The Panthers took the ball on the Lometa 34 after a fumble recovery and scored in 6 plays with Nick Guthery getting the score on a 1 yard run with 7:49 left in the first. The drive featured a 15 yard run for a first down by Margarito Sanchez, an 8 yard run by Paul Petree and an 11 yard first down run by Petree, and another 3 yarder by Petree. Justin Snider added the point after kick and Gorman was up 7-0.

The drive featured a 14 yard pass to Jason Warren, a 10 yard pass to Ronald Majors and a 6 yard pass to Warren. Then Petree set up Gorman with a first down 12 yard run to the Lometa 7. After a 1 yard run, Petree then got the score. Snider booted the point after and Gorman was up 20-0.

The Panthers got the ball back on the Lometa 21 after a fumble recovery and scored in just 3 plays. Following a 1 yard run, Sanchez ran for 11 yards to set Gorman up at the 9 yard line. Nick Guthery then hit Ronald Majors with a 9 yard pass for the score with 3:34 left in the half. Petree then added the 2 pointer on a run and Gorman led 28 to 0 at halftime.





Nominations For '96 Co. Committee Election

A mail election to elect three members to the FSA County Committee will be held December 4, 1995. The reorganization of USDA changed the responsibilities of the old ASC County Committee and each Local Administritive Area (LAA) will elect a county committee person. Eligible voters will have the opportunity to nominate the candidates of their choice by petitions. Blank petitions may be obtained at the FSA County Office. Each petition submitted must be limited to one nominee, signed by the nominee, and postmarked or delivered to the FSA County Office not later than October 30, 1995.

Perons nominated should be currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and be well qualified for committee work. A list of eligible votes for each LAA is available at this office.

This election will be conducted on a nondiscriminatory basis without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, marital status, or disability.

PEANUT MEARKETING CARDS

Peanut Smart Marketing and Producer ID cards have been prepared and are ready to be issued. Peanut marketing cards can be released only in the county office to the farm operator or a producer having 100% interest in all peanuts produced on the farm.

Producers and/or handlers are responsible for accurately keeping peanuts identified by FSN when they are being dried, cleaned and held on the buying point yard or on another farm before the peanuts are weighed, graded and entered on the ASCS-1007. Buying points and producers must keep each load of peanuts, whether on dryer trailers or other vehicles identifiable by FSN and by the name and address of the producer.

1995 Noninsured **Crop Disaster** Program (NAP)

The Crop Insurance Reform Act of 1994 replaced the ASCS Crop Disaster Program with CAT and NAP. To be eligible producers must have suffered greater than a 50 percent loss of an eligible crop in an approved area. Eastland County is not an in an approved area but producers must follow certain requirements to report crops and losses should the county later become part of an approved area. Producers are required to report damage to this office within 15 calendar days after the occurrence of the damage to the crop. No payment will be available

Proposed Budget Cuts Could Devastate Texas

THE GORMAN PROGRESS

"Proposed budget cuts could have a severe impact on Texas, slowing economic growth in the entire state," Texas food and Agriculture Council Chairperson Harold Bob Bennett said today.

"Agriculture contributes more that \$36 billion a year to the Texas economy, Texas was the first ranking state of all the States for receiving Commodity Credit Corporation Price Supports which exceed \$1.5 billion in 1994 alone," Bennett said.

The Congressional budget plan proposes cuts in farm program spending of about \$13.4 billion over the next seven years. These cuts would amount to about one-fifth of projected farm spending for commodity programs, the Conservation Reserve Program and reorganization, rural development federal crop insurance.

In contrast, President Clinton has proposed a farm spending plan that ensures adequate supplies of food and fiber at a reasonable cost and maintains the stability of the agriculture economy that is important to every Texan. This plan would require reductions in farm spending of about \$4.3 billion over the next seven years and \$6.1 billion over 10 years. The President's plan would maintain a level of investment in agriculture critical to sustaining the food and fiber system.

"The strength of Texas and America lies in our rural roots and our first line of defense has always been American Agriculture," Bennett said. "It is clear that a balanced budget will require sacrifice from all of us. What we need to remember is we can balance the budget and not take away the safety net for farmers and rural America that has ensured a strong economy for Texas. Current farm programs have

been built on a partnership between the public and private industry. This partnership has produced history's most abundant, most affordable, and most wholesome food supply.

