
First Methodist To Host Stew Lunch

Southwestern Peanut Growers To Nominate Committee Member

Peanut Growers of the Southwest - - primarily Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Arkansas, California and Louisiana - - will meet at the Oklahoma State University Extension Service Building, 930 North Portland Avenue (at intersection of Northwest 10th and Portland), Oklahoma City, OK, on Saturday, March 23, 1996, to elect a grower member and alternate to the Peanut Administrative Committee.

The meeting is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. (CST) in conjunction with the Annual Meeting of Oklahoma Peanut Growers' Association. The nominations portion of the meeting will occur early in the meeting.

Gary Dillingham and Lane Campbell, Peanut Administrative Committee Field Representatives, will conduct the nominations.

Luther Y. Clearman, III, Manager of the Peanut Administrative Committee explains that the Committee administers the Peanut Marketing Agreement. The Committee is made up of growers, shellers, and the Area Association Managers, and recommends peanut marketing regulations to be issued by the U. S. Secretary of Agriculture under the Agreement. Though these regulations are applicable only to signatory handlers under the Agreement, they generally affect the entire industry.

The grower member position to be filled is currently held by Billy F. Coe of Hydro, Oklahoma. The Alternate position is occupied by Laverne Johnson of Fort Cobb, Oklahoma. Both terms expire on April 30, 1996. Both men are eligible for re-
