

The Gorman Boys' powerlifting team qualified two lifters for the Region I meet in Lubbock on March 12th. Senior Ryan Wright qualified in the 114 lb division with a 775 total this season. Ryan is currently in second place in our region for the 114 class. Senior J.T. Whitfill qualified in the 275 lb class with a 1240 total this season. J.T. is currently in 7th place in our region for the 275 lb class. To qualify for regionals in the boys' division lifters must be in the top 10 of all 1A and 2A lifters from the Region I area. To qualify for state a lifter must finish 1st or 2nd at the Region I meet in Lubbock. Congratulations to these two fine

Annual Gorman Softball Tournament









1. By a unanimous vote, acted to secure a major portion of the cemetery reserves into a trust fund so that the cemetery will be properly maintained in future years.


Voted to proceed with the construction of a graveside service facility.

Voted to have roads maintained as needed.



EDC TALK

There have been weekly articles about the 4A Sales Tax for several weeks now. There still seems to be some confusion about where the tax will come from. The 4A Sales Tax will be collected from consumers, people in our community (both residents and travelers) that are purchasing goods that are taxable. When anyone makes a purchase in Gorman at ZJ's Steakhouse, Whistle Stop, Dairy Queen, Antiques from Our Father's House, Bob's Grocery, City Grocery, or Foster's Floral (I won't attempt to name every business in town that sells taxable goods, that is not the point) that consumer is paying sales tax. Right now they are paying 7.75% which for most of us we round that up and it comes to about 8 cents for every dollar you spend. To pass the 4A sales tax, it would cause our everyday sales tax to go up another one-half of 1%...it would bring it up to 8.25% or still about 8 cents for every dollar you spend. It is a good way to make pennies count for your community. It does not burden any individual consumer, yet it does indeed add up.

It has been mentioned before that if you are shopping in DeLeon, Comanche, Stephenville, Eastland, and certainly Abilene or the D-FW metroplex, you are already paying 8.25% taxes on your purchases. Some of these towns have both 4A and 4B sales taxes, some have either a 4A or 4B and a hospital district tax, but they all have the 8.25% tax structure in place. The 4A or 4B Sales Tax funds come as much from people passing through our community as much as it does the local resident. Collecting one-half cent from a tourist/nonresident dollar is an excellent way to build our funds to make improvements for our community. As those pennies turn into dollars, and when the dollars go back in to the community to make improvements, those tourists/non-residents will be inclined to feturn and spend more dollars.

Not all state programs work like we want them to, but for the most part, the State of Texas Sales Tax initiative does a lot for small communities. Let's use it for our benefit.