Major farm states, such as Texas face some of the largest reductions under the Congression plan. Based on current policies, reductions of nearly \$1 billion or more in farm program spending would hit Texas, Kansas, and Iowa over the next seven years. In addition, Texas would suffer \$3.61 billion in food assistance program cuts.

Rural America, including Texas has disproportionately orne the burden of deficit reduction over the past decade. Rural Americans should be asked to carry only their fair share of cuts necessary to balance the budget.

"Rural Texas communities, organizations, and families will benefit from the consolidation of our services as well," said Bennett. "As a result of this





Senate Approves Welfare Reform

The U.S. Senate, in an 87-12 roll call vote, has apporved a welfare reform bill htat contains three key provisions by U.S. Sen Phil Gramm to terminate welfare payments for recipients who refuse to work, deny welfare benefits to noncitizens and require a dramatic reduction in the federal wel-

fare bureaucracy. "When we started the welfare debate, we had a bill that had no mandatory work requirement, a bill that contained to give people welfare when they came to America as immigrants, and a bill that did not address the illegitimacy crisis," Gramm said.

"Our bill says to people who come to America legally that you can come with your sleeves rolled up and ready to go to work, but don't come with your hand out because we're not going to invite people to come to America to go on welfare," Gramm said.

Senators also approved a Gramm amendment that reduces the federal workforce by eliminating 75 percent of the federal bureaucrats who are running the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) program. AFDC will be terminated under the welfare reform bill and the money returned to the states in the form of block

"This bill says that when we eliminate a government program - - something that only happens once in every two or three generations in America -we ought to eliminate the federal bureaucracy that goes with it," the senator said.

The welfare reform bill is now headed to a House-Senate conference committee that will determine which of the two chambers' different approaches to reforming welfare will become law.

Among the differences, the Senate bill keeps the policy of subsidizing illegitimacy, while the House bill denies direct cash payments to teen mothers and families having more children while on welfare.

"If the final welfare bill does not end this practice of giving people more and more cash benefits to have more and more children on welfare, I'm going to vote against it," the senator said.



Customer Notice

Comanche County Telephone Company, Inc. (Comanche County or the Company) has filed a request with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) seeking approval to implement rates, terms, and conditions for a new CALLER ID SERVICE offering: Calling Number Delivery Service. This request has been assigned Tariff Control Number 14669. This service will be available to all residential and business customers in the De Leon and Gorman exchanges, excluding Public, Semi-Public, and Customer Owned Coin-Operated connections.

Calling Number Delivery Service is an optional service which allows subscribers to see the phone number of most local calls before they answer the phone. Comanche County will also offer blocking, free of charge.

"Blocking" prevent the caller's number from appearing on the Caller ID display unit. Percall and per-line blocking will be available when the service is deployed. Comanche County will automatically establish a per-call blockage free of charge to all customers when Caller ID is offered in their area. Any customer who wishes to block his or her number on a percall basis, simply needs to press *67 on their touch-tone phone, or dial 1167 on their rotary phone before dialing the telephone number. Per-line blocking automatically blocks a customer's number on every call without the need to press *67 or dial 1167. If a customer selects per-line blocking, he or she can unlock their number, free of charge, on a single call by dialing *82 on their touch-tone phone, or dial 1182 on their rotary phone before dailing the telephone number. Per-line blocking will be automatically reactivated at the end of this single "unblocked" call. Per-line blocking is available at no charge to anyone, upon receipt by the PUC of written certification of the customer of a compelling need for per-line blocking. Comanche County will be sending each customer a postage prepaid per-line blocking request before Caller ID will be offered. All requests for per-line blocking will automatically be granted free of charge. It is not necessary to subscribe to Caller ID to have per-call or per-line blocking. Per-call or per-line blocking will display a message such a "private" or "anonymous" on the Caller ID display unit. Blocking will not be provided on calls from payphones.

The proposed effective date for the new service is December 1, 1995 for the De Leon and Gorman exchanges. The estimated annual revenue impact to the Company after expenses is \$6,624 for the first year of service, which is less than 1% of the Company's annual operating revenues. The follow rates have been proposed for these new service.
