Local FFA To **Exhibit Prize** Livestock

Gorman and Carbon will be joining other 4-H and FFA members from throughout Texas for show ring competition at the upcoming Houston Livestock Show, Feb. 16 through March 3, at the Astrohall.

These FFA and 4-H exhibitors showcase their animal projects during the second week of livestock competition- -the junior show. The first week of competition, the open show, features professional ranchers and breeders from throughout the country exhibiting their breeding stock.

Entries in both the open and junior shows combine with horse show entries to make the Houston Livestock Show the world's largest.

Representing 932 Texas 4-H Clubs and FFA chapters, the junior show is expected to exceed 15,000 entries this year. A variety of animals is show in the junior division of livestock competition: market steers, market barrows, market lambs, market poultry, beef and dairy heifers, breeding sheep, goats, commercial steers and breeding rabbits.

The four market animal categories (steers, lambs, barrows and poultry) represent animals raised by the exhibitors as food sources. Top animals in each of these categories are eligible for their individual market auctions. Last year, junior market auction sales totaled \$4,545,349.

Ticket prices are \$10. and include admission to the horse show (excluding National Cutting Horse Association sponsored events), the livestock show, the carnival, all commercial and educational exhibits, special attractions and the rodeo.


4-H SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS DUE **MARCH 8TH**

Irrigation Workshop Planned Jan. 31

The Comanche County Extension Field Crops and Commercial Horticulture Committees have planned an Irrigation Workshop for Wednesday, January 31 at the Comanche Community Center in Comanche. Registration is at 8:30 a.m. with the program beginning at 9:00 a.m. and lasting till 2:30 p.m. including a sponsored lunch.

The Irrigation Workshop will cover the latest developments in irrigation equipment, soil moisture monitoring, water management, crop water needs and system components. The Irrigation Workshop will help growers of field, forage, vegetable and nut crops to maximize their production through efficient water and equipment uses.

Speakers for the Workshop include Dr. Joe Henggeler, Extension Agricultural Engineer for Irrigation and Water Management, Fort Storckton. Joe has worked extensively wit flood, center pivot and drip irrigation systems for field crops. He has developed irrigation scheduling based on crop needs and has researched the potential for drip irrigation use for field crops, in particular cotton.

A second speaker on the workshop program is well known to Central Texas Pecan, Peanut and Melon growers for his work in drip irrigation. Dr. Jody Worthington is the Research Horticulturist at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Stephenville. Jody

has done extensive research in the area of water requirements for fruit and nut trees and more recently has researched water needs of peanuts and is involved in an irrigation project on melons. HE has significant experience with ysstem design and has helped growers more efficiently irrigate no matter what crop they grow.

Also included in the program Dr. Nancy Roe, Extension Horticulturist at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Stephenville, will address crop culture using irrigation. Growing any crop under irrigation requires careful management and Nancy will address those management considerations that make for successful production.

To address system components Pat Dillion with Submatic Austin Inc. will explain and demonstrate the individual parts that go into a successful irrigation design. Pat has extensive experience with system design having installed systems all across the southwest. Pat will take growers step by step through the requirements for installing a workable irrigation system.

The last topic for the Irrigation Workshop is Automation Saves Labor Time and Money, by Steve Pitsinger and Motorola. Steve will discuss how producers can set up an irrigation system. regulated according to flows, automatically inject fertilizer, turn areas on and off and backflush filters.

KEEPING HEALTHY


Colds, flu, and "virus bugs" seem to be rampant. According to the Soap and Detergent Association, "Good hygiene is the first line of defense in staying healthy. the best way to reduce the spread of infectious diseases, is through frequent hand washing and regular cleaning of household surfaces. Using an antibacterial soap and a disinfectant provides an extra degree of safety."

The following tips for staying healthy this winter are ...

*Wash hands frequently. Wash before meals, after coming into contact with someone whi is sick, etc.

*Give colds the shoulder. Instead of using your hands, turn your head, and cough or sneeze into your shoulder. *Clean and disinfect wet or moist surfaces often. Bathroom countertops/ faucets; handles, toilet bowls/seats/ handles, door knobs, floors and diaper changing tables are real bad germ havens. *Launder cleaning cloths frequently. Cleaning cloths pick up germs from the surfaces they clean. Use liquid household bleach in the wash water, and always allow the cloths and sponges to dry thoroughly between uses.

*Eliminate germ spreaders. Avoid sharing sharing drinking glasses or eating utensils, coughing or sneezing into the telephone, chewing on a pencil, and leaving used tissues around the house.






