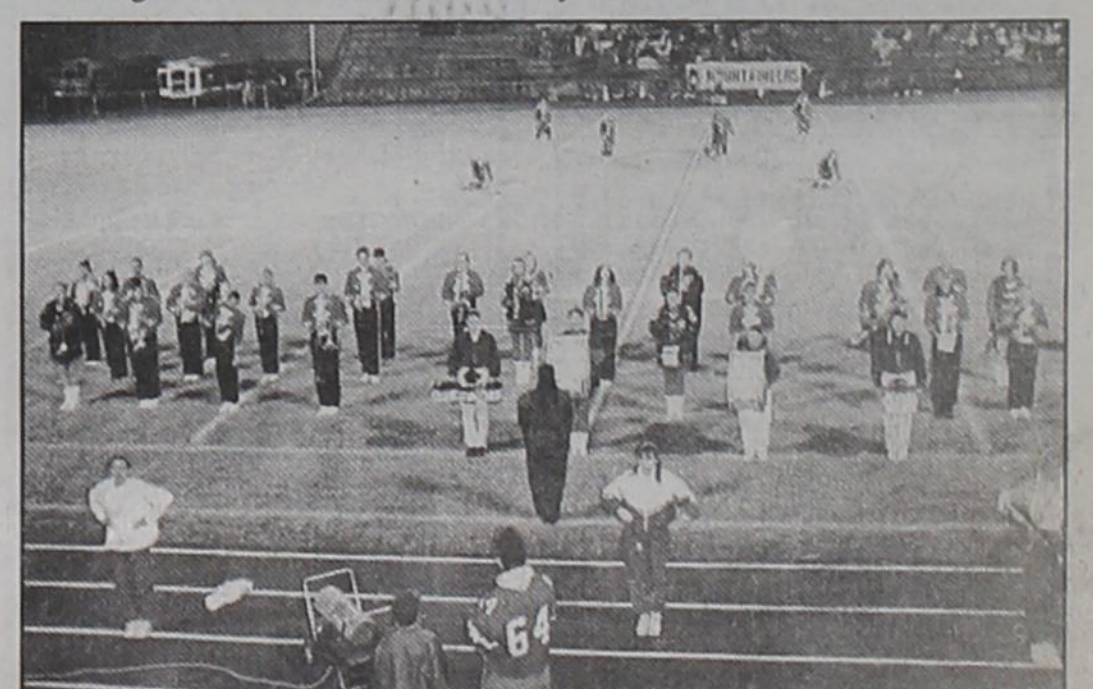

Gorman native Carolyn Gilbert of San Angelo was honored by Abilene Christian University's Department of Family and Consumer Sciences with an Outstanding Alumna Award Saturday, Oct. 21, at the Homecoming reunion coffee. This award recognizes distinctive personal and professional achievements of graduates in the department.

Gilbert earned her bachelor's degree in home economics from ACU in 1965 and went on to earn a master's degree from Tarleton State University.

She is currently the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's director for the West Central District. Her duties include coordinating education activities all of county extension agents throughout the 9-county area and directing the family and consumer science programs in the district. Gilbert also served in the U.S. Air Force for three years and continues to serve as a colonel in the Air Force Reserve. She was recently named the Individual Mobilization Augmentee Mission Support Commander to the 95th Mission Support Squadron at Edwards Air Force Base in California.

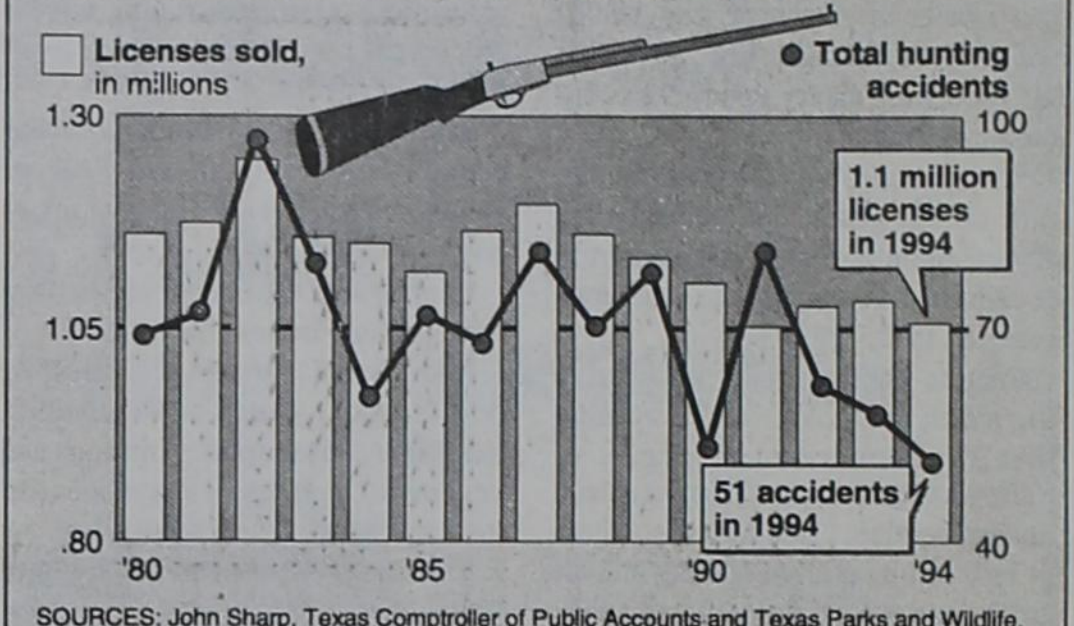

Safety Tips For Cold Weather

Are you ready for winter? The severe storms the state endured last spring mean that there are some special things you should be aware of before the cold weather really takes hold, particularly if you sustained any roof damage from hail or high winds.

