"One of the newer foods which are being tried for successful freezing is the green pepper, one of the seasonal foods," she told the group.

Peppers are generally considered for salads and meat loaf, or as stuffed with a meat substitute, such as dressing. Processed for freezing when the peppers are in season, one may have them now the year 'round by freezing them.

Mrs. Lee Anglin presided and gave the Council Report of Monday's meeting in Comanche. Mrs. Tucker led the opening exercise, by conducting an action song, and the group followed the leader in carrying out the action - a sort of waker-upper to start the meeting off with a little fun.

(The following is an excerpt from an article by Jerry Mason in the July 10 edition of The Sporting News.)

In the season of his thirty-eighth year, Ty Cobb compounded what has since been considered a baseball epic: Drove in 102 runs with a 0.378 batting average and played in 121 ball games.

In the season of his thirty-eighth year, Ted Williams was batting 0.355 through July 3 and he has stroked more home runs in 67 games than Cobb (12) did for all of the 1925 season.

There has never been a 38-year-old hitter like Cobb - unless it's Williams, who might even be better at 38 than the Georgia Peach. But Cobb was a choked-bat placement hitter - not a long-ball man like Ted. There's more than a subtle difference. Williams, in his decline, is hitting with 38-year-old power that Cobb never had.

In the July 10 issue of The Sporting News, Joe King writes that the Chicago White Sox are reviving the lost art of base-stealing. He says the figures, how ever, do not warrant enthusiasm that stealing will emerge from the shadows cast over it by the might of the home run.

Instead of the determined, down-the-line, planned assault on the next base of Ty Cobb's time, stealing today waits on the extraordinary player, or on the necessity for taking risks on bases when power is scarce in the hitting order.

The White Sox likely will reach 100 steals, which is an exceptional record, indeed, in these times. The researcher has to go back eight years, to 1949, to find a "century" club. That was the Brooklyn Dodgers, who swiped 117, a most remarkable feat considering the power in their lineup and the park in which they played. They stole because they had brilliant getaway men in Jackie Robinson and Pee Wee Reese.

Willie Mays of the Giants is the leader now, but is a rare fellow, and not a trend. Cobb believes Willie can top his 40 steals of 1956, the high mark in the National League since 1929.

