Lady Danthers Top Hico On Tuesday Night

The Lady Panthers beat the Hico Tigers here last Tuesday night.

In the first quarter the Lady Panthers scored 13 points. Mary Campbell led the team in scoring in this quarter with six points. Her points came from her post position and from rebounding the ball. 