- *Make sure the flues to all your gas appliances are hooked together and extend through the roof.
- *If you have had your roof recovered, be sure that vent openings have not been covered over. Vent stacks should extend through the roof to the outside.

In addition to these special hints, Lone Star Gas also recommends you contact a certified heating and air conditioning contractor to check your heating equipment prior to the beginning of the heating season. To obtain the name of a Lone Star Gas Preferred Gas Dealer in your area, dial 1-800-545-3427. Additionally, Lone Star offers the following safety tips for the cold months ahead:

- *If an appliance's pilot light goes out, turn off the gas at the appliance for several minutes before you attempt to re-light it. You should find instructions attached to the appliance.
- *When re-lighting a pilot light, strike the match and hold it to the opening first. Then slowly turn on the gas.
- *The pilot light on gas appliances should always be blue. If the flame is yellow or red, call a certified heating and air conditioning contractor immediately.
- *Use a gas appliance only for its intended purpose. An oven, for example, should not be used to heat a room.

And if you use a space heater in your home, the following guidelines should be observed:

- *Clean space heaters before using; remove cobwebs, dust and dirt that may have accumulated during the warmer months.
- *Be sure the space heater, if it is vented, is operating properly.
- *If the space heater doesn't have a vent or an oxygen cut-off switch, provide proper, outside ventilation such as a slightly open window.
- *Check the air/gas mixture of your space heater's flame. Make sure it is blue, not red or yellow.
- *Make sure the grille is intact in place
- *Keep space heaters away from furni-

ture, drapes and other combustible materials. Here are some other tips for year round safety:

- *Never store or use gasoline or any flammable liquids (such as paint, paint thinner, cleaning fluids, etc.) in the same room with any gas appliance.
- *Never store combustibles near floor or wall furnace grilles.
- *Never store rags, paper or other combustibles near any appliance with a pilot light or open flame.
- *Have qualified service people install and maintain all gas appliances.
- *Always follow the manufacturer's instruction for the installation and operation of each appliance. If installing a gas water heater in the garage, place the water heater at least 18 inches off the floor.
- *Before you dig in your yard, take precautions against disrupting underground gas lines by calling your local plumber.
- *Contact your local plumber to make periodic inspections of gas lines in your home and gas lines on your property.

If you smell the odor of gas in your home, follow these three steps:

1. Do not switch anything electrical on or off, strike a match or do anything that might cause a spark. And don't use your own telephone, as telephones use small amounts of electricity.
2. Have everyone evacuate the house immediately, leaving the doors open for ventilation.

And built the runways too.

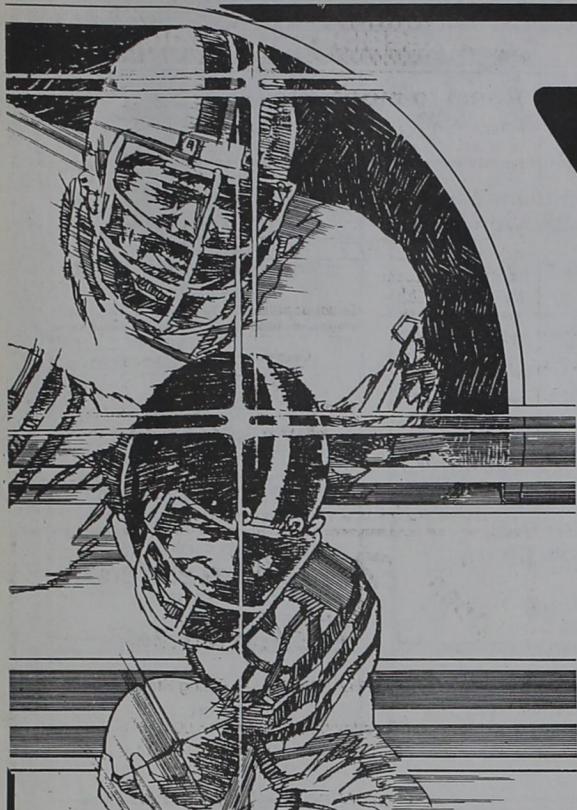

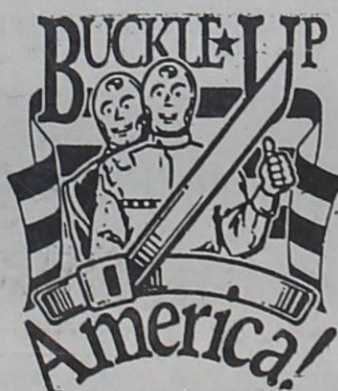
Senator Gramm Receives Award