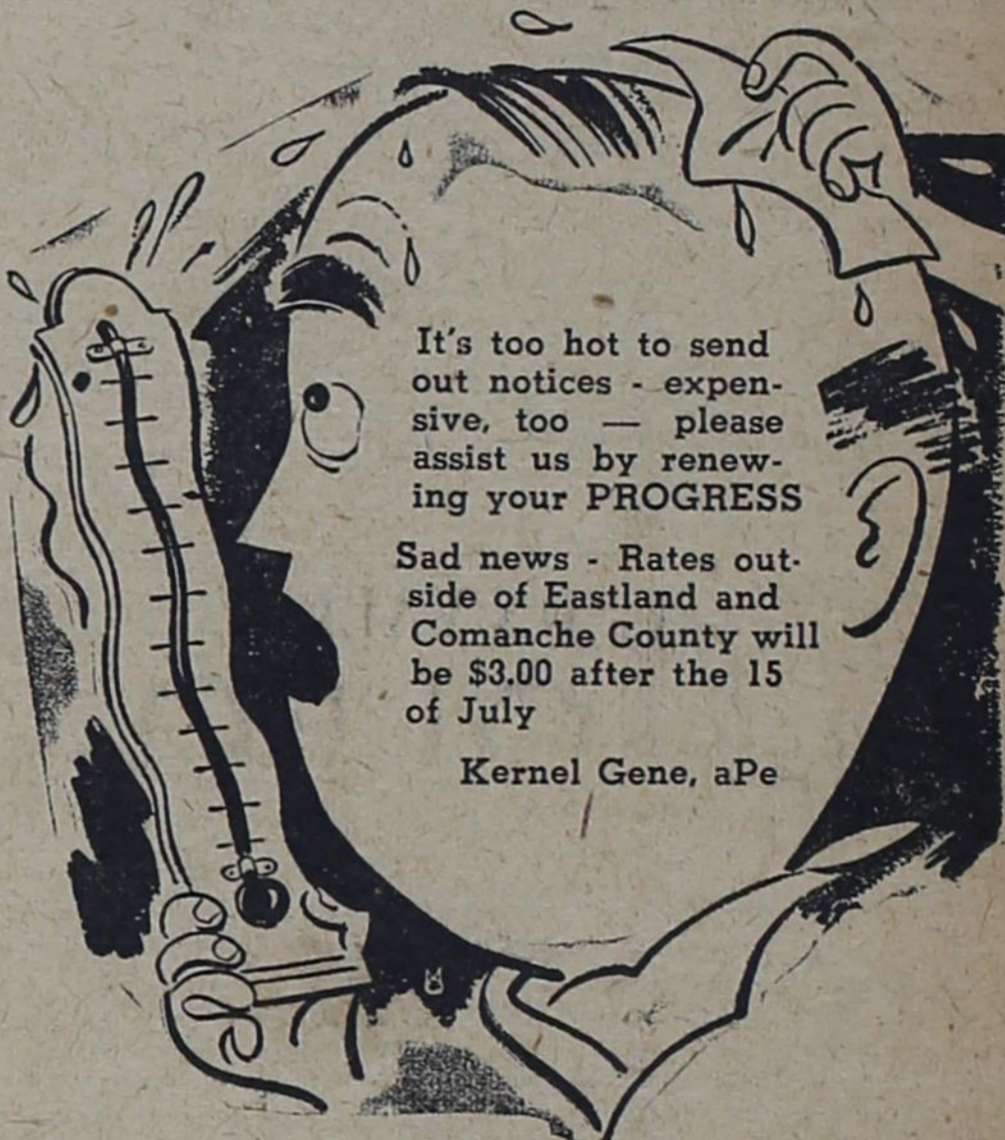

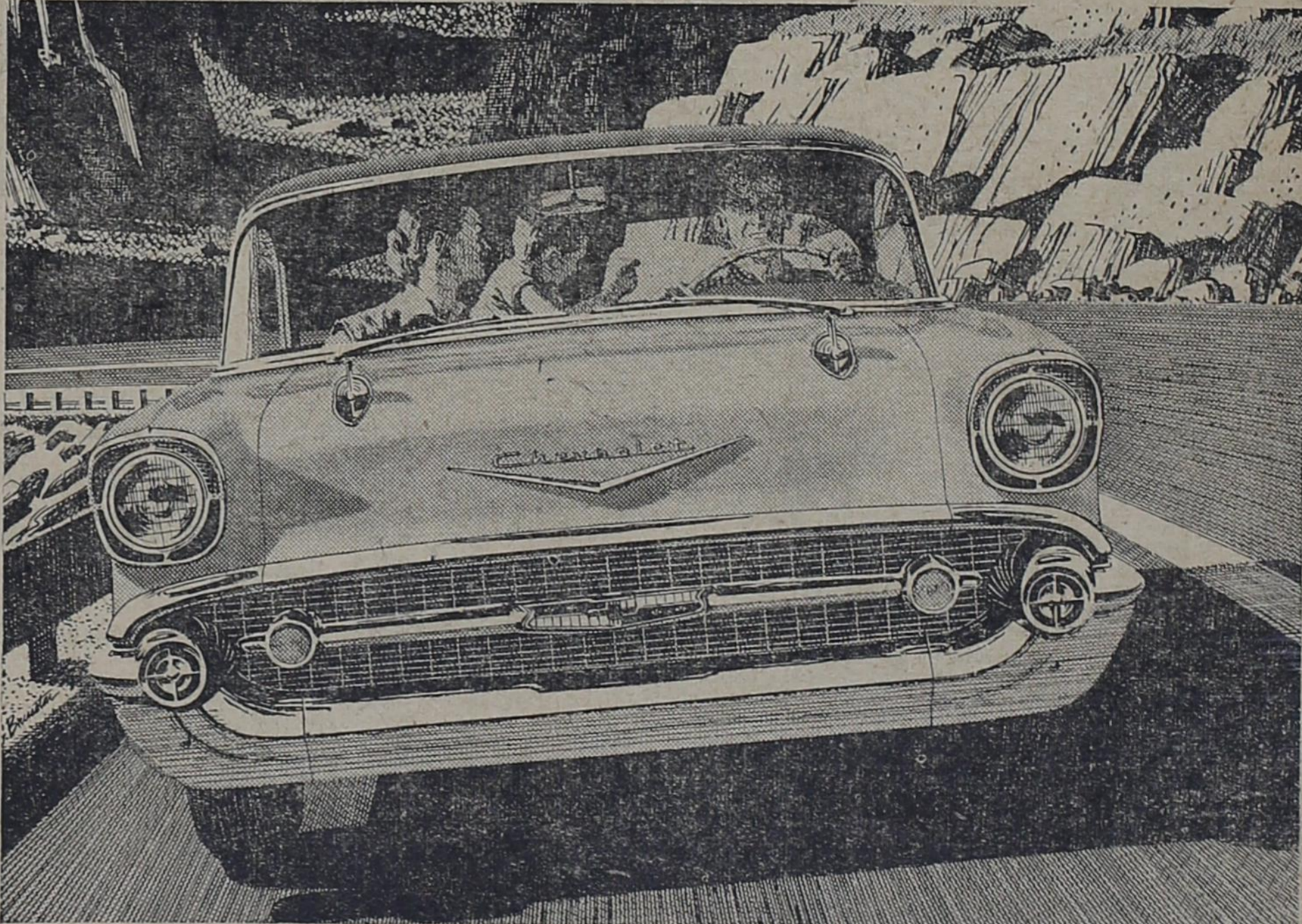
Is it possible for me, an average person, To understand the Bible?

Judges 15:15

David found a proven sling and a pebble better than an ill-fitting, cumbersome defense armour and offence weapons. Surely no stranger weapon was ever employed than the jawbone of an ass that Sampson used in killing the Philistines. If he were to use the bone of a dead jack-ass, why pick out the jawbone; why not the leg bone, the femur? Surely it would make a much better weapon, as far as smiting power is concerned.

The fact of the matter is, it is not the weapon, but the man who wields it. If he wields his weapon with the power of God he wins. All have available God's Holy Word, but only some are transformed by it, into true Christian Soldiers.

What a wonderful lesson, that we can gain the victory with God's power, even though we be imperfect.
